Ann Arbor, Mich., Aug. 6, 1906. To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:-

Gentlemen:-The fruit and orchard inspectors of the city of Ann Arbor have the following report and recommendations to offer:

Though the inspection of the city is not nearly complete we have found that part of the city east of Main street and south of the river to be infested with San Jose Scale, not on all trees, but scattered throughout this district. The other parts of the city have not yet been inspected thoroughly enough to show whether the scale is present or In the worst places the trees are not. already dying.

We find many owners are not in a position to do their own spraying.

Many properties are owned by women, who could not do their own spraying, nor do the inspectors know of anyone who is prepared to do the spraying on a commercial basis.

Further, only the most thorough spraying will even hold this dangerous insect in check, and tree owners who are willing to do their own spraying will often fail to kill the insect through ignorance of just what is necessary to do. With the most thorough spraying it is doubtful whether the scale can be completely eradicated.

In view of the above fact the fruit orchard inspectors recommend that the city of Ann Arbor purchase such apparatus as is necessary to prepare and apply the sprays required to combat the San Jose Scale and other dangerous insects and diseases of plants shrubs or trees, and that men be employed under the direction of the fruit and orchard inspectors to do such spraying where the owners of infested trees desire it, and also where the owners of infested trees refuse to do the necessary spraying or have it done.

The owners of such trees sprayed under the direction of the fruit and orchard inspectors shall pay the city of Ann Arbor a sum sufficient to cover the cost of the spraying materials and the work of applying them.
