Murray: Whereas, This common council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of Catherine st. from Main st. to First st., and Miller av. from First st. to Gott st. within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of that part of Catherine st. and Miller av. within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the common council to cause Catherine st. and Miller av. within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinance of the city of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and 20 per cent of the remainder shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Catherine st. and Miller av. within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works, with directions to report to the council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expenses of such public improvement.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Manwaring presented for its
 third reading, the following ordinan-
 ce:

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordi-
 nance entitled, "An Ordinance to
 Regulate and Control the Driving of
 Automobiles, Motor Vehicles and
 Other Vehicles within the City of
 Ann Arbor," passed August 21st, 1911;
 approved August 23rd, 1911.

The Common Council of the City
 of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That section 16 of an
 Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to
 Regulate and Control the Driving of
 Automobiles, Motor Vehicles and
 Other Vehicles within the City of
 Ann Arbor," passed August 21st,
 1911; approved August 23rd, 1911, be
 and the same is hereby amended to
 read as follows:

Sec. 16. Any person violating any
 of the provisions of this ordinance,
 and who shall be convicted thereof,
 or who shall plead guilty to any com-
 plaint for the violation thereof, shall
 be punished by a fine not exceeding
 twenty-five dollars and costs of pros-
 ecution; or if such fine be not paid,
 then by imprisonment in the Washtenaw
 county jail for not exceeding ten
 days; for the second offense he shall
 be punished by a fine not less than
 ten dollars nor more than fifty dol-
 lars, and costs of prosecution, or if
 such fine be not paid, then by im-
 prisonment in the Washtenaw county
 jail for not exceeding twenty days;
 and for a third, or any subsequent of-
 fense, he shall be punished by a fine
 not less than fifty dollars nor more
 than one hundred dollars, and costs
 of prosecution, or if such fine be not
 paid, then by imprisonment in the
 Washtenaw county jail for not ex-
 ceeding thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and

be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

Ald. Manwaring presented for its third reading the following ordinance:

An Ordinance Relative to Streets. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive or haul any vehicle upon or across any lawn extension or curb within the city of Ann Arbor, without the consent of the board of public works.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to travel or drive along or across any street or sidewalk of this city, whenever any such street or sidewalk is obstructed by reason of any work being in progress for the construction, repair or improvement of said street or sidewalk.

Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove, take down, or in any way interfere with any barrier or barriers placed upon any street or sidewalk closing said street or sidewalk while said street or sidewalk is being constructed, repaired or improved.

Sec. 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and costs; and in the imposition of any such fine and costs the court may make the further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the common jail of the county of Washtenaw, or the city lockup, until the payment thereof, provided the term of such imprisonment shall not exceed the period of thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that the proposed charter amendment, changing the tax levy for general city use from one-half to three-quarters of one per cent. be taken from the table.

Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

Proposed Charter Amendment

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that section 171 of the charter of the City of Ann Arbor be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 171. The Common Council shall have authority to assess, levy and collect taxes on all the real and personal estate taxable in said city, which tax shall be and remain a lien upon the property so assessed until the same shall be paid; provided, that the aggregate amount which the Council may raise by general tax upon the taxable real and personal property for the purposes for which the several general funds are hereinafter constituted shall not, except as herein otherwise provided, exceed in any one year three-fourths of one per cent on the assessed value of all the real and personal property in the city made taxable by law; and provided, further, that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prohibit the Common Council of said city from regulating by tax or otherwise the business of dealing in malt, spirituous or intoxicating liquors.

Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that the proposed charter amendment, making the tax levy three-quarters one per cent. be transmitted to the Governor for his approval. Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that the proposed Charter amendment, authorizing the City of Ann Arbor to issue bonds for any public purpose, be taken from the table. Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

Proposed Charter Amendment.

By Ald. Manwaring: Resolved, that section 186 of the charter of the City of Ann Arbor, as amended May 10, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 186. No bond, note or

other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer, as hereinafter provided, and also except bonds for sewerage and paving purposes and curb and gutters, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity, whereby the said city shall become obligated to pay any money, unless the same shall have been duly authorized by resolution of the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor by a two-thirds vote of the members elect, and shall have been submitted to and voted for by three-fifths of the electors of said city voting thereon, in conformity to this act; but the Common Council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class of orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to the purpose for which it shall be drawn. The treasurer shall pay out no money except upon the written warrant of the mayor and city clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid: Provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasurer of school district number one, of the City of Ann Arbor, upon the warrant of the president and secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the issuing of bonds, to the amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city and for the construction of curbs and gutters, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out this provision may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.
