Board of Review.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 25, 1913.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—The undersigned, city clerk, begs leave to submit the following report of the board of review proceedings on the special assessment rolls of lateral sewers in Lateral Sewer Districts Nos. 48, 49 and 50, and special assessment rolls of pavements in Pavement Districts Nos. 26 and 27, of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The Council, sitting as such board of review, in pursuance to its order and appointment for that purpose, met at the council chamber on February 25, 1913, at 2 p. m. The roll was called of the aldermen, and the following members were found present: Ald. Hochrein, Flynn, Manwaring, Ramsay, Lindenschmitt, Schultz, Murray, Prochnow, Pipp, Sherk, Rash, Lutz Pres. Mills. 13.

Dr. Wm. S. Mills was chairman for the board of review, and the council entered upon the review of said special assessment rolls. Due proof of the publication of notice of meeting was filed.

After hearing all persons desiring to be heard and computing the review of such special assessment rolls in lateral sewer Districts Nos. 48, 49 and 50, and in pavement Districts

Nos. 26 and 27, the following resolution was offered:

By Ald. Sherk: The special assessment rolls of lateral sewer Districts Nos. 48, 49 and 50, and pavement Districts Nos. 26 and 27, having been duly certified to us and this day having been appointed and assigned for a review thereof, and all persons appearing having been heard and the said special assessment rolls having been fully considered, and the review thereof completed, therefore be it

Resolved, and it is hereby ordered, that the city clerk do report the proceedings of this board of review on special assessment rolls to the common council at its next regular meeting.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting persons under sixteen years of age from being on the streets, alleys or public places in the city of Ann Arbor after certain hours of the night," which was given its third reading.

Ald. Schultz moved to amend that the hours be changed from April 1st to October 1st, at 9 p. m., October 1st to April 1st, at 8 p. m., and that a curfew whistle be provided and placed at the gas works to be used as a signal for the curfew law.

Ald. Manwaring moved that proposed changes be taken up separately. Adopted.

Proposed amendment as to hours and dates, October 1st to April 1st at 8 p. m., and April 1st to October 1st, at 9 p. m., adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Schmid, Hochrein, Flynn, Manwaring, Ramsay, Lindenschmitt, Schultz, Murray, Prochnow, Pipp, Rash, Lutz, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

That curfew whistle be provided and placed at the gas works to be used as signal for the curfew law.

Ordinance as amended:

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING PERSONS UNDER SIXTEEN YEARS OF AGE FROM BEING ON THE

STREETS, ALLEYS OR PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR AFTER CERTAIN HOURS OF THE NIGHT.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of sixteen years to be or remain in or upon any of the streets, alleys, or public places in the City of Ann Arbor after the hour of nine o'clock p. m. from April 1st to October 1st of each year and from October 1st to April 1st of each year after the hour of eight o'clock p. m., unless such person is accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or other person having legal custody and control of such minor, or unless such minor is in the performance of an errand of duty directed by his or her parent, guardian or other person having his or her care and custody, or where the employment of such minor makes it necessary that said minor be upon said streets, alleys or public places during the night time after said specified hours or is returning directly home from attending some entertainment of an instructive or benefitting character.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any parent, guardian or other person having the legal care and custody of any person under sixteen years of age to allow or permit any such child, ward or other person under such age, while in his or her legal custody and control, to go or be in or upon any of the streets, alleys or public places in said city within the time prohibited in section one of this ordinance unless there exists a reasonable necessity therefor. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars and costs of prosecution, and in the imposition of any such fine and costs, the court may impose a further sentence that the offender be and remain imprisoned in the common jail of Washtenaw County until such fine and costs have been paid: PROVIDED, that such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of each member of the police force while on duty to send or take home any minor violating the provisions of section one of this ordinance and to notify the parent, guardian or other person having custody or control of such minor, of such violation, and if it shall appear that such child or minor person is a dependent, neglect-

ed or delinquent child then to cause complaint to be made to the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court where proper proceedings may be had as authorized and provided by law for such cases.

Sec. 4. The striking of the Court House clock and campus clock of the hours named in this ordinance shall be the signal of curfew hour. The failure to sound the curfew signal shall not be a defence to any action brought for a violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question: "Shall this ordinance as amended pass?"

Passed by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Hochrein, Flynn, Manwaring, Ramsay, Lindenschmitt, Murray, Prochnow, Pipp, Rash, Lutz, Pres. Mills, 11. Nays, Ald. Schmid Schuitz 2.

Ald Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled "An ordinance relative to the use of streets and other public places in the city of Ann Arbor," which was given its third reading as follows:

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE USE OF STREETS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation having a permanent location in this city that is adjacent to and abutting upon any sidewalk or street or alley or other public place, to build or erect any stairway leading upwards from any sidewalk or any stairway leading down to any area or basement so as to encroach upon the width of the sidewalk or street.

Sec. 2. The Board of Public Works shall not give a permit to any person, firm or corporation to make any excavation in any street, alley or other public place, or tear up, or remove any sidewalk, pavement or street surface for the purpose of erecting or building any stairway prohibited in Section one of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Any person convicted of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars and the costs of prosecution; and in imposing any such fine and costs the court may make the further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the common jail of the Coun-

ty of Washtenaw until the payment thereof: PROVIDED, That no such term of imprisonment shall exceed the period of thirty days.

Sec. 4. Any ordinance or part of ordinance in so far as the same is inconsistent with any of the provisions of this ordinance is hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.
