By Ald. Pipp: Whereas, this common council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of Church street between Washtenaw avenue and Prospect street within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of that part of Church street, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement, therefore

Resolved, and it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the common council to cause Church street, within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor, and

in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and twenty per cent of the remainder shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Church street, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works with directions to report to the council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefore, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvement.

Resolved further, that the city clerk notify all telephone and telegraph companies operating overhead wires on the proposed streets where pavement is to be laid, to place said wires underground.

Gentlemen: Your committee, to whom the following matters have been referred, respectfully reports and recommends that a sanitary sewer be constructed on Creek street, commencing at a point 150 feet south of Packard street to Thayer street; and also on Olivia avenue, commencing at a point 140 feet north of Wells street and ending at the north line of Wood and Brooks' subdivision, and on Minerva road between Olivia and Forest avenues.

Your committee further recommends that a storm water sewer be constructed on Church street from Roosevelt avenue to Geddes avenue. I. L. Sherk, Wm. Goodyear, Geo. Lutz, C. J. Sweet, Sewer Committee.

Engineer's Report on Fuller St. Bridge

Ann Arbor, Mich., April 14th, 1911.
 Hon. Common Council, City:

Gentlemen: I herewith transmit to your honorable body a report on the Fuller street bridge prepared by Mr. C. J. Tilden, at my request, and recommend that the suggestions therein contained be complied with.

My Dear Mr. Groves: I beg to

submit herewith in accordance with your request of March 23, a brief report of the condition of the Fuller street bridge, as I found it last summer.

I made a careful survey and examination of the bridge at the bridge site on August 5 and 12, 1910, and later, at my office, made strain sheets and computations to determine if any part of the structure was subject to undue stress. In making this critical study I used the following loads:

(1) The total dead load of the structure, as determined from actual measurements.

(2) An assumed live load of one hundred pounds per square foot over the entire roadway, assumed 17 feet wide.

The results of this study are shown on the accompanying drawing. It is seen that the stresses as thus determined all fall within values which are generally considered safe. It would be well, however, to clean thoroughly all the ironwork of the bridge and give it one or two coats of paint.

The highest unit stress appears in the stringers of the floor system, these being 6 inch I-beams, weighing about 12 1-4 pounds per foot. These beams also appeared to be in need of painting, as they have rusted somewhat in their exposed position. I should recommend, therefore, that this portion of the ridge be thoroughly overhauled, such beams as are found to be seriously rusted replaced, and all the remainder thoroughly painted (not less than two coats) with some good paint.

In repairing bridge floor I should suggest further that a single thickness of 3 inch plank be used instead of the double thickness now forming the floor. This double thickness of flooring adds materially to the dead load on the bridge, when thoroughly soaked with water, it may weigh as much as 50 lbs. per cu. ft., or 25 lbs. per sq. ft. of floor, considered 6 inches thick. On this basis more than half of the dead load on each truss results from the 6 inches of plank flooring. Further, the unevenness of the top layer of this plank causes vibrations in the bridge, when a heavy wagon passes over it, which are undesirable. Would it not be possible to lay a new 3 inch plank floor on the stringer, replacing the stringers, if necessary, as suggested above, and then put a cushion of tar 1-4 or 1-2 inch thick on top of the plank?

If the floor is renovated in the

manner suggested, and all the iron-work of the bridge is thoroughly cleaned and painted, I see no reason why it should not carry safely all ordinary traffic for several years to come.
