Minutes of previous meeting approved.

Petitions.

Of Fred Barker, et al, for street light on Geddes av. near corner of Walnut st., received and referred to lighting committee.

Of Henry B. Dodsley, et al, for arc street light on corner Fifth av. and Detroit st., received and referred to lighting committee.

Of Emil Golz, et al, for sidewalk on south side of Madison st. from Third to Seventh sts., received and referred to sidewalk committee.

Of Wm. Goodyear, et al, for sidewalk on east side of Olivia av. between Minerva and Cambridge roads, received and referred to sidewalk committee.

"To the Honorable Common Council,
Gentlemen:

The regents on behalf of the University of Michigan and Bishop Edward D. Kelley on behalf of St. Joseph sanitarium, respectfully petition your honorable body to grant the necessary permissions to enable the construction of a railway siding and spurs, from the Michigan Central railroad to the new power house and store house of the university, and to the power house of the proposed St. Joseph Sanitarium.

"The new power house of the University is being erected in the block between Huron and Washington streets west of Fourteenth street; and the store house located just east of the Homeopathic hospital. The St. Joseph sanitarium is to be located on the hill immediately east of Observatory street overlooking the Michigan Central railroad, and its power house is to be located at the base of this hill on the east side.

The proposed siding is to start from the Michigan Central tracks at a point just west of the first bridge over the Huron river east of Ann Arbor. The plan contemplates storage tracks for loaded and empty cars on and alongside the Michigan Central right-of-way, from which siding one spur track extends to the university power house and store house, and another spur track to the power house of St.

Joseph sanitarium. The storage tracks thus serve both institutions.

"To enable the construction of these tracks in a suitable way it will be necessary to vacate the road now known as School Girls Glen (formerly Fuller street) for a short distance east of Observatory street where it adjoins the Michigan Central right-of-way, and to relocate the same immediately south of its present location on lands now owned by the Michigan Central and Bishop Kelley. In its proposed new location the School Girls Glen road runs along the south side of the proposed siding between Observatory street and the point at which this road deflects to the south on what was formerly the old Michigan Central roadbed. The necessary legislation authorizing this change in the street is requested.

"Permission is also requested to cross certain streets with the aforesaid tracks, these crossings being as follows:

"School Girls Glen (formerly Fuller street) with an overhead bridge for the spur track to the power house of St. Joseph sanitarium.

"And for the spur track to the university buildings permission to cross.

"Observatory street with an overhead bridge at or near its junction with School Girls Glen (formerly Fuller street).

"Catherine street at grade just east of Glen avenue.

"Ann street at grade east of Glenn avenue.

"Huron street at grade east of Glenn avenue; and

"Washington street with an overhead bridge north of the Homeopathic hospital.

"Aside from the street crossings indicated, these spur tracks will be laid on private rights-of-way.

"The regents and Bishop Kelley further petition your honorable body for certain changes in the present sewer system and for other sewers necessary to the proper drainage of the aforesaid buildings.

"The present sewer on Glenn avenue is insufficient both in depth and capacity for the new University power house and for a future new sewer on the University campus. It is requested by the regents that a new and larger sewer be laid at suitable depth starting from the north-west corner of the new power house site, thence northwesterly across Huron street to a suitable point in Glenn avenue, thence north along Glenn avenue to

a point at or near its intersection with Catherine street, at which point the proposed new sewer is to join the present sewer on Glenn avenue.

"It is requested by Bishop Kelley that permission be granted to construct a private sewer from St. Joseph sanitarium along School Girls' Glen (formerly Fuller street) and across this street so as to discharge into the Huron river.

"The regents and Bishop Kelley respectfully request as early action on these petitions as may be convenient and practicable, and that an opportunity be afforded representatives of the university and St. Joseph sanitarium to explain the details involved and the necessities of the proposed new construction and improvements.
