I have ordered the rails, ties and poles for the work on Main street, and hope we may be able to get them in time so as not to interfere with your paving operations.

EXHIBIT A.

Know All Men by these Presents, that the Detroit, Ypsilanti & Ann Arbor Bailway, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Michigan, as principal, and the Union Trust Company of the City of Detroit, Michigan, as surety, are held and tirmly bound unto the city of Ann Arbor, a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the state of Michigan in the sum of four thousand dollars lawful money of the United States, to be paid to the

said City of Ann Arbor, for which payment well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our successors and assigns firmly by these presents.

Sealed with our seals and dated this 29th day of June, 1898.

Whereas, the City of Ann Arbor aforesaid is about to construct a brick pavement upon that portion of Main street in said city lying between the north line of Catherine street and the south line of Williams street, and

Whereas it is claimed by the said City of Ann Arbor that the above bounden Detroit, Ypsilanti & Ann Arbor Railway is legally bound to pave that portion of said street lying between the rails of its tracks, and

Whereas, differences have arisen between the said City of Ann Arbor and the above bounden Detroit, Ypsilanti & Ann Arbor Railway, becaus - said Railway desclaims any such legal obligation, a settlement of which in due course of law would tend seriously to delay the public improvement aforesaid.

Now therefore, the condition of this obligation is such that if the above bounden Detroit, Ypsilanti & Ann Arbor Railway shall replace its present equipment upon that portion of Main street above mentioned with tubular iron poles, steel ties on concrete foundation and grooved girder rails, and use its best efforts to do the same, at such time and in such manner as not to delay the work of paving said street, and shall further pay to the said City of Ann Arbor the cost of so much of said pavement on Main street as lies between the rails of the said railway, including all spaces between double tracks and switches, at the rate per square yard paid by the city for the construction thereof in the first instance, according to the measurement of the (ity Engineer, one-half thereof to be paid in six months from this date and the balance in twelve months from this date, and shall further pay all damages caused to the said city by any failure or delay due to the fault of said Railway in respect of the replacement of said equipment as aforesaid, then this obligation to be void, otherwise to remain in full force.
