Ald. Fischer presented an ordinance as follows.

An Ordinance to amend section 11 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Licenses, passed July 6, 1891, as approved July 15, 1891, as amended February 4, 1895, as amended March 16, 1896, as approved March 17, 1896, as amended December 19, 1898, as amended June 4, 1900, as amended November 6, 1905."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section 11 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Licenses, passed July 6, 1891, as approved July 15, 1891, as amended February 4, 1895, as amended March 16, 1896, as approved March 17, 1896, as amended December 19, 1898, as amended June 4, 1900, as amended November 6, 1905," be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 11. No person, firm, corporation or company shall exhibit or maintain in said city any circus, menagerie, play, game, theatrical exhibition, roller skating rink, bowling alley, or billiard hall, or exhibit natural or artificial curiosities, or exhibit any show or entertainment of any kind for which pay is demanded or received without a license therefor, and for every license granted for any such business, object or purpose there shall be paid by the licensee the sum of money hereinafter specified: for a circus which shall include a menagerie the sum of \$50.00 per day; for a circus without a menagerie the sum of \$25.00 per day; for a menagerie

without a circus, the sum of \$10.00; for a whirling or merry-go-round, shooting gallery or other game of like character, \$3.00 for the first day and \$1.00 per day thereafter; for every hall, opera house or theater let for the purpose of giving theatrical and other like entertainments a license fee based upon the seating capacity of such hall, opera house or theater as follows: If such place have a seating capacity less than 200 the license fee therefor shall be the sum of \$20.00 per annum; for a seating capacity of from 200 to 500 the license fee shall be \$25.00 per annum; for a seating capacity of from 500 to 1,500 a license fee of \$40.00 per annum; for a seating capacity over 1,500 a license fee of \$50.00 per annum; for every skating rink a license fee of \$25.00 per annum; for every place used for purposes of bowling, a license fee at the rate of \$5.00 per annum for each alley in such place; for every billiard hall a license fee of \$2.00 for each billiard table or pool table therein: provided, however, that it shall be unlawful between the hours of 10:30 p. m. and 7:00 a. m. for any bowling alley or billiard hall to be kept open, operated or used for bowling or billiard playing; for every other public entertainment not hereinbefore stated for which pay shall be demanded or received, \$10.00 for the first day, and \$3.00 for every day thereafter: provided, however, that all exhibits of agriculture, educational or religious associations, or local theatrical and musical societies are excepted from all the provisions of the ordinance.

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances heretofore passed by said city of Ann Arbor, coming in conflict with this ordinance, or any provision of the same, are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall be in force and take effect on and after ten days from legal publication.

#### SEWER COMMITTEE.

By Ald. Sherk:

Resolved, that this common council still deeming it expedient to cause to be constructed a lateral sewer in lateral sewer district No. 26, the construction of the same is hereby ordered.

Resolved, further, that each and all of the lands, tenements and premises hereinafter mentioned are deemed and declared to be benefited by the construction of such lateral sewer to the extent of the cost thereof, street crossings excepted, and all such lands shall constitute and all of the said lands hereinafter mentioned is fixed and determined as the district and special assessment district upon and against which shall be assessed and charged all the costs and expense of construction of such lateral sewer, that is to say:

All of that part of the city of Ann Arbor and all of the lands, tenements and premises situated in the city of Ann Arbor, State of Michigan, known,

bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Boundary of Sewer District No. 26. Wall Street and Broadway.

Beginning at the southwest corner of lot 25, block 9, Brown & Fuller's addition; thence southerly along the easterly line of Wall street 509 feet; thence easterly at right angles to Wall street 67 and  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet; thence northerly parallel to Wall street to the southeast corner of said lot 25; thence westerly to the place of beginning.

Also beginning at the southeast corner of lot 12, block 8, Brown & Fuller's addition; thence southerly along the westerly line of Wall street to the Huron river; thence westerly 132 feet; thence northerly parallel to Wall street to the south line of said lot 12; thence easterly to the place of beginning.

Also lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, block 8; lots 2, 5, 6, 9, 10, 13, 14, 17, 18, 21, 22, 25, and the west 67 and  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet and the north 42 feet of lot 1, block 9; the south 66 feet of lots 1 and 3, block 7, and lots 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 17, 18, 20 and 21, block 6, Brown & Fuller's addition.

Also lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and the north 100 feet of lot 12, block 10, Traver's subdivision.

Also beginning at the northerly corner of lot 21, block 6, Brown & Fuller's addition; thence westerly along the northerly line of lots 21 and 20 to the northerly corner of lot 19 of said block 6; thence northeasterly parallel to Broadway to the westerly line of lot 53, Traver's addition; thence along the westerly line of said lot 53 to Broadway; thence to the place of beginning.

Also beginning at the southwest corner of lot 54, Traver's addition; thence southwesterly parallel to Broadway to the easterly line of lot 12, block 10, Traver's subdivision; thence along the easterly line of lot 12 to Broadway; thence northeasterly along Broadway to the northwest corner of said lot 54; thence to the place of beginning.

Also lots 26 to 67, inclusive, of Traver's addition.

Also beginning at the southeasterly corner of lot 26, Traver's addition; thence northeasterly along Broadway to the east line of No. 1667 Broadway; thence northwesterly at right angles to Broadway 132 feet; thence southwesterly parallel to Broadway to said lot 26; thence to the place of beginning.

Also beginning at the southeast corner of lot 67, Traver's addition; thence northeasterly parallel to Broadway to Cedar Bend avenue; thence northwesterly along Cedar Bend avenue to Broadway; thence southwesterly along Broadway to the northeast corner of said lot 67; thence to the place of beginning.

Also beginning at the southeasterly corner of Broadway and Cedar Bend avenue; thence northeasterly along Broadway to a point opposite the east line of No. 1667; thence southeasterly 132 feet; thence southwesterly parallel to Broadway to Cedar Bend avenue; thence to the place of beginning.

This description is intended to cover all property fronting on Broadway between Swift street and the east line of No. 1667 Broadway and all property on Wall street between the Huron river and Broadway.

Resolved, further, that this order and determination and resolution be and the same is hereby certified to the board of public works and the city assessor respectively.

Sewer Committee Report on Sewer No. 27.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your committee on sewers, to whom was referred the estimate and report of the city engineer relative to the construction of lateral sewer in sewer district No. 27 (Ashley street from Jefferson street to Madison street; Jefferson street from First street to Seventh street; Madison street from Ashley street to Seventh street; First street from Madison street to Mosely street; Second street from William street to Mosely street; Third street from Jefferson street to Mosely street; Fourth street from Jefferson street to Madison street; Fifth street from Jefferson street to Madison street; on Fifth street from lot 2. south R, 3 west to Jefferson street; on First street from William street to Jefferson street; on Sixth street from Jefferson street to Madison street; on Seventh street from Jefferson street to Madison street; and line on private right-of-way over lots 2 and 13, block 4 south, range 3 west;) beg leave to report that they have had such estimate and report as well as the resolution of the council under consideration, and have made due inquiries relating thereto, and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewer, and that a special taxing or assessment district ought to be fixed by the common council upon and against which the construction of such sewer may be charged, street crossings excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your committee further recommend that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said district be prepared by the city engineer, and the board of public works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewer. Bids to be in during February, 1908.
