Dear Sir—In reply to yours of the 5th inst., I herewith enclose a tabulated statement of the city cases are defense to the the ment of the city cases cared for in the University Hospital for the year ending 1908. I think the members of the council understand that the free beds for city cases are private rooms or special nursing. Some of the cases which have come to us required the cases which have come to us required this care which you will notice was given them. The estimated number of weeks computed by the total cost would equal seventy-five weeks and a fraction. Since last April no city cases have been denied admission to the hospital and we always realesses them when we have room. The enterty of the computer of the welcome them when we have room. In entering into this agreement, I notice the Board of Regents have made it very plain that emergency cases be cared for, and that others be cared for when we have room.

And in no case shall the Poor Commissioner purchase supplies or provisions to exceed ten dollars at any time without consent of Poor Committee, or a major-

ity thereof. No fuel or other supplies amounting to over twenty-five dollars shall be made without submitting the proposed purchase to the Common Council.

Sec. 5. The said Poor Commissioner shall nave power to receive and dispose donations for the relief of the poor, but in his monthly statements to the City Clerk, as hereinafter provided, he shall report in detail all cash donations and the distribution of the same. He may act in conjunction with any society or organization for charitable purposes in the city of Ann Arbor and when permitted shall examine the register of all persons receiving relief from such society or organization.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the said Poor Commissioner, when any person being a city pauper shall, by himself, nerself or another, apply for relief, to personally make immediate inquiry into the state and circumstances of the applicant and if it shall appear that he or she is in Sec. 5. The said Poor Commissioner stall

state and circumstances of the applicant and if it shall appear that he or she is in such indigent circumstances as to require prompt support (and is not so sick, discased, lame or otherwise disabled as he or she can not safely be removed) to remove such person to the Poor House to be iclieved and cared for as his or her necessity may require; but if such person can not safely be removed for any of the reasons hereinbefore specified, the said foor Commissioner may afford such persons relief under the provision of this ordinance until such time as he or she can be so removed and if it shall appear that any person applying for relief as afore aid requires only temporary or partial support the said Poor Commissioner shall afford the said Poor Commissioner shall afford him or her such relief as the circumhim or her such relief as the circumstances of the case may require; such temporary or partial support shall be given in provisions, clothing or fuel to be delivered to such applicant at the place where he or she resides.

Sec. 7. Whenever from sickness or other disability the City Physician shall deem it necessary to place any city pauper in a hospital, he shall do so by removing such pauper to a free bed in one of the university hospitals. Provided, however, that if for any reason, it shall be necessary to place a pauper patient in a private room, than it shall be the duty of the City Physician to place the said patient in a private room in one of the University hospitals, the extra cost to be said by the Poor Commissioner.

In case of refusal or neglect to provide for such pap-ers, the necessary means of comfort and subsistance, as herein required, and any member of the Common Council or Poor Commissioner, shall make such provision, the same shall be recovered by the cit, in the same shall be recovered by the city in an action for debt against any such person so refusing or neglecting. Any violation of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars and costs; and in the imposition of any fine and costs, the court may make a further sentence, that in default of the payment thereof within a time to be fixed by such and costs, the court may make a lurrher sentence, that in default of the payment thereof within a time to be fixed by such sentence, the offender may be imprisoned in the Detroit house of correction or in the county jail for the county of Washtenaw for any period of time not exceeding three months. three months.

Gentlemen—Pursuant to a resolution passed December 21st, 1908, authorizing the members of the Common Council to inspect the water plant of the Ann Arbor Water Company, we beg to report that the undersigned members of the Common Council did inspect the water plant of the Ann Arbor Water Company on December 28th, 1908, and as a result of this inspection, deem it proper to call your attention to the following facts:

1. That sometime during the past summer a large shaft was put in within a short distance of the Huron River at Station No. 1, and from this shaft a new iron pipe was connected with the Huron river. This new iron pipe was put in, so we were informed by the officials of the Ann Arbor Water Company, to provide for emergencies.

2. The different springs at Station No. 1

2. The different springs at Station No. 1, appeared to be well protected, except the spring known as the "gallery."
3. The springs at Station No. 2, appeared to be well protected and in a sanitary con-

dition.

The new arrangements at Station No. 1, would indicate that the Ann Arbor Water Company, could, if so disposed, use large quantities of river water.

We protest against river water being furnished the inhabitants of the City of Ann Arbor for domestic purposes.

We recommend that the Water Committee of the Common Council make a thorough investigation of the conditions at Station No. 1, and report to the council at its earliest convenience.

Gentlemen—The Sanitary Committee, to

whom was referred the matter of garbage collection, report as follows:

We find that part of the garbage is being collected in three Studebaker wagons and the remainder in barrels and numerous other wagons which are not constructed as provided for in the contract. There are numerous persons collecting garbage for their own uses independently of the contractor and without the permission of the card of nealth or any other city au-

thority.

The Board of Health have allowed the garbage to be collected in wagons without covers or with wooden covers or even in barrels in violation of the garbage ordinance and contract.

Furthermore, we find that section rurthermore, we find that section 1 of the garbage ordinance, which provides that a certain kind of vessel shall be furnished by each household for the purpose of keeping garbage until it can be coilected by the contractor or the people in his employ, is being systematically violated.

The committee recommends that the Common council should authorize the Board of Health to enforce the garbage ordinance and contract in every parties We also recommend that the sanitary particular. liceran be given orders to arrest any person or persons found collecting garbage in specified in the garbage ordinance, if found doing so after fifteen days from this date. We further recommend that the carbage ordinance be published in the daily later and that a copy of this ordinance be furnished to every household in the city by the Board of Health.

My understanding of the intent of the ordinance is to provide means for the removal of all garbage within the city, with as little trouble and friction to property holders, and as little annoyance and inconvenience to the public as possible, at the same time to protect the best sanitary or ditions in the city.—

In this, as in all other matters pertaining to the duties of my office, it has been

In this, as in all other matters pertaining to the duties of my office, it has been my policy in so far as was possible and consistent with the public health to avoid litigation. This is because it has seemed to me that better results were obtained, with less trouble and annoyance and a diminished expenditure of the public money.

I wish to take up a few I wish to take up a few of the weak points in the ordinance which we now get along with without difficulty, but which a strictly enforced will lead to unending teacher. trouble:

First—The University Hospital, the Cook house and large boarding houses having large amounts of garbage make individual agreements or contracts with men hav-ing proper wagons to remove their gar-

and said contractors in conlage daily,

Lage daily, and said contractors in consideration therefor remove ashes, tin cans and other waste, the disposal of which is not provided for by the city.

The city contractor has made no protest to me against this arrangement but should the city compel him to take it, ashes, cans, waste paper, etc., will be left to disfigure our alleys, etc.

Sec. 1. Provides that no dishwater or wash water shall go into the garbage cans. The least amount would prevent the con-

The least amount would prevent the contractor from gathering it.

Sec. 4. Provides that every occupant of a dwelling house, boarding house, hotel, restaurant and place of business of any kind having garbage to be disposed of, shall provide and at all times keep within such building, or on the lot on which such building is situated, suitable and sufficient vessel or vessels having a capacity not exceeding twenty gallons, with bails and handles and with close fitting covers thereto, for receiving and holding, withthereto, for receiving and holding, without leakage or odors all the garbage that may be accumulated between the times of the collection thereof as the same shall be fixed by the common council. Such vessels shall be filled only to within four usches of the top, and shall be placed in such places as shall be readily accessible at all times for purpose of removing or at all times for purpose of removing or emptying the same (upon the line of an alley whenever possible or convenient,) and where said vessels shall not be a nubic nuisance in any respect, or be placed in the limits of any street or alley.

Sec. 5. Provides that nothing but gar-

bage shall be placed in such vessels.

Sec. 14. Any person guilty of any of the acts forbidden by this ordinance, or throwing poisonous substances or broken glass into garbage or failing to perform any of the duties im-posed herein, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules of the board of health in reference to the same, shall, upon conviction, be fined in such sum as the court may deter-mine, not exceeding one hundred dollars and in case of default in the payment of such fine the court may make a further sentence that the offender may be imprisoned in the county jail of Washtenaw county, or any jail or lockup of said city until such fine and costs be raid. Provident ed, such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days.

From these brief extracts it is apparent that—First, all people having carbage to dispose of, must dispose of it through the contractor. Second they must provide proper cans. Third they bage to dispose of, must dispose of it through the contractor. Second they must provide proper cans. Third they can throw nothing in such cans but gar-lage. Fourth, these cans must never be filled above a line four inches from top. Fifth, all cans must be easily accessible. Sixth. A single violation of any of these provisions renders violators amenable to rovisions renders violators amenable the law. Having a considerable experience with the situation. I am of the opinion that technically there is no one in Ann Arbor having garbage who has not violated at some time some of the provisions of this ordinance.

As to the complaints regarding the kind of wagons now in use, generally speaking, they are unfounded.

The contract is as follows: "It is specified by this board that all boxes in which garbage shall be conveyed from the city, must be of galvanized iron or of other suitable metalic construction, and water tight. Such conveyance to be provided with a metal cover, and must remain closed at all times while within the limits of this city event when receiving care of this city, except when receiving gar-

The specification covers the old form of

wagon.

wagon.

Later the contract contains the following: "Said party of the second part agrees to purchase and use in disposing of garbage three new Studebaker Sanitary Garbage Wagons, and at the expiration of said contract the said wagons are to be delivered to and become the property of the city of Ann Arbor."

This however does not stipulate that no other wagons shall be used, nor can any such interpretation be read into the contract.

As a matter of fact, these three wagons are quite inadequate to the present needs

of the city.

There is no doubt that leaking wagons, There is no doubt that leaking wagons, over full wagons, uncovered wagons, or barrels, etc., are contrary to the law, and I should never knowingly allow the use of any such. It would appear that any city official seeing such a gross violation should personally make complaint and appear as a witness against the offender. There is no question or difference of opinion here ion here.

on here.

But gentlemen, if garbage accumulates, if it be collected in a barrel, or a can is over full, by the terms of the ordinance the contractor need not take it, and no one else is allowed to do so, and we are between the Devil and the deep sea. A situation presents itself where a choice of two evils is unavoidable.

As I understand if there has been no

As I understand it, there has been no complaint from the sanitary committee that the collection of garbage is not being attended to, or that the public health

is in any way menaced.

The whole question of the disposat of garbage is a difficult one. It is more of an annoyance to me than to anyone else and I am satisfied that for the present conditions would be better left undisturbed. The problem is by no means solved, but it cannot be further improved upon un-

are cannot be further improved upon under the present ordinance and contract.

There are complaints, just complaints, too, but less than formerly. There always will be complaints under any system. I am fully in accord with the Sanitary Committee in their recommendation that copies of the Garbage Ordinance be printed and generally distributed.

ed and generally distributed. Undoubtedly, a more general knowledge of the provisions of the ordinance is most

desirable.

But a strict enforcement of all these provisions will be disastrous, and I maintain that the contractor should have discretionary power to remove any and all garbage, if he be willing to do 30, while householders should be exempted from the of Health should be allowed to use some indgment as to the wisdom of prosecuting all technical violations.

The Council has ordered a new cuivert on Murray avenue, and I would also recommend that a cement walk be constructed on both sides of the Michigan Central railroad bridge, as the old plank are getting decayed. I would also recommend that 120 sidewalk inlets be built of cement where the old plank are getting decayed. There will also be needed about 1200 loads of gravel on the streets, during the coming season: likewise a new ce-1 200 loads of gravel on the streets, during the coming season; likewise a new cement mixer and one more new dump wagen will be required. As the D. U. R. have been raising their tracks without permission and in many cases I find that it will be necessary to relay the entire crosswalk, I would respectfully suggest that the Board of Public Works compel them to either put these walks in the same condition that they were or lower their tracks to the original grade.
