An Ordinance to Amend Section One of An Ordinance Entitled "An Ordinance relative to fire limits and fires," passed on the third day of January, 1898, and approved on the 12th day of January, 1898.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section One. That section one of an ordinance entitled "an ordinance relative to fire limits and fires," as amended and passed on the third day of January, 1898, and approved January 12th, 1898, be and the same is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter place, enlarge or erect any building or structure on any lot or part of a lot fronting on any of the following streets or parts of streets, to-wit: On Main street, between Kingsley and William streets; on Huron street, between First street and Fifth avenue; on Washington street between the Ann Arbor railroad and Fifth avenue; on Liberty street between First street and Fifth avenue; on Catherine street between Ashley street and Fifth avenue; on Fourth avenue between Kingsley and Liberty streets; on the west side of Fifth avenue between Kingsley and Liberty streets; on Ashley street between Catherine and William streets; on the west side of State street between William and Huron streets; on the east side of State street between North University avenue and Washington street; on the north side of William street between State and Maynard streets; on the east side of Maynard street between William and Liberty streets; on the south side of Liberty street between Maynard and State streets, and on Detroit street between Fourth avenue and Depot street, and on the block bounded as follows, to-wit: On the north by Fuller street, on the south by Kingsley street, on the east by North State street and on the west by Elizabeth street in this city,

unless such building or structure shall be constructed of stone or brick with party or ure walls of the same material. Provided, That the Board of Fire Commissioners may, in its discretion, grant permission for the erection within said limits of buildings veneered with brick or iron, and for the erection of frame buildings, barns and out-houses in and on all that part of the above described district lying north of Catherine street, west of Ashley street, south of Liberty street and on State street between Liberty and Huron streets.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The following ordinance was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled An Ordinance Relative to Licenses.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section seven of an ordinance entitled An Ordinance relative to licenses, as amended by an ordinance approved on the 18th day of January, 1897, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 7. Every hawker, peddler or person going about from place to place, or who makes use of any of the streets or open places in said city, selling or offering for sale goods, wares, merchandise or any species of property, shall pay a license therefor in the sum of one hundred dollars per year, or fifty dollars for a period of six months. And for a period of less than six months such person shall pay a license therefor as follows, that is to say: If he intends to travel on foot, one dollar and fifty cents per day; if he intends to travel with one horse, two dollars and fifty cents per day; if he intends to travel with two or more horses or other animals, three dollars per day for every vehicle so used. Any person selling or exposing for sale any such goods or property from any wagon, hand-cart, show-case or stand, in any

street or open place, shall pay the sum of three dollars per day; and in granting license for any such purpose in any street or open place, the mayor shall designate the street and place where any such wagon, hand-cart, stand or show-case shall be located, and shall have power and authority to change and relocate the same from time to time in his discretion. Provided, this section shall not apply to persons selling domestic fruits, dairy, farm or garden produce (of their own production), nor to bakers or merchants delivering goods to their customers in said city.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

## RESOLUTIONS.

By Ald. Brown:

Whereas at a meeting of the Common Council, held at the Council Chambers in the City of Ann Arbor, on the third day of April, A. D. 1900, it was among other things ordered that a certain public alley be laid out and established within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, State of Michigan, and hereinafter particularly mentioned and described.

And whereas this Common Council has been unable to procure or obtain the right of way for such public alley over the private lands lying within the boundaries thereof by agreement with the owners thereof, or to procure by gift, purchase or otherwise the necessary right of way for said public alley over the private property within the limits thereof as laid out and established. And it is deemed necessary to cause to be instituted proceedings in condemnation of such private property for public purposes.



Therefore, be it resolved, and this Common Council does hereby declare, that the laying out and establishment of a public alley within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, bounded and described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the northwest corner of lot number fifteen in block number three south of Huron street, range four east according to the plat of the village (now city) of Ann Arbor; running thence east eight feet; thence south parallel with the line of lots to William street; thence west sixteen feet; thence north parallel with the line of lots to a point twenty-two feet south of the south line of lot one in said block; thence northerly to a point ten feet west of the southeast corner of said lot; thence north to Liberty street; thence east ten feet; thence south to the place of beginning, is a necessary public improvement, and deem and hereby declare it to be necessary to take the private property lying within the limits thereof for such public improvement.

Resolved further, that the City Attorney be and is hereby directed to institute and carry on the necessary condemnation proceedings in the Circuit Court for the County of Washtenaw, Michigan, under chapter ninety of the compiled laws for the State of Michigan for the year of 1897, in the name of the City of Ann Arbor, and against the lands, tenements and premises lying within the limits of such public alley hereinbefore described and against the owners and occupants thereof, to the end that the private property lying within the limits of said public alley may be condemned to public use.

Therefore, resolved, that by virtue of the authority granted to the Common Council by the general laws of the State the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of maintaining in good order and repair the several bridges, culverts and cross walks in the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor.

Resolved further, and it is hereby ordered that the said several sums of money aforesaid be and the same is hereby levied and assessed on, upon and against the taxable property of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and ordered to be spread on the tax rolls of the said city for the year A. D., 1900, for the said several purposes aforesaid, and it is ordered that all of the said several sums aforesaid be assessed, levied, collected and paid into the City Treasury for the several purposes aforesaid, and on account of the several funds aforesaid.

Gentlemen—Your board beg leave to submit their special report on the slaughter house district which was thoroughly inspected this past week.

Jacob Laubengayer's slaughter house; clean, hog-pen clean and having six hogs on hand.

L. C. Weinmann's slaughter house; clean, hog-pen clean and having 24 hogs on hand. A pile of rubbish was found on the premises which should be removed.

Mr. Zachman's slaughter house; clean, and pig-pen clean and no hogs on the premises.

J. F. Hoelzle's slaughter house; clean, pig-pen clean, and having 10 hogs on hand.

Geo. Spathelf's yard and slaughter house; clean, with 11 hogs on hand.

Chas. Vogel's; very offensive about this place and only one hog on hand.

Your board would also like to be advised as what procedure it should take to do away with the two stagment pools of water on South Ashley street, just south of Jefferson street, which is in a very bad condition and should be attended to at once.

Your board have made thirty-five inspections this month and nearly all of such nuisances inspected have been abated.

Your board would ask that an ordinance be made to prevent hogs being kept in the city limits, from April to October each year.
