Whereas, This Common Council has been applied to in writing by citizens owning or controlling a majority of the feet frontage of the lands and premises which are liable to be assessed for the same, praying for the grading, curbing and paving of north driveway of North University avenue from the former east line of State street to the east line of East Univer-

sity avenue, within the corporation limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and,

Whereas, The grading and paving of that part of North University avenue within the limits aforesaid is deemed and hereby declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore,

Resolved, And it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause North University avenue within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayers of the said petitioners.

Resolved further, That the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses, and 20 per cent of the remainder shall be charged to and paid from the Street Fund, and all the remainder of the cost and expense shall be raised, assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting North University avenue, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved further, That the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the board of public works, with directions to report to the Council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans, with specifications, for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of materials to be used therefor, with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvement.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 1, 1905.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your committee on walks would respectfully recommend that a tar or asphalt walk be graded, built and constructed on and along the following streets: On the north side of Madison street between South Main and Seventh streets; on the north side of Hill street between South Main and Fifth street; on the west side of Lincoln avenue from Ezra Robinson's to E. B. Hall's; on the south side of Israel avenue from E. B. Hall's to west side of Olivia avenue; on the south side of Israel avenue from J. E. Reighardt's to the property of Mrs. M. H. Walker; on

the east side of Fifth street from present tar walk to Madison street; on the west side of Sixth street, in front of Nos. 508, 514, and 544; on both sides of Oswego to Hill street; on North side of Hill street from Oswego to present tar walk; on east side of Third street, between Washington and Huron streets.

That a stone or cement walk be built at the southeast corner of Fourth avenue and Huron street, and the cement walk on and along in front of the Crookston property on West Huron street be widened to five feet, and that a proper approach to the sidewalk on north end of Division street belonging to Dr. Klingman be made; all of which is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

We further recommend that the following brick crosswalks be built: On the west side of Olivia avenue across Israel avenue; west side of Lincoln avenue across Israel avenue; south side of Israel avenue across Olivia avenue; south side of Israel avenue across Martin street; south side of Israel avenue across Baldwin street; also cross walks on Ashley, First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth streets, north side of Madison street.

We also recommend that all other walks, ordered and now past due, be referred to the board of public works, they to contract for same at once.

Resolved, That the city attorney be, and hereby is, authorized to take such proper steps as may be necessary to secure the presentment to the State Legislature and the enactment into law of a bill in form as follows:

The People of the State of Michigan Enact:

Section 1. Sections one hundred thirty-four and one hundred thirty-five of an act entitled, "An act to reincorporate the City of Ann Arbor, revise the charter of said city and repeal all conflicting acts relating thereto," being act number three hundred thirty-one of the Local Acts of Michigan of eighteen hundred eighty-nine, approved March fifteenth, eighteen hundred eighty-nine, as amended by act number two hundred sixty-two of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-one, approved March twenty-eight, eighteen hundred ninety-one, as amended by act number two hundred eighty-two of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-one, approved April tenth, eighteen hundred ninety-one, as amended by act number three hundred sixty-eight of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-three, approved April twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred ninety-three, as amended by act number three hundred thirty-six of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-five, approved March

fifteenth, eighteen hundred ninety-five, as amended by act number four hundred sixty-nine of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-seven, approved on June second, eighteen hundred ninety-seven, as amended by act number three hundred fifty-six of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-nine, approved March thirtieth, eighteen hundred ninety-nine, as amended by act number two hundred seventy-eight of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-nine, approved February sixteenth, eighteen hundred ninety-nine, as amended by act number three hundred ninety-two of the Local Acts of eighteen hundred ninety-nine, approved May tenth, eighteen hundred ninety-nine, as amended by act number five hundred forty-three of the Local Acts of nineteen hundred three, approved June eighteenth, nineteen hundred three, are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 134. There shall be a board of public works consisting of five good and competent men who are electors. The members of such board shall be appointed by the mayor, subject to the approval of the majority of the members elect of the Common Council, and shall hold office for the term of five years and until their successors are appointed and qualify, the said term to commence on the fifteenth day of May: Provided, That the three members of said board now in office shall continue in office for the terms for which they were appointed, and until the members of said board provided for by this act shall have been appointed, qualified and shall enter upon their duties as members of said board.

Section 135. The members of said board in addition to the three members now composing said board shall be appointed, one for the term of four years and one for the term of five years from the fifteenth day of May, 1905; and said mayor shall annually nominate to the Common Council on the first Monday in May of each year, or as soon thereafter as may be,

a member of such board for the term of five years. The members of said board shall at their first meeting after the fifteenth day of May of each year, or as soon thereafter as may be, elect one of the members thereof as president of said board, whose duties shall be to call meetings of said board whenever he deems it expedient so to do, or when requested in writing by two or more of the other members of said board, and to preside over the deliberations of said board. And the Common Council shall at all times provide the said board with a suitable office room for its meetings and business uses, and supply record books, stationery and other things necessary for the transaction of the business in charge of said board, and provide for the payment, in like manner as other accounts against the city, of all necessary and lawful expenses incurred by said board. This act is ordered to take immediate effect.
