To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:-Your committee appointed by virtue of a resolution passed at a meeting of this council the 2nd day of October, A. D. 1905, to obtain the terms and conditions upon which a release of the title of certain lands lying north of the Michigan Central depot in the Fourth Ward, which

in said resolution, can be acquired for the purposes of a public common or park, and also a statement of damages accruing to all persons concerned in the establishing of said public park or common, and also a release of the title of said property, and all such damages, if said lands should be acquired by purchase, conveyance or otherwise, respectfully submit their report as follows:

This committee has held several meetings relative to the matter of said park for the purposes aforesaid, which meetings have been attended by several persons having title to and interested in said lands proposed to be acquired for purposes of a public common or park; also members of this committee and the city attorney. by request of this committee, have endeavored to negotiate with the property owners personally and by mail with reference to acquiring said lands. Your committee further report that some of the persons interested in said lands refused to name any price for the same and others have placed of what your committee is willing to a value upon their lands far in excess recommend the council to accept. Your committee is of the opinion that said lands can only be acquired by condemnation proceedings in accordance with the statute in such case made and provided.

We would therefore recommend that, in case your honorable body deem it wise and necessary, to acquire this property for public use, that condemnation proceedings he commenced at the most once as speedy, feasible and satisfactory way for obtaining the desired result.
