Sir—Please issue the usual notice and call for a special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, to be held in the Council Chambers on Friday evening, Aug. 24, 1900, at 8 o'clock, local time, for the purpose of considering the question of the nuisances said to exist in connection with the business of slaughtering animals and manufacturing of fertilizing material in the fifth ward, and the ordering of the abatement of the same.

By Ald. Brown:

Resolved, that the slaughter houses

situate in the fifth ward of this city, at or near the north bank of the Huron river, and the manner in which the business of keeping and slaughtering animals thereat and the manufacturing of fertilizers thereat is deemed and declared to be a public nuisance, and detrimental to the public health.

Resolved further that the city attorney be and is hereby directed to cause a bill to be filed in the circuit court for the county of Washtenaw, in chancery, praying for the abatement of such public nuisance.

Ald. Hamilton moved that the resolution be amended to read Voger's slaughter houses. Lost on the following vote:

Nays—Ald. Koch, Schlenker, Kearns, Brown, Grose, Weeks, Jenney, Bliton, Fischer, Pres. Seabolt—10.

Yeas—Ald. Hamilton, Richards, Rohde, Coon—4.

The original resolution was then acted upon and was adopted as follows:
