### COMMUNICATIONS.

#### From the Mayor.

April 7th, 1910.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The question of laying the dust in our streets, is one that should receive immediate attention. The annoying and disagreeable feature of dust the damage to property as well as the unsanitary feature call for a remedy, and I believe we should do something that will not only remove the disagreeable dust feature, but will at the same time protect the road surface from disintegrating. In order to determine what is the best and most economical way to prevent this dust nuisance, it may be wise to make a test of some of the preparations now being used for this purpose. Calcium Chloride is highly recommended as a preparation for laying the dust, and I would recommend that the City Engineer be authorized to purchase two tons of Calcium Chloride to be used on Packard street abutting the city property. We can make a very satisfactory test of this preparation at that place, where both automobiles and street cars travel, at a small expense, and if it proves satisfactory it can be used on other streets.

Another point I wish to speak of and that is the duty of the Street Railway Company to assist in laying the dust on West Huron street and Packard street. It seems to me that the Street Railway Company should be compelled to lay the dust on its portion of those streets. I have taken the matter up with the railway officials and as soon as I hear from them I shall communicate the facts to you, so that you may be able to take such action as will bring immediate and effective results.

#### From Park Commission.

Ann Arbor, Mich., April 7th, 1910.  
To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:—At a meeting of the Park Board held April 6th the ordinance relative to Curbs and Gutters, which is now before you for its third reading, was given careful consideration. It was unanimously resolved that the council be urged not to pass this ordinance.

We feel that one of the most desirable features in an ordinance providing for Curbs and Gutters is a means of absolutely establishing uniformity. Under the proposed ordinance each property owner is allowed to build his own curb when he pleases and if permission is obtained from the Board of Public Works, the height and material of construction may be changed. The grade for each section of curbing so built is to be given by the City engineer separately. This is practically the same procedure as that by which sidewalks have been built and you all know how much uniformity in grade and material was obtained. We feel that the only way by which desirable ends can be obtained is by an ordinance patterned exactly after either the paving or sewer ordinances and we strongly urge the immediate passage of an ordinance of this kind.

**Ordinance Committee.**

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordi-  
 nance entitled, "An ordinance rela-  
 tive to junk shops" for its third read-  
 ing as follows:

An Ordinance Relative to Junk Shops.

The common council of the City of  
 Ann Arbor ordain: Sec. 1. No person  
 shall use, exercise or carry on the  
 business of keeper of a junk shop or  
 what is commonly called a junk shop  
 for the purchase and sale of junk,  
 rags, old rope, paper, bagging, old  
 iron, brass, copper, tin, empty bottles,  
 slush or lead; nor draw or drive or  
 procure to be drawn or driven through  
 the streets or alleys of this city any  
 wagon, handcart, wheelbarrow or oth-  
 er vehicle for the purpose of collect-  
 ing or disposing of said articles, with-  
 out a license from the mayor, as here-  
 inafter provided.

Sec. 2. The mayor is hereby author-  
 ized to grant a license to any person



of good character, being a resident and citizen of the City of Ann Arbor, to keep what is called a junk shop for the purchase and sale of junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, and rags, slush, empty bottles, paper and bagging, on his paying into the city treasury the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars, and executing a bond to the city of Ann Arbor of the penal sum of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, with one or more sureties, to be approved by the mayor, conditioned that he will faithfully observe the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. The mayor is hereby authorized to grant a license to any person of good character, being a resident and citizen of the City of Ann Arbor, to engage in the business of buying and selling junk with a cart, wagon, or other vehicle or by another means on his paying into the city treasury the sum of twelve (\$12.00) dollars, and every person receiving such license shall have the number of his license placed in a conspicuous place on each side of the said vehicle by means of two tin labels, containing such number and securely fastened to such vehicle so that they can be easily and plainly seen. Such tin labels shall be furnished by the city clerk and shall be of suitable design and pattern, which design shall be changed on the first day of June on each and every year for the use of the succeeding year.

Sec. 4. No keeper of any junk shop shall receive in the line of his business any article by way of pledge or pawn, nor shall he or she loan or advance any sum of money on the security of any article or thing.

Sec. 5. Every person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance to keep a junk shop, shall, on demand, exhibit all goods bought or received by him or her and give the description of the person selling the same, to the mayor, the Ann Arbor police department or officers detailed for that purpose, and shall keep a book containing the list of all persons of whom they purchased goods. Any person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance who shall fail, on demand, to exhibit such goods and give the description of the persons selling them, shall be liable to the penalties imposed by this ordinance.

Sec. 6. No person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall sell or remove from his place of business any articles purchased by him until the same shall have been in his possession at least 72 hours.

Sec. 7. No person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall purchase anything whatsoever from any person who is at the time intoxicated, or from an habitual drunkard or from any person known by him to be a thief or an associate of thieves or a receiver of stolen property or

from any person he has reason to suspect of being such.

Sec. 8. Any violation or failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars and costs and the offender may be sentenced to be imprisoned in default thereof, in the Washtenaw county jail or the Detroit house of correction for a period not to exceed 90 days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration of ten days from the legal publication thereof.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed as follows. Yeas, Ald. Georg, Stark Murray, Hochrein, Sweet, Staffan, Pipp, Sherk, Manwaring, Smith, Blauch, Lutz, Paton, Pres. Mills, 14. Nays none.

Ald. Manwaring presented for its third reading an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance relative to curbing and gutters," as follows:

#### **An Ordinance Relative To Curbing and Gutters.**

The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. All curbing and gutters hereafter constructed in the city of Ann Arbor shall be of artificial stone, or of similar material approved by the Board of Public Works.

All curbing hereafter constructed shall be of a uniform height of six inches, and all gutters of the uniform width of twenty-four inches. Provided, that upon application of property owners, or their agents or representatives, desiring to construct curbing or gutters of a greater height or width than as above provided, the Board of Public Works may, in cases where the City engineer shall deem it necessary on account of water or for other reasons satisfactory to said board, grant permits allowing the construction of such curbing to a height greater than six inches, and gutters to a width greater than 24 inches.

Sec. 2. Curbing and gutters shall in all cases conform to the established grade of the street. At the intersection of streets and alleys the curbing shall be built on a line parallel with the center line of the street, and at such distance from said center line as will permit a width of thirty-four feet from curb to curb for the purpose of public travel. The portions of the street between the curbing and the sidewalk shall be lawn extension. Provided, however, that the common council may by resolution, reduce the width of said travelled portion of the street to thirty feet from curb to curb.

Sec. 3. Any property owner, agent or representative, desiring to construct a curb or gutter or both, shall first make application to the Board of Public Works for a permit, and on receiving such application, it shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works

to grant such applicant a permit, and to order the City engineer to give to said applicant the grade, and such information as may be necessary to enable the said applicant to comply with the provisions of this ordinance. No property owner, his agent or representative, or any contractor, builder, laborer, or any other person shall hereafter construct or put in curbing or gutter or both, in the city of Ann Arbor without first having received a written permit from the Board of Public Works.

Sec. 4. Any owner, agent or representative, contractor, builder, laborer, or any other person, violating the provisions of this ordinance, shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine not to exceed fifty dollars, and the costs of prosecution and in the imposition of any such fine and costs, the court may make the further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the County jail, or other place of imprisonment provided by the City of Ann Arbor, until the payment thereof, provided, that the term of any such imprisonment shall not exceed a period of thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

Moved by Ald. Paton, that the matter be laid over to next meeting. Adopted.

#### Sidewalk Committee.

Your committee on sidewalks report that they have had the petition of Luse S. Garvin, filed Sept. 20, 1909, claiming damages by filling for sidewalk grade in front of lots 84 and 86, Jewett's addition to the city of Ann Arbor, under consideration, being advised by the city attorney in said matter and recommend that said petition be not granted and said claim disallowed.

That the following sidewalks be repaired:

In front of Reighard's property on Lincoln avenue, and lot adjoining same on south; in front of marble works on E. Ann st.; in front of No.

519 W. Washington st.; in front of Caspary lot, corner of Ann st. and Fourth av.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners, Gentlemen: I herewith submit the 21st annual report of fire department, April 1st, 1909 to March 31st, 1910.

**APPARATUS IN SERVICE.**

Station 1—Engine Co. One steam fire engine, complete with heater, tools, etc., as my report to the city clerk Feb. 1st, 1910 will show; 2 horses.

Station No. 1—Hose Co. No. 1. Hose wagon 1,000 feet 22-inch cotton rubber lined hose; 2 3-gallon fire extinguishers, complete with tools, pipes, etc.; 2 horses.

Recommendations—

We have 3 hose wagons; I would recommend they be changed from horse drawn to motor power. I have expense account from several cities having motor-driven apparatus: I n-

sing, Mich., 3 pieces, \$13.18 per month; Youngstown, O., 2 pieces, \$12.50 per month; Morristown, N. J., 1 auto engine, \$10.00 per month; Springfield, O., 1 auto engine, \$2.60 per month. It cost us about \$1,500 for care of horses, harness, wagons, lumber, etc., etc. I am positive the cost for running machine would not exceed \$50.00 per year. We need new quarters in Sixth ward. One-half expense of building would be saved, we could reach the outskirts in less than half the time and put out 50 per cent of fires with chemicals. Just as soon as we have motors, in place of horses, we will save at least \$2,000 a year.

In closing, I wish to extend my thanks to his honor the mayor, the fire commissioners, council and other city officials for the courtesies shown during past year to members of department and myself.
