Whereas, it is the claim of many of the people of the city of Ann Arbor, that at the time of the contribution of the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars for the construction of the present University Hospital buildings, it was part of the agreement that there should be set apart in the said hospital, for the use of the inhabitants of the city of Ann Arbor, two free beds, the Common Council to have power and authority to designate the persons who should or might occupy the same.

Therefore be it resolved, and the Common Council hereby respectfully requests the Honorable Board of Regents of the University of Michigan, to make provision for the carrying into effect of the said understanding; it is, however, agreed, that all persons admitted into said hospital under such provision, shall, as to age, kind and condition of disease or injury, come within the rules and regulations which the Board of Regents shall or may establish for the government of the said hospital.

That the city clerk certify this resolution to the Board of Regents of the University of Michigan, and deliver the same to Regent Dean.
