Many cities and towns have laws against expectorating in public places and have posters placed in prominent places cautioning people in regard to it. Would it not be a judicious sanitary measure for your honorable body to pass an ordinance appertaining to this nuisance?

Resolved, that the Board of Public Works be directed to carry out the orders of the council and have the streets cleaned with the sweeper exclusively for six weeks, dispensing with all hand labor while the experiment is going on and report the comparative result to the council.
