Communications from the Mayor.

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 19, 1905. To the Common Council of This City:

Gentlemen—I hereby disapprove of so much of your proceedings of Monday, the 17th inst, as pertains to accepting the proposal of the Washtenaw Light and Power Company for street lighting with electricity exclusively.

I do so for the reason that with a combination system of electricity and gas our people can be furnished a far superior all night service at even less cost, as has been here most clearly demonstrated during the last two months.

The expenditure of between fifty and sixty thousand dollars for street lighting during the next five years is an important matter, and it behooves us to see to it that we secure the very best possible service for the Money. Very truly yours,

Arthur Erown, as attorney for Gillett & Moore, presented a petition signed by Miller & Pray and ninetysix others asking that Moore and Gillett be permitted to paint business advertisements upon the fence surrounding the high school block.

Ald. Schlenker moved that the permission asked for be granted.

Ald. Gill retired from the meeting.

Ald. Manwaring moved that the motion be laid upon the table until the next meeting. Lost.

Ald. Manwaring raised the point that Ald. Schlenker's motion was out of order on the ground that the council had no legal right to pass such a resolution.

The chair ruled that the motion was in order.

Resolved, That this board recommend to the council the payment of \$3,000 to D. J. Ross to apply on cost of pavement on North University avenue (pavement district No. 9).

Ann Arbor, Mich., Aug. 7, 1905. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

Your petitioner, the board of education of the City of Ann Arbor, would respectfully represent to your honorable body that the architects who drew the plans for the new high school and library buildings represent to the board of education that it will he necessary in order to convey the water from the buildings to have a storm sewer placed by the City of Ann Arbor along Washington street where it intersects Thayer street; that unless this is done by the city that as soon as the new building is erected all the water from the building will flow into Washington street, and as there will be no means of conveying it away, it will flod the street during The board of education rain storms. your therefore requests honorable body to investigate this matter and if possible construct a storm sewer so that the water coming from the new building may be properly conveyed away.

Referred to the sewer committee.

A petition from D. W. Springer, et al, requesting that the width of Tappan street between the curbing be fixed at twenty-eight feet was referred to the street committee.

A petition by C. E. Rhead and nine other residents and property owners of the Third Ward that the creek between Fountain and Hiscock streets be tiled and graded or the storm sewers be removed which empty into the creek, was referred to the sewer committee and the city attorney.

A petition by Geo. P. Stauch and eight others for a crosswalk on Brooks street on the south side of Summit was referred to the sidewalk committee. A petition from A. J. Mummery and seven other property owners on Volland street to extend the sewer on Volland street from Fourteenth street to Observatory street was referred to the sewer committee.

Resolution.

By Ald. Coon:

Resolved, That the city clerk shall be, and hereby is, authorized and empowered for and on behalf of the City of Ann Arbor, to sign the following stipulation with the Ann Arbor Water Company:

STIPULATION

Between the City of Ann Arbor and the Ann Arbor Water Company.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Ann Arbor Water Company held at the City of Ann Arbor on the 7th day of August, 1905, at the office of the said company, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That John F. Lawrence, the president of the Ann Arbor Water Company, be authorized in behalf of and tor said company to sign the following stipulations:

Whereas, Controversies have arisen between the City of Ann Arbor and the Ann Arbor Water Company, in regard to the construction, interpretation, and performance of a contract heretufore entered into between said parties; and

Whereas, Said city claims the said Water Company has so far failed and refused to perform its proper duties toward said city and its inhabitants, as to have forfeited all its rights under said contract, and has thereby released said city from any further liability under the terms thereof; and

Whereas, Said Water Company denies that it has in any way violated its duties to said city, and its inhabitants, but claims it has fully performed the same; and

Whereas, Said city by its council has appointed a committee to investigate and fully report upon the rights of said city and the duties of said company to the city and its inhabitants, which investigation is not yet completed; and

Whereas, It is probable that litigation between said city and said Water Company will result from the differences existing between said parties, which will continue for some time; and

Whereas, Many citizens have requested said Water Company to make needed extensions and connections in order to supply them with water, and protect them from fire; and

Whereas, Said city, by its proper officers, has made investigation of said applications for extensions and connections, and believes the same to be reasonable and just, and believes it to be the duty of said Water Company as a public service company to make such extensions and connections as have been requested, or as may be requested under 1.ke circumstances; and

Whereas, Said Water Company has heretofore refused, and does now refuse, make such extensions to connections, the and unless city, through its council, orders the same to be done, and unless said city pays to said company certain bills alleged by said company to be due to it by said city under the aforesaid contract heretofore entered into between said city and said company; and

Whereas, Said city claims that it is the duty of said company to make such reasonable extensions and connections when requested by the parties need ng them, without any order therefor by said city; and

Whereas, Said city denies that there is now any liability on the part of said city for the sums alleged to be due to said Water Company under the terms of the aforesaid contract, because the same has been forfeited by said company, further than to pay the reasonable value of water the actually furnished to said city, and subject to any set-off or counter claim said city may have against said company for any damage resulting from any breach of contract or duty by said company; and

Whereas, in order solely to protect its inhabitants, and prevent the great inconvenience to them resulting from the refusal of said company to make such reasonable extensions and connections during such period of investigation and litigation, should any arise, it seems expedient and in the interest of both parties hereto that some provision be made whereby the extensions and connections necessary for the convenience, supply and protection of the citizens and their inhabitants may be made without prejudice to the existing rights of either of the parties hereto:

Now, Therefore, It is hereby stipulated and agreed between the said city of Ann Arbor and the said Ann Arbor Water Company, that in the event that said city shall pay to said Water Company the bills which have been presented by said Ann Arbor Water Company, or which may in future be presented by said company for hydrant rentals, and for water for other purposes supplied to the said city, or shall order said hydrants and extensions, or take any other action deemed wise or necessary for the proper protection of the city and its inhabitants in regard to the supply of water, then the said payment of any such bills, or the ordering of such extens ons and placing of such hydrants, or any or all of the same, or any other action of said city, whether in accordance with the terms of the aforesaid contract or not, shall not be deemed in any way any waiver of, or in any way prejudic'al to, any right or claim the said city now has or may have in future against said Water Company for said alleged violation of the aforesaid contract by said company, or for any failure in whole or in part, to perform the same, or for failure to perform, or violation of, any other duty owed by said Water Company to said city; and it is further expressly promised and agreed Water Company with said by said city that in the event that said sums claimed to be due to said company by said city shall be paid to said company, said payment shall be considered by the parties hereto as having been made by the city under protest and solely to secure the protection for its inhabitants justly due them, and if litigation shall hereafter arise between the part es hereto, and the city shall in such litigation claim the right to recover any excess so paid, over what may be justly due, if anything, it is expressly understood and agreed by said Water Company, that said company, claiming such sums are due under such aforesaid contract, sha'l have the same burden of proving their compliance with and their due performance of their duty thereunder, the same as if the said company should now sue said city to recover said sums alleged to be due;

and further, if in such litigation it shall be found that such sums so paid are more than the amounts justly due to said Water Company, then the said company will repay the excess thereof to the said city with interest thereon at the rate of five per cent from the time said payments are made by said city, and will also pay the said city any amount that the city may be found justly entitled to by way of set-off of recoupment, to the same extent and with the same effect as if this agreement had not been entered into.

And it is further stipulated and agreed that the receiving of said money from the said city and the placing of said pipe extensions and said hydrants under and by virtue of this stipulation shall be no waiver of any right under the contract heretofore mentioned which said Water Company now has or may have in future against the said city.

It is expressly understood that the purpose of this stipulation is one of expedience to avoid hardships to citizens and the public generally in the event that said controversies and differences between said parties shall be continued by suit or otherwise.

It is further expressly agreed that this stipulation may be revoked at any time by either party by appropriate resolution and due notice to the other party.
