W. Huron St. Pavement.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—The undersigned, owners of property on West Huron st., between Ashley st. and the intersection of Dexter av. and Jackson av.; hereby petition your Honorable Body to cause Huron st. to be graded and paved from the west line of Ashley st. to the intersection of Dexter and Jackson av. This petition is signed with the understanding that the city pay 20 per cent of such pavement. We respectfully recommend pavement similar to that on Maynard st., and that the city do the work if possible. We ask that the Common Council use every effort to have as many poles and wires removed from street as is possible under the charter and ordinances of the city.

By Ald. Lutz: Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of West Huron st. from Ashley st. to the intersection of Dexter and Jackson avs., within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of that part of Huron st., within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore

Resolved, and it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause Huron st., within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and twenty per cent of the remainder shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Huron st., within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works, with directions to report to the Council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said pro-

posed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvement.

Sewer Committee.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your committee on sewers, to whom was referred the estimate and report of the City Engineer, relative to the construction of lateral sewers in Sewer Districts Nos.

42 and 43, beg leave to report that we have had such estimate and report, as well as the resolution of the Council, under consideration; and have made due inquiries relating thereto, and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewers, and that special taxing or assessment districts ought to be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of such sewers may be charged, street crossings excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the City Engineer, and the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewers.

Main st. from Summit st. to the Ann Arbor railroad crossing) and No. 43 (on Fourth av. between Summit and Beakes sts.) the construction of the same is hereby ordered.

Resolved, further, that the City Engineer furnish proper boundaries by the next regular meeting of the Council and that this order and determination be certified to the City Assessor and the Board of Public Works, and the Board of Public Works advertise for bids for the construction of said sewers, city to furnish man to cement joints and see that sewer pipe is properly laid.

Lighting Committee.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Lighting committee recommends the placing of an electric arc light on corner of S. Division and Jefferson sts. in place of Tungsten light, in middle of block on Division st. between Jefferson and Packard sts., and also on corner of

Jefferson and S. Division sts.; and one of said Tungsten lights be placed on the corner of Moore and Traver sts., and Tungsten light on southeast corner of Cedar Bend av. and Broadway.

Street Committee.

To the Hon. the Common Council of Ann Arbor.—Your street committee, to whom was referred the request of people on Pontiac and other streets that Pontiac street be graded from Cedar to Swift streets, respectfully report that we have examined the matter carefully, and in our opinion the traffic is not sufficient to warrant grading said street to full width and besides to do so would necessitate moving the old engine house which stands in the middle of said street. But the people on Pontiac and other streets in that direction are very desirous of having a sidewalk graded in said street from Cedar st. to Swift st., and your committee believe they are entitled to that, and that a sidewalk eight feet wide along the westerly side of said street from Cedar st. to Swift st. should be graded, and that the Engineer should at once establish and stake out the grade for such walk.

We further report that Wm. Grennan, sr., offered to your committee, when we were on the ground, to grade such walk without expense to the city, provided he could have the dirt and gravel which it would be necessary to remove in such grading to be used in filling a hole on his land adjoining.

We therefore recommend that the offer of said Grennan be accepted provided that such work shall be done under the supervision of the City Engineer and be done under a written contract to be drawn by the City Attorney, and to be finished not later than the first day of July next.

We further recommend that should said Grennan not enter into such contract and do such work that the same be done by the Street commissioner, he to use the dirt and gravel where needed.
