To the Honorable the Common
Council of the City of Ann Arbor,
Michigan: Gentlemen—We, the un-
dersigned freeholders of the City of
Ann Arbor, respectfully petition your
Honorable Body that, in accordance
with section 127 of the City Charter,
you will in due course vacate, and
cause to be executed to the University
of Michigan, a deed of the following
described property, the same being a
portion of Fuller street.

Beginning at a point in the north-
erly line of Fuller street, 112 feet
westerly measured along said north-
erly line from the easterly line of
Observatory avenue produced northerly;
thence southeasterly on a curve
convex to the northeast whose radius
is 110 feet to a point in the southerly
line of Fuller street produced easterly,
30 feet westerly measured along
said southerly line from the easterly
line of Observatory avenue; thence
easterly along said southerly line of
Fuller street, 700 feet, more or less,
to the easterly line of Michigan Central
property; thence northeasterly
along said easterly property line
produced northerly 50 feet more
or less to the northeasterly line
of public highway; thence north-
westerly along said line of high-
way 45 feet more or less, to the
northeasterly line of Fuller street;
thence westerly along said northerly
line of Fuller street to the point of
beginning, containing one and twenty-
four thousandths (1.024) acres, more

To the Honorable the Common
Council of the City of Ann Arbor,
Michigan: Gentlemen—I beg to give
you formal notice that the Regents
of the University of Michigan stand
ready to execute to the City of Ann
Arbor a deed to the following describ-

ed property, as soon as the said Re-
gents receive a deed to that portion
of Fuller street, the vacating of
which is prayed for in a current pe-
tition of ten or more freeholders of
the City of Ann Arbor, or as soon as
the Regents are informed that the
Mayor and the City Clerk, or such
representatives of your Honorable
Body as you may name, are duly au-
thorized to make and will make to
the Regents of the University of
Michigan, such deed to the portion of
Fuller street in question. The above-
mentioned property which the Re-
gents stand ready to deed to the
City of Ann Arbor, and which is
equivalent to that portion of Fuller
Street desired to be vacated, is de-
scribed as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of
the southerly line of the Michigan
Central Railroad company's property
and the easterly line of Observatory
avenue; thence northeasterly on a
curve convex to the northwest, whose
radius is one hundred and twenty and
six-tenths (120.6) feet and whose
long chord is one hundred (100) feet,
the said long chord making an angle
of twenty-four (24) degrees, thirty
(30) minutes with said line of Ob-
servatory avenue produced northeast-
erly; thence easterly on a curve con-
vex to the north whose radius is one
thousand nine hundred ten (1910)
feet to a point in the easterly line of
said company's property sixty-six
(66) feet southwesterly measured
along said easterly property line from
the northeasterly corner of said com-
pany's property; thence northeasterly
along said easterly property line sixty-
six (66) feet; thence westerly on a
curve convex to the north whose
radius is one thousand nine hundred
seventy-six (1976) feet to a point in
the said easterly line of Observatory
avenue fifty feet southerly measured
along said easterly line from the
southerly line of Fuller street; thence
southerly along said easterly line of
Observatory avenue to the place of
beginning; containing one and twenty-
four thousandths (1.024) acres,
more or less.

The Regents will proceed at once on
receipt of proper information from
your Honorable Body to put in condi-
tion for traffic the herein described
property, and it will be in condition
for traffic before traffic on the present
Fuller street is discontinued. Respect-

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Schultz presented the following ordinance:

An Ordinance to amend Section Six of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Nuisances," passed February 3, 1896; approved February 6, 1896; amended October 7, 1907.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That section seven of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Nuisances," passed February 3, 1896, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 6. The owner or keeper of any livery or other stable, barn or shed within the limits of the city, shall keep the same and the yards thereto clean, and shall between the first day of May and the first day of the succeeding November of each year, remove all manure from the premises once a week.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

This ordinance was given its first

reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to the ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Lutz, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Rash, Groves, Lutz, Sink, Pres. Schmid, 14. Nays, none.

Ald. Schultz presented the following ordinance:

An ordinance to provide for the licensing of slaughter houses, rendering works, and all similar kinds of business within the city of Ann Arbor, and to provide for the inspection of meats, fish, cattle, sheep, hogs, poultry, and game intended for human food, and to regulate all places where animals are slaughtered and meats are prepared and sold.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate any slaughterhouse or rendering works within the Corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor on or after _____, without first having secured a license in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. No cattle, swine, sheep, lambs, poultry, or game shall be slaughtered within the Corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, and no fat or other animal matter rendered, except in private families for their own use, without a license granted annually by the Mayor of the City of Ann Arbor on the recommendation of the Board of Health from May 1, of each year, which license shall be granted when the regulations contained in this ordinance are complied with to the satisfaction of the Board of Health. The application for such license shall be made on a blank furnished by the Board of Health, and shall set forth the location of the slaughterhouse or rendering works, the material of which it is constructed, the name and residence of the owner or owners, the name and residence of the applicant for license, the method proposed for the disposing of the offal, the water supply, and the accommodation for dainage. Each applicant shall also file a written agreement in which he shall pledge himself to observe all the regulations adopted by the Common Council or the Board of Health for main-

meat inspector or his assistant, in properly executing the duties of the same.

Sec. 10. The Meat Inspector of the City of Ann Arbor and his assistant may enter at any time, and no person shall hinder or prevent him, or them from so entering any place in this city where live cattle, calves, sheep, goats or swine are held, or where animals are slaughtered, or where poultry, game, fish, or oysters are dressed, scaled or prepared to be disposed of for human food; and likewise they may enter any house, store, market stall, railroad car, wagon or other vehicle where meat, sausage, poultry, game, fish, or oysters are prepared, packed, stored, transported, held or kept for sale for human food; and likewise they may also enter any factory or place where dead animals are skinned or rendered, or where the offal from slaughterhouses or meat stored, such as fat, head, feet, or guts are steamed, tanked or otherwise disposed of.

Sec. 11. No person shall sell or offer for sale within the city limits, or otherwise dispose of for human food therein, any meat or meat product of any cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine which does not bear the meat inspection brand or other mark of identification of the Board of Health, or of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Sec. 12. No carcass, or any part thereof of any slaughtered cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine shall be branded or otherwise marked for identification by the Meat Inspector or his assistant until it has been carefully inspected and passed for food, and the viscera, head, tongue, tail, and caul of each and every cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine slaughtered when the inspector is not present, shall be kept together and wholly separate from similar parts of any other carcass.

Sec. 13. No dressed carcass or any part thereof of any slaughtered cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine to be used for human food shall be removed from any slaughterhouse, public abattoir or slaughtering place within the city limits before it has been branded or otherwise marked for identification by the Meat Inspector or his assistant, or by the Inspectors of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Sec. 14. Meats slaughtered within the city, but brought into the city for sale shall be inspected and branded or otherwise marked for identification by the Meat Inspector or his assistant under the following rules, to-wit: All carcasses must have the head and all viscera, except the stomach, bladder and intestines, held together by natural attachments, and all such carcasses shall be brought to the public abattoir, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 12 m. of each week day or to some other place designated by the Meat Inspector who shall be notified when such meat is ready for inspection.

Sec. 15. Any carcass, or any part thereof of any slaughtered cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine in this city, which, because of disease, injury or any other condition is unfit for human food, shall be freely slashed with a knife and saturated with coal oil by the Meat Inspector or his assistant and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of for human food.

Sec. 16. No veal calf at any time of slaughter shall be dressed with the skin left on the carcass, unless such skin is clean and the head and feet removed.

Sec. 17. No fresh or cured meats or meat products shall be exposed in the open, or to the action of moisture, soot, dust, and flies in front of any shop, store, or other place.

Sec. 18. No meat or meat products shall be transported in any wagon or other vehicle in the city unless fully protected from moisture, soot, and flies by the use of covered vehicles, with the front, and the back closed, or by the use of clean white cloths spread over the meat or meat products.

Sec. 19. All delivery wagons and other vehicles, together with boxes, barrels, and other containers used in transporting meats in the city, shall be kept perfectly clean, and no dirty burlap or other dirty cloths shall be used in contact with meat.

Sec. 20. All slaughtering in regular slaughterhouses or public abattoir in the city shall be done between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the afternoon, provided that if the laws of the United States or the meat inspector's rules of the United States Department of Agriculture shall conflict

with the provisions of this section said laws and rules shall govern.

Sec. 21. No slaughtering of live-stock shall be done at any packing house or slaughterhouse in the city on any legal holiday or on the day commonly called Sunday.

Sec. 22. A careful examination shall be made by the inspector or his assistant at all public stock yards, public abattoir stock pens, in this city of any live cattle, swine, sheep, goat or calf when requested to do so by a purchaser of any such animal intended for slaughter under the post-mortem inspection of the Board of Health; and no person shall sell any such animal judged as diseased or of being otherwise unfit for human food, to any butcher or other person slaughtering live stock under the post-mortem inspection of the Board of Health; provided, that such an animal may be sold subject to post-mortem inspection and may be removed to any slaughterhouse where a post-mortem inspection is conducted by the Board of Health when properly tagged for identification.

Sec. 23. No person shall bring into this city, or sell or offer for sale, or give to the proprietor of any packing or slaughtering house, or to any butcher or others, in this city, any cattle, hog, sheep, or lamb that is diseased, injured, crippled, immature, under weight, badly emaciated, or that for any other obvious reason, might be unfit for human food, without first delivering said cattle, hog, sheep, or lamb at one of the public stock yards of this city where the Meat Inspector or his assistant is stationed, reporting all the facts, known to him relating to such animal or animals to said officer and receiving written permission from the health officer so to do.

Sec. 24. No proprietor or agent of any packing house, public abattoir, or slaughterhouse, nor any butcher or others in this city, shall bring into this city, or buy or offer to buy, or accept, in this city any cattle, calf, hog, sheep, or lamb that is diseased, injured, crippled, immature, under weight, badly emaciated, or that for any other obvious reason might be unfit for human food, without first reporting all the facts known to him relating to such animal or animals, to the Meat Inspector and receiving written permission from the Health Officer so to do.

Sec. 25. No person shall bring into this city, or sell or offer for sale any meat, sausage, poultry, game, fish, or oysters that is diseased, adulterated, unsound, unwholesome, or that from any other reason is unfit for human food; and such articles of food shall be seized and destroyed by the Meat Inspector or his assistant.

Sec. 26. All houses or places in this city in which animals are slaughtered or the meat and meat products are prepared, cured, packed, stored, handled or sold shall be suitably lighted and ventilated and maintained in a sanitary condition. All work in such establishments shall be performed in a cleanly and sanitary manner.

(a) Ceilings, side walls, pillars, partitions, etc., shall be frequently whitewashed or painted, or, where this is impracticable, they shall, when necessary, be washed, scraped, or otherwise rendered sanitary, where floors, or other parts of a building, or tables or other parts of the equipment are so old or in such condition that they cannot be made sanitary, they shall be removed and replaced by suitable materials or otherwise put in a condition acceptable to the Meat Inspector. All floors upon which meats are piled during the process of curing shall be constructed that they can be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, and such meats shall also be kept clean.

(b) All tracts, trays, and other receptacles, all shutes, platforms, cleavers, etc., and all knives, saws, and other tools, and all utensils, and machinery used in moving, handling, cutting, chopping, mixing, canning, or other process, shall be thoroughly cleaned daily, if used.

(c) The aprons, smocks, or other outer clothing of employes who handle meat in contact with such clothing, shall be of a material that is readily cleaned and made sanitary, and shall be cleansed daily, if used. Employes who handle meat or meat food products, shall be required to keep their hands clean.

(d) All toilet rooms, urinals, and dressing rooms shall be entirely separated from compartments in which carcasses are dressed, or meat or meat food products are stored, packed, handled, prepared or sold. They shall be sufficient in number, ample in size, and fitted with modern lav-

aratory accommodations, including toilet paper, soap, running water, towels, etc. They shall be well lighted, suitably ventilated, and kept in a sanitary condition.

(e) The rooms and compartments in which meats or meat food products are prepared, cured, packed, or otherwise handled, shall be properly lighted and ventilated, and shall be so located from toilet rooms, catch basins, casing departments, tank rooms, hide cellars, etc., do not permeate them. All rooms or compartments shall be provided with cuspidors, which employes who expectorate shall be required to use.

(f) Persons effected with tuberculosis or any other communicable disease shall not be knowingly employed in any of the departments or establishments where carcasses are dressed, prepared, meat handled, or meat food products prepared, and any employes suspected of being so affected shall be so reported by the Meat Inspector to the manager of the establishment and to the Health Officer.

(g) No use incompatible with proper sanitation shall be made of any part of the premises on which a slaughterhouse is located. All yards, fences, pens, chutes, alleys, etc., belonging to the premises of such establishment shall, whether they are used or not, be maintained in a sanitary condition.

(h) Butchers who dress diseased carcasses shall cleanse their hands of all grease and then immerse them in a prescribed disinfectant and rinse them in clear water before engaging a dressing or handling healthy carcasses. All butcher's implements used in dressing diseased carcasses shall be cleaned of all grease and then sterilized, either in boiling water or by immersion in a prescribed disinfectant, and rinsed in clear water before being used again in dressing healthy carcasses. Facilities for such cleansing and disinfection, approved by the Meat Inspector, shall be provided by the establishment. Separate trucks, tracking, etc., shall be furnished for handling diseased carcasses and parts.

Following the slaughter of an animal afflicted with an infectious disease a stop shall be made until all the implements have been cleansed and disinfected, unless duplicate

implements are provided.

(j) Meats and meat food products, intended for rendering into edible products, must be prevented from falling on the floor, while being emptied into the tanks, by the use of some device, such as a funnel or metal cans, or barrel.

(k) Butchers who dress carcasses are prohibited from holding in their mouths skewers to be used in such dressing.

Sec. 27. No slaughterhouse, or public abattoir, or any part thereof shall be used or occupied as a residence, or lodging place for any person; and no slaughtering of live stock shall be permitted in any house, building, or other place used as a residence or lodging place for human beings.

Sec. 28. No dogs shall be permitted in any slaughterhouse or any place where meats are prepared.

Sec. 29. A suitable locker or office approved by the Meat Inspector shall be furnished free of cost by the proprietor of each slaughterhouse or public abattoir for the use of the Meat Inspector or his assistant.

Sec. 30 a. No eggs shall be offered for sale in the City of Ann Arbor, unless they shall first have been properly candled or passed through proper and sufficient cold storage.

Sec. 30 b. All persons engaged in the removal of dead cattle, sheep, goats, or swine from, or within the city limits, except from the streets and public grounds of the city by contract with the city, shall first obtain its written permit from the Board of Health to conduct such business. All applications for such permits shall be in writing and shall state the location of the factory or place to which such dead animals are to be taken and the exact disposition to be made of them or their products. All persons engaged in such business shall, at the close of each calendar week make a report to the Board of Health upon blanks furnished by said board, which shall state the number and kind of dead animals removed and the disposition of them.

Sec. 31. No animal shall be allowed to pass the slaughtering room until it has passed the ante-mortem inspection. All animals found on either ante-mortem or post-mortem examination to be affected with any

of the following diseases or conditions are to be condemned, and their carcasses disposed of as ordered by the Health Officer:

1. Hog cholera.
2. Swine plague.
3. Anthrax, including symptomatic anthrax (black leg).
4. Rabies.
5. Malignant epizootic catarrh.
6. Pyaemia and septicæmia.
7. Mange or scab in advanced stages.
8. Actinomyces (lump jaw) in advanced stages.
9. Inflammation of the lungs, the intestines or the peritonium.
10. Texas fever.
11. Tuberculosis, extensive or generalized.
12. All animals in advanced stage of pregnancy, or that have recently given birth to young.
13. Any disease or injury causing elevation of temperature, or affecting the system of the animal to a degree which would make the flesh unfit for food.
14. Carcinomas (cancers) or malignant sarcomas, or any form or kind of tumors where extensions (metastasis) has taken place to such a degree that the flesh is unfit for food.

Sec. 32. There shall be charged and collected in advance by the inspector and paid into the city treasurer for the inspections required under this ordinance, the following schedule of charges, to-wit:

For the inspection of cattle owned by the same owner and inspected at the same time.

For the first ten, ten cents per head.

All over ten in number, five cents per head.

For hogs, goats, sheep, and calves, for the first five owned by the same owner and inspected at the same time, ten cents per head.

All over five and under fifty in number, five cents per head.

All over fifty, three cents per head.

Sec. 33. For the inspection of cuts, dressed, or other green meats, there shall be charged and collected as aforesaid three (3) cents per hundred or fractional part thereof; but the charge for an inspection shall in no case be less than 10 cents.

Sec. 34. No animal shall be slaughtered the same day that it is received at the slaughterhouse stock

yards unless it is delivered at the yards prior to twelve o'clock, noon.

Sec. 35. The following charges shall not be exceeded at any licensed slaughterhouse, viz:

Cattle, per head, 50 cents.

Hogs, per head, 25 cents.

Lambs, calves, sheep, goats and kids, per head, 15 cents.

On basis of above charges the following parts of slaughtered animals shall be returned with the dressed carcass, as follows:

Of cattle, the hide, liver, tongue, heart and tail.

Of calves, sheep, lambs, hogs, pigs, goats and kids, all parts of slaughtered animals shall be returned with dressed carcass, except the entrails (entire) and blood.

In determining what shall be known as cattle and what shall be known as calves in the foregoing scale, by cattle the dressed carcass must weigh exceeding one hundred pounds; under that weight shall be considered calves. All dressed carcasses shall be put on platform adjoining premises on request, ready for delivery from 4 o'clock a. m. to 6 o'clock p. m., daily, except Sunday. The charges for cold storage shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) cent per pound for a period of seven days or any part thereof.

Sec. 36. No discrimination shall be made against any person, firm or corporation offering animals for slaughter at any regularly licensed slaughterhouse.

Sec. 37. The term slaughterhouse used in the ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor, includes a building, or part thereof, or premises within the City of Ann Arbor used or kept for the purpose of killing, dressing or packing any cattle, sheep, hogs, calves, or other animals, or the meat thereof, intended for human consumption. The Mayor, upon the recommendation of the Board of Health of the City of Ann Arbor, may grant a license to a person, firm, association, or corporation to keep or maintain a building or buildings, or premises therein described as a slaughterhouse, or rendering works upon payment to the treasurer of the City of Ann Arbor, a fee of \$25 therefor. No license to keep or maintain a slaughterhouse or rendering works shall be recommended by the Board of Health, nor granted by the Mayor, until the plans

therefor have been filed with the Board of Health and by said board approved in writing, and no plans shall be so approved until the slaughterhouse or rendering works for which a license is requested, conforms to the ordinance of the City of Ann Arbor. Each license so granted by the Mayor shall expire at midnight on the 30th day of April following the date of its grant. Each license so granted by the Mayor may be revoked by him for the violation by the person, firm, association, or corporation to whom granted, of any ordinance of the City of Ann Arbor, at the time in effect with reference to slaughterhouse or rendering works, or to the inspection of animals slaughtered or intended to be slaughtered, or to the meat or meat products thereof, after a hearing is given to the licensee, of which hearing the licensee shall have a notice of at least three days. Each slaughterhouse or rendering works for which a license shall be granted as herein provided, shall be open in every part to inspection all times by any authorized employe of the Board of Health of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Sec. 38. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution, and the court before whom such conviction shall be had may make a further sentence that in default of the payment of such fine and costs the person so convicted shall be imprisoned in the county jail until such fine and costs be paid, for a term not exceeding sixty days.

Sec. 39. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, or any part thereof, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 40. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

This ordinance was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to the ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Lutz, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Rash, Groves, Lutz, Sink. Pres. Schmid, 14. Nays, none.

Sewer Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen —

Your sewer committee have had the following matters under consideration and recommend that the East Catherine st. sanitary sewer be extended 100 feet east from present sewer near Clark st.; that a sanitary sewer be constructed on Fourth ave. from Ann st. to Catherine st. and west on Catherine st. to main sewer. We also recommend that the sanitary sewer on Geddes ave. be extended east from present termination as far as is possible, and that a sewer be constructed on Ann st. from Fourteenth st. to Observatory st.

Resolved, further, that the city engineer cause all needful surveys, maps, measurements and estimates to be made and report to the council with all convenient dispatch.

Street Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your street committee, to whom the following matters were referred, respectfully recommend that the board of public works be instructed to clean out the gutters and repair Chubb road; to enter into contract with the lowest bidder for the painting and placing in position of street signs on all corners not now furnished with same; and speed limit signs on

all main roads leading in at the city limits according to specifications to be furnished the city clerk by the chairman of the street committee.

Railway Committee.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your committee on railways respectfully report that it has had under consideration the application of the Detroit, Jackson & Chicago railway for leave to cross Seventh street and certain other streets (in the line of its private right of way) and to be allowed further time in which to pave that part of West Huron street that lies west of the west line of Seventh street, and we recommend as follows:

1. That the question of allowing said company to cross Seventh street and certain other streets (in the line of its private right of way), be deferred until such time as the railway company shall present to this council a detailed statement showing just what privileges said company will require to be granted from the city in order to allow it to carry out its plans for the operation of its cars over said private right of way, with full assurance to said company that when it shall make such application that the same will receive careful consideration from this council.

2. That because of the fact that the construction of the pavement upon West Huron street has now proceeded to such a point that said pavement must be completed in as short a time as possible in order to prevent great annoyance to our citizens and the residents along said street, that your committee is unable to recommend that the question of paving by said railway, west of the west line of Seventh street, be deferred to another year; that this request of said railway company is not refused because of any desire on the part of

your committee to subject said company to the expense of doing said paving at this time, but solely for the reason that the work of paving that part of the street to be paved by the city, has proceeded to such a point that to grant said request would be to leave said street in a dangerous condition and subject the residents along said street to great annoyance and damage, said residents having already suffered considerably from the delay on the part of the company in the performance of the work called for by its franchise.

3. That if this report is adopted by this council, that the city clerk, serve by registered mail, a copy thereof and the resolution adopting the same, upon said railway company, and if said company does not within five days after the adoption of this report commence the work of constructing said pavement, that the city attorney be directed to at once commence the proper legal proceedings to compel said railway company to remove its tracks from said street.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan: Gentlemen—The Regents of the University of Michigan respectfully petition, that in accordance with your action of April 7 last, and in accordance with the acceptance thereof under date of April 24, by the undersigned, the Regents of the University of Michigan, duly transmitted to you under date of May 1, 1913, and further in accordance with a petition of certain freeholders of Ann Arbor currently presented to your Honorable Body, you will at the earliest date possible, under the provisions of section 127 of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor, by proper resolution vacate and cause to be deeded to the Regents of the University of Michigan, that portion of Fuller street described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of Fuller street, 112 feet westerly measured along said northerly line from the easterly line of Observatory avenue produced northerly; thence southeasterly on a curve convex to the northeast whose radius is 110 feet to a point in the southerly line of Fuller street produced easterly, 30 feet westerly measured along said southerly line from the easterly line of Observatory avenue; thence easterly along said southerly line of Fuller street, 700 feet, more or less, to the easterly line of Michigan Central property; thence northeasterly along said easterly property line produced northerly 50 feet more or less to the northeasterly line of public highway; thence northwesterly along said line of highway 45 feet more or less, to the northerly line of Fuller street; thence westerly along said northerly line of Fuller street to the point of beginning, containing one and twenty-four thousandths (1.024) acres, more or less.

It is the understanding of your petitioners that under section 127, if you deem the proposed vacating of Fuller street desirable, (as by your action of April 7 your petitioners understand to be the case,) your Honorable Body will give notice of the pendency of the question to the owners or persons interested of the time and place when and where your Honorable Body will meet to consider the same. To the Finance Committee of the Common Council: Gentlemen—I have examined the foregoing accounts against the city of Ann Arbor and I hereby certify that

taining sanitation. No new slaughterhouse or rendering works shall be built or existing slaughterhouse or rendering works rebuilt, enlarged or changed without such license issued by the mayor on the recommendation of the Board of Health. No such license shall be issued until the applicant shall file with the Board of Health complete plans and specifications of the proposed new or renewed slaughterhouses or rendering works. No new or renewed slaughterhouse or rendering works shall have its walls constructed of any other material than brick, stone, concrete, or cement, or its roof of any other material than slate, tile or metal. No license for a slaughterhouse or rendering works shall be issued except on petition signed by not less than a majority of the owners in interest of real estate situated within a radius of four hundred feet of the proposed slaughterhouse or rendering works. No license shall be issued unless notice shall be given to the owners of real estate as above at least four weeks before final action is taken by the Board of Health.

Sec. 3. All slaughterhouses and rendering works located within the City of Ann Arbor shall have all floors paved with cement, asphalt, or other impervious material, properly sloped to a well trapped and permanently grated inlet having a direct communication with the city sewer, and all walls covered to a height of five feet with smooth, impervious material, and all yards to be properly graded, paved and well drained into the city sewer and that adequate water supply with suitable arrangement of hose or pipes be provided to enable the floors, walls and yards to be effectually washed and cleaned, and that the walls and floors of apartments in which animals are kept previously to slaughtering be likewise covered with cement, asphalt or some other impervious material and be properly cleaned and drained as above. Wood floors are hereby prohibited. No blood-pit, dung-pit, offal-pit, or privy-well shall remain or be constructed within any slaughterhouse, and all manure piles or other refuse shall be removed from the yards or premises at least twice each week.

Sec. 4. All drainage from slaughterhouses or rendering works must be connected with the city sewer,

and every slaughterhouse or rendering works shall be well furnished with water and must be thoroughly cleansed with hot water and lye, with free use of disinfectants, at least twice each week.

Sec. 5. Every slaughterhouse or rendering works shall be provided with covered, water tight vessels for the immediate reception of all offal or other animal matter, to be removed, emptied, and cleansed within twelve hours from May first to November first, and twice a week the remainder of the year. No slaughterhouse or rendering works offal of any kind shall be transported through the city, except in tightly covered vessels or wagons which preclude the escape of noxious odors.

Sec. 6. All apparatus used for rendering fat or other animal matter must retain and burn the gases generated. The premises of all slaughterhouses and rendering works must be kept free from all noxious odors.

Sec. 7. Receptacles for packing hides must be of cement, asphalt, or other water tight material.

Sec. 8. The keeping of cattle, swine or sheep in any slaughterhouse or upon the premises except for immediate slaughter is prohibited, and all animals rejected on account of disease or other cause shall be held in separate pens until ordered disposed of by the health officer.

Sec. 9. The health officer of the City of Ann Arbor is hereby appointed Meat Inspector in and for the City of Ann Arbor, with power and authority to appoint an assistant, to be approved by the Common Council, at such compensation as the Common Council may by resolution provide. And it shall be the duty of the meat inspector to file with the Common Council on the first day of May of each year a complete report in writing of his proceedings as Meat Inspector, giving a full and accurate account of all inspections made under the provisions of this ordinance. The Board of Health of the City of Ann Arbor is hereby authorized and empowered to furnish all necessary blanks and books of record and apparatus necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance and make and promulgate such rules, regulations and requirements as may be deemed necessary to assist the
