Water Committee.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your committee to whom was referred the question of sprinkling rates, recommends that the following agreement with the Ann Arbor Water company be adopted:

For water for sprinkling purposes, the Ann Arbor Water company may charge five dollars per annum. The sprinkling season shall extend from April 1st to Oct. 21st, in each year, and all persons paying sprinkling rates shall be entitled to the use of one stream of water, through a three-sixteenth inch nozzle, or other attachment discharging an equal quantity of water, two and one-half hours each day during the sprinkling season. The sprinkling hours to be as follows: East of State street from 7 to 8 a. m. and from 5 to 6:30 p. m.; west of State street from 7 to 8 a. m. and from 6 to 7:30 p. m. No sprinkling shall be done during the time of fire.

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Ann Arbor, Michigan:

Gentlemen:—At the request of Mr. Wirt Cornwell, chairman of the Special Committee, to which was referred our original petition, dated January 9th, 1909, we are submitting herewith a new petition which embodies the changes suggested by your committee and the concessions which have been requested by your committee of this company, and which concessions are hereby granted by this company.

Following the general form of our previous communication of January 9th, 1909, we hereby request permission of your honorable body to set poles for the purpose of extending our aerial lines or telephone wires in the following streets and alleys of your city, to-wit:

On the north side of Moore street between Broadway and Pontiac streets; on the south side of Broadway from Depot street to Wall street; on the south side of Depot street from N. Main street to N. Fourth avenue; on the east side of N. Fourth avenue from Depot street to Catherine street; in the alley between N. Fourth avenue and N. Main street, from Catherine street to Kingsley street; on the south side of Detroit street from Kingsley street north, three poles; on the north side of N. Ashley street from Ann street to Catherine street; on the west side of Spring street from Miller avenue, north, four poles; on the west side of Spring street from Felch street north four poles; on the south side of Hiscock street from Spring street to Fountain street; on the east side of Fountain street from Miller avenue north three poles; on the west side of Miner street from Felch street to 400 ft. north of W. Summit street; on the south side of Felch street from Gott street to Miner street; on the east side of Miner street from Felch street to Pearl street; on the south side of Kingsley street from N. State street to N. Ingalls street; on the south side of Lawrence street from N. State street to N. In-

galls street; on the north side of Catherine street from N. Thayer street east two poles; on the north side of Ann street from Thirteenth street east six poles; on the south side of Huron street from N. Ingalls street to Observatory street; on the south side of Ann street from N. State street to N. Thayer street; on the south side of Huron street from N. State street to N. Thayer street; on the north side of W. Huron street from Chapin street to Ninth street; on the north side of Liberty street from Seventh street to city limits; on the east side of Sixth street from W. Jefferson street, south 400 feet; on the south side of W. Jefferson street from Fifth street to Sixth street; on the east side of Fifth street from Jefferson street south 600 feet; on the east side of Fourth street, from W. Jefferson street to Madison street; on the east side of Third street from W. Jefferson street south three poles; on the west side of Second street from William street to Madison street; on the south side of Madison street from S. Ashley street to Fourth street; on the east side of S. Main street from Madison street to Phillips street; on the west side of S. Fifth avenue from Madison street north three poles; on the north side of Monroe street, from Packard street to S. State street; in the alley north of Benjamin street west of Packard street one pole; in the alley south of Benjamin street, west of South State street one pole; on the south side of Arbor street from Packard street to Oakland avenue; on the northeast side of Packard street from Arch street to city limits; on the south side of Dewey avenue from Packard street west six poles; on the northeast side of Washtenaw avenue from Geddes avenue to Israel avenue; on the north side of S. University avenue from Washtenaw avenue to Forest avenue; on the east side of Forest avenue from S. University avenue south two poles; on the east side of Forest avenue from Hill street north four poles; on the west side of Forest avenue from Hill street south to the alley south of Hill street; in the alley east of Olivia avenue from the alley south of Hill street south to end of alley; on the south side of Myrtle street from Oxford street east four poles; on the north side of Vinewood boulevard from Washtenaw avenue east ten poles; on the south side of E. University avenue from Packard street northeast three poles; on the south side of Moseley street from S. Main street to First street; on the north side of Wells street from Forest

avenue southwest three poles; on the east side of Olivia avenue from Hill street to alley south of Hill street.

In addition to the above it is desired to set poles in several locations to shorten spans in present pole leads and to replace ineffective poles. As these are all in existing pole lines, they have not been enumerated in the above list of poles in new locations.

On account of the above permission being granted, this company hereby agrees to furnish 25 free telephones to the city of Ann Arbor, such free telephones to be located as may be directed by the common council. All over and above the 25 free telephones are to be paid for by the city at the standard rates prevailing in the city.

We have also agreed with your special committee to place our plant underground instead of upon poles, as was originally contemplated in this petition, on Washtenaw avenue from Geddes avenue to Israel, it being understood that we are to use only such poles as are necessary for proper distribution along this street.

We have further agreed with your committee to place our line on Monroe street underground from Packard street to State street, and to use only such poles that may be necessary for proper distribution.

We have also agreed with your committee that on W. Huron street we will endeavor to secure permission from the Washtenaw Electric Light company to place our wires on the poles of that company, said permission to be sought for by our Mr. Boyce in company with the chairman of your special committee, Mr. Wirt Cornwell. It is, however, understood that in case it is impossible to secure such permission from the Electric Light company, then we are to erect poles on West Huron street, and to use cable distribution on those poles.

We believe this covers the points discussed and agreed upon with your committee, and we wish to commend the committee for its courtesy in this discussion. Trusting that the amended petition will now be satisfactory and receive favorable consideration from your honorable body, we are,
