Dear Sir:—A few matters of considerable importance have been referred to the railway committee of the common council which I wish to call your attention to. For some time past complaints have been made to the various members of the common council relative to the lack of water closet facilities at your waiting room in this city. Upon investigation the committee find upon days when travel is rather extensive women go from your waiting room to the St. James hotel and wait their turn at the stair entrance of the hotel to go to the closet on the second floor, while men passengers are in the habit of visiting the men's closet upon the first floor back of the office. The hotel people object to furnishing closet facilities for passengers waiting at your depot. Inquiry at Woodward's cafe confirm the report that scores of people waiting for cars apply at his place for closet conveniences. Mr. Woodward informs the committee that it is possible for himself, his help and patrons to see men urinating in the day time between the freight and passenger houses in plain view, and women do not hesitate at dusk and in the evening go to the alley. It is said that depot employes visit these places also because of lack of these conveniences. Other business places adjacent to the depot complain of lack of toilet conveniences at the waiting room, causing people to visit their places. It seems to us that this matter should have the attention and action of the company, that complaints may no longer be made.

Another matter of great importance to people in the fast growing section of the city along Packard street is the lack of adequate and frequent service from the eastern city limits to the business portion of the city. Pec-

ple have been lead to invest and build homes along and adjacent to Packard because of the street railway, making it possible to get to their business down town conveniently. When we had regular half hour service our people were quite well satisfied, but with irregular hour service it is almost worse than no service at all. People are lead to wait for cars because of presence of the track and then are finally compelled to walk, when cars fail to appear, after waiting a reasonable time. The people in this section are besieging us to take drastic measures to secure a small car upon Packard street giving at least half hour service, but we deem it best to confer with you relative to the matter and secure your ideas upon the matter and possible action upon your part when your attention is called to the circumstances.

People upon West Huron street, so the committee is informed, are asking for half hour service and if it is possible we should be glad to have their wishes granted.

The council meets next Monday evening, June 1st, and I should like to have a communication before that time from you relative to these matters, which we consider of great importance, and services which we deem we are entitled to.
