Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Manwaring presented for its third reading an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to amend an ordinance relative to Parks, Boulevards and Lawn Extensions within the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan," as follows: An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Parks, Boulevards and Lawn Extensions Within the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan," passed October 7th, 1907; approved October 16th, 1907. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:
 Section 1. That sections 25 and 26 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Parks, Boulevards and Lawn Extensions within the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, passed October 7th, 1907; approved October 16th,

1907, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 25 The driveways of the parks known as "Cedar Bend Park" and "The Glen" and Cedar Bend Avenue" are hereby set aside for the exclusive use of horses and light carriages between the hours of 12 o'clock, noon, and 6 o'clock a. m.

Section 26. No person or persons shall drive or propel any automobile or any other motor vehicle on the driveways of either of the parks known as "Cedar Bend Park," except from Wall st. to the north end of the island; or "The Glen" or on "Cedar Bend Avenue," except between the hours of 6 o'clock a. m. and 12 o'clock, noon, during which time such automobiles and other motor vehicles are given exclusive use of said driveways, provided, however, that in using "Cedar Bend Avenue" they may go in either direction from Broadway to the "turn around" at the top of the hill, which "turn around" shall be indicated by a suitable signboard; 2nd, that in using "Riverside Drive" they may enter from "Cedar Bend Avenue" and continue down hill; 3rd, that in using the driveways of "The Glen," they may enter either from Observatory st. or from Geddes av. and continue down hill to the east end of Fuller st. Provided, further, that no person shall operate a motor vehicle upon any of the driveways of the above mentioned parks at a rate of speed greater than six miles an hour, and that upon approaching an intersecting highway, bridge, sharp curve or steep descent, a person operating a motor vehicle shall have it under control and operate it in such a manner as is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic then on such highway and the safety of the public.

The restriction in sections 25 and 26 shall not apply to pedestrians or to teams in the employ of the city or university.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed as follows: Yeas, Ald. Stark, O'Connor, Hochrein, Murray, Staffan, Sweet, Flynn, Pipp, Manwaring, Sherk, Blaich, Goodyear, Paton, Lutz, Pres. Mills,—15. Nays—none.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance relative to curbing and gutters", which was given its third reading as follows:

An Ordinance Relative To Curbing and Gutters.

The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. All curbing and gutters hereafter constructed in the City of Ann Arbor shall be of artificial stone, and all curbing shall be of a uniform height of six inches, and all gutters of the uniform width of twenty-four inches, exclusive of curb. Provided, that the Board of Public Works or clerk thereof may, in cases where the City Engineer shall deem it necessary on account of water or for other reasons satisfactory to said Board, grant permits allowing the construction of such curbing to a height greater than six inches, and gutters to a width greater than twenty-four inches, exclusive of curb.

Sec. 2. Curbing and gutters shall in all cases conform to the established grade of the street. At the intersection of streets and alleys the curbing shall be built on a line parallel with the center line of the street, and at such distance from said center line as will permit a width of thirty-four feet from curb to curb for the purpose of public travel. The portions of the street between the curbing and the sidewalk shall be lawn extension. Provided, however, that the common council may by resolution, reduce the width of said travelled portion of the street to thirty feet from curb to curb.

Sec. 3. Any property owner, agent or representative, desiring to construct a curb or gutter or both, shall first make application to the Board of Public Works or clerk thereof, for a permit, and on receiving such application, it shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works or clerk thereof to grant such applicant a permit, and to order the city engineer to give to said applicant the grade, and such information as may be necessary to enable the said applicant to comply with the provisions of this ordinance. No property owner, his agent or representative, or any contractor, builder, laborer, or any other person shall hereafter construct or put in curbing or gutter or both, in the city of Ann Arbor without first having received a written permit from the Board of Public Works, or clerk thereof.

Sec. 4. Any owner, agent or representative, contractor, builder, laborer, or any other person, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine not to exceed fifty dollars, and the costs of prosecution, and in the imposition of any such fine and costs, the

court may make the further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the County jail, or other place of imprisonment provided by the City of Ann Arbor, until the payment thereof, provided, that the term of any such imprisonment shall not exceed a period of thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Ald. Manwaring moved that the foregoing ordinance be referred to the Ordinance committee. Adopted.

Sherk: Resolved, that the matter of Sewer District No. 41 on Felch st. from Brooks to Ashley st., on Hiscock st. from Brooks to Spring st., on Summit st. from Brooks to Spring st., on Cherry st. from Fountain to Spring st., on Fountain st. from Miller av. to Summit st., on Miner st. from Felch to Pearl st., on Gott st. from Miller av. to Pearl st., on Brooks st. from Miller av. to Pearl st., on Chapin st. from Huron st. to Miller av.) including the report of the City Engineer thereon, be referred to the sewer committee, and that said committee meet in th rooms of the Board of Public Works, at a time to be fixed by the chairman of said committee, for the purpose of making due inquiry relating to said sewer district, and, after hearing all persons interested therein desiring to be heard, said committee report to the council at the next regular meeting.

Resolved, further, that the sewer committee also arrange to hear all those interested in the construction of Sanitary Sewers No. 36 (on Summit st. from Beakes st. to Fifth av. and on Fifth av. from Depot st. to 450 feet south of Summit st.) and No. 40 (on N. Ashley st. from Kingsley st. to Ann st.) at same meeting that matter of Sewer No. 41 is considered.

Proposed Charter Amendment.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that section 186 of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor, as amended May 10, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 186. No bond, note or other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer, as hereinafter provided, and also except bonds for sewerage and paving purposes and curb and gutters, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity, where-by the said city shall become obligated to pay any money, unless the same shall have been duly authorized by resolution of the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor by a two-

thirds vote of the members elect, and shall have been submitted to and voted for by three-fifths of the electors of said city voting thereon, in conformity to this act; but the Common Council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class of orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to the purpose for which it shall be drawn. The treasurer shall pay out no money except upon the written warrant of the mayor and city clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid: Provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasurer of school district number one of the City of Ann Arbor upon the warrant of the president and secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members elect authorize the issuing of bonds to the amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city and for the construction of curbs and gutters, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out this provision may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.
