COMMUNICATIONS.

From Board of Regents.

Ann Arbor Mich., July 21, 1910.

Mr. Ross Granger, City Clerk, Ann Arbor, Mich.: My Dear Mr. Granger --I beg to give you formal notice that at the meeting of the Regents, held June 28, the committee, composed of Regent Clements and Regent Beal, reported the following as their judgment of a fair settlement of certain questions of issue between the University and the city, and this basis of settlement was approved by the Regents:

1. That the University should agree to the city's claim for \$569.35, one-half the cost of the sewer constructed upon State st. and along the line of the Athletic field.

2. Under all the circumstances, with which you are familiar, the committee recommended that the Regents should not agree to the claim of the city for \$188.10, on the Catherine st. sewer.

3. The committee recommended the allowance of the claim of \$58.25 for the construction of a sidewalk in front of University property, on Geddes av.

4. The committee recommended that the University should pay its just proportion of the cost of the proposed pavements on the frontage of the University property on 12th st. and on North University av., in front of the Homoeopathic hospital.

In connection with the above sewer claims, it was the opinion of the committee, approved by the Board, that a final agreement in writing should be made with the city of Ann Arbor, that no claims should be made against the University in the future, for connection of sewers in any other localities, even if such sewers had not been partially paid for by the University.

Upon the completion and signature of such agreement in proper form, we shall be pleased to audit and pay the claims of \$569.35 and \$58.25, whenever presented.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that the proposed charter amendment, authorizing the city of Ann Arbor to issue bonds for any public purpose, be taken from the table. Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Stark, Murray, Flynn, Pipp, Manwaring, Sherk, Goodyear, Paton, Lutz, Pres. Mills, 10. Nays, none.

Proposed Charter Amendment.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that section 186, of the charter of the city of Ann Arbor, as amended May 10, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 186. No bond, note or other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer, as hereinafter provided, and also except bonds for sewerage and paving purposes and curb and gutters, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity, whereby the said city shall become obligated to pay any money, unless the same shall have been duly authorized by resolution of the common council of the city of Ann Arbor by a two-thirds vote of the members elect, and shall have been submitted to and voted for by three-fifths of the electors of said city voting thereon, in conformity to this

act; but the common council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class of orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the common council to the purpose for which it shall be drawn. The treasurer shall pay out no money except upon the written warrant of the mayor and city clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid: Provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasurer of school district number one, of the city of Ann Arbor, upon the warrant of the president and secretary of said board. The common council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the issuing of bonds, to the amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city and for the construction of curbs and gutters, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, and the common council for the purpose of carrying out this provision may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.

Street Committee.

Street Sprinkling District No. 10.

By Ald. Sherk: Resolved, that the common council of the city of Ann Arbor do declare that they deem it necessary that East Huron st. from Fourth av. to Twelfth st., East Washington st. from Fourth av. to Twelfth

st., East Liberty st. from Fourth av. to South State st., East William st. from Fourth av. to South State st., South Fourth av. from Huron st. to William st., Fifth av. from Huron st. to William st., South Division st. from Huron st. to William st., Thompson st. from Liberty st. to William st., Maynard st. from Liberty st. to William st., South State st. from Huron st. to William st., South Thayer st. from Huron st. to North University av., South Ingalls st. from Huron st. to North University av., South Twelfth st. from Huron st. to North University av., and North University av. from South State st. to South Twelfth st. should be wet down or sprinkled to the end that the health and comfort of the people may thereby be conserved, therefore

Resolved, that under the provisions of an ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Street Sprinkling and Providing a Method of Raising by Taxation the Money to Pay the Costs and Expenses therefor," passed July 17, 1899, the common council hereby determines that upon the petition of a majority of the foot frontage owners of taxable land on the said above mentioned streets, the said streets shall be sprinkled and wet down, and the costs and expenses thereof, less the proportion that nine feet in width for the length of the track of the city railway bears to the width of the streets sprinkled from curb to curb for the length of the streets so sprinkled, which proportion shall be paid by the Detroit, Jackson and Chicago Railway, and less the cost of the street intersections, which shall be paid out of the street fund, shall be assessed and taxed to the owners of the land benefited thereby.

Resolved, that the lands abutting on East Huron st. from Fourth av. to Twelfth st., on East Washington st. from Fourth av. to Twelfth st., on East Liberty st. from Fourth av. to South State st., on East William st. from South Fourth av. to South State st., on South Fourth av. from Huron st. to William st., on South Fifth av. from Huron st. to William st., on South Division st. from Huron st. to William st., on Thompson st. from Liberty st. to William st., on Maynard st. from E. Liberty st. to William st., on South State st. from Huron st. to William st., on South Thayer st. from Huron st. to North University av., on South Ingalls st. from Huron st. to North University av., on Twelfth st. from Huron st. to North University

av., and on North University av. from South State st. to Twelfth st. are hereby set aside as a special assessment district to be known as Street Sprinkling District No. 10.

Resolved, further, that each and all of the lands, tenements and premises hereinafter mentioned are deemed and declared to be benefited by such street sprinkling to the extent of the cost thereof and all such lands shall constitute and all of the lands hereinafter mentioned are fixed and determined as the district and the special assessment district upon and against which shall be charged and assessed all the costs and expenses of such street sprinkling save that which is to be paid by the street railway running through said district and save the cost of sprinkling the street intersections. That is to say: All that part of the city of Ann Arbor and all of the lands, tenements and premises situated in the city of Ann Arbor, state of Michigan, known and bounded and described as follows, to-wit: Blocks 1, 2 and 3 S. R. 5 east; blocks 1, 2 and 3 S. R. 6 east; lots 1 to 9 inclusive Cornish addition; part of section 29 bounded N. by East Huron st., E. by S. State st., S. by E. Washington st. and W. by Cornish addition; block 2 S. R. 7 E., Kingsley and Morgan's addition; block 2 S. R. 8 E., Danforth and Wilson's addition; blocks 2 and 3 S. R. 9 E., Ann Arbor Land Co.'s addition; block 3 S. R. 7 E., Ann Arbor Land Co.'s addition; block 3 S. R. 8 E., Ann Arbor Land Co.'s addition; lot 1 and the E. 62 ft. of lots 7 and 8 B. 1 S. R. 4 E.; the E. 20 ft. of lot 5, the E. 60 1-2 ft. of the S. 22 ft. of lot 6, the N. 44 ft. of lot 6, the S. 44 ft. of lot 7, the E. 77 ft. of the N. 22 ft. of lot 7 and the E. 20 ft. of lot 8, all in B. 2 S. R. 4 E.; lots 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and the E. 62 ft. of lot 16 B. 3 S. R. 4 E.; lots 1 and 16 and the N. 33 ft. of lot 2 B. 4 S.
