To the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your special committee to whom was referred the matter of grades separation have had an interview with H. W. Ashley, who presented some of the difficulties involved and we are of the opinion that the matter needs a careful and systematic investigation. It is the opinion of your committee that there will be street railway lines crossing the A. A. R. R. in the near future, and owing to the steep grades approaching the A. A. R. R. tracks from each direction it's in our judgment necessary to take some definite action in order to prevent any such disastrous accidents as are occurring from time to time at such railway crossings. We therefore recommend to your honorable body that the Council pass the proper resolution authorizing the City Engineer to work in conjunction with the Civil Engineer of the A. A. R. R. and collect the necessary data for and submit some reasonable and feasible plans for the separation of the railway and street grades, together with an estimate of the cost of the structures necessary for the best and safest means of securing the desired result.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

Whereas this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands and premises which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading of Huron streets from the west line of Ashley street to the east line of State street within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

And whereas, the grading and paving of that part of Huron street within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and hereby declared to be a necessary

public improvement.

Therefore resolved, and it is hereby of the declared to be the purpose cause Huron Common Council to street within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of

the said petitioners.

Resolved further, that the cost and expenses of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: streets and public alley intercections and to the center of the street in front of all County and City property, shall be charged to and paid from the street fund, and all the remainder of the cost and expense shall be raised, assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Huron street within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved further, that the said petition along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works, with directions to report to the Council with all convenient dispatch, suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quantity of materials to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such proposed public improvement.

Moved by Ald. Brown that the resolution be laid on the table for two weeks and that the city clerk issue a call to the property owners to meet the Common Council in regard to the mat-Adopted as follows:

Now therefore, be it resolved by the common council of the city of Ann Arbor, for the purpose of ascertaining what foundation exists for complaints, that the president of the common council appoint a special committee of seven members of the council to devise a method by which a proper and just comparison may be made of the water rates now being paid in Ann Arbor with water rates paid in other cities in Michigan, and report the same, together with such other information on the subject as they may deem proper and advisable, to the council at its next regular meeting.
