Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Sink presented the following
ordinance which was given its sec-
ond and third readings:

An ordinance to amend an ordinance
entitled "An Ordinance Relative to
Fire Limits and Fires" passed Oc-
tober 7, 1895; approved October
12, 1895; amended June 4, 1900;
amended March 19, 1906; amend-
ed December 3, 1906; amended
April 10, 1913.

The Common Council of the City of
Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section one (1) of
an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance
relative to Fire Limits and Fires,"—
passed October 7th, 1895; approved
October 12, 1895; amended June 4,
1900; amended March 19, 1906;
amended December 3, 1906; amended
April 10, 1913, be and the same is
hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or cor-
poration shall hereafter place, enlarge
or erect any building or other struc-
ture on any lot or part of lot front-
ing on any of the following streets
or parts of streets, to-wit: On Main
street between Kingsley and William
streets; On Huron street between
First street and Fifth avenue; on
William street between the Ann Arbor
Railroad and State street; on Liber-
ty street between the Ann Arbor Rail-
road and Fifth avenue; on Catherine
street between Ashley street and
Fifth avenue; on Ann street between
Ashley street and Fifth avenue; on
Fourth avenue between Kingsley
street and Liberty street; on the west
side of Fifth avenue between Kings-
ley and Liberty streets; on Ashley
street between Catherine and William
streets; on State street between Wil-
liam and Huron streets; on William

street between State street and the Ann Arbor Railroad; on Maynard street between William and Liberty streets; on both sides of Liberty street between Maynard and State streets; on Detroit street between Fourth avenue and Depot street; on the block bounded as follows, to-wit: on the north by Fuller street, on the south by Kingsley street, on the east by North State street, and on the west by Elizabeth street; and on North University avenue between South State and South Thayer streets, in this City, unless such building or such structure shall be constructed of stone, reinforced concrete, brick or with party or fire walls of the same material.

Provided, that the board of fire commissioners may in its discretion grant permission for the erection within said limits of buildings or other structures veneered with brick and for the erection of frame buildings, dwellings, barns and outhouses in and on all of that part of the above described district lying north of Catherine street west of Ashley street, south of Liberty street, and on State street between Liberty and Huron streets.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by unanimous vote of those present, 14.

Ald. Sink presented an ordinance entitled,

An Ordinance to Protect the Health of the City of Ann Arbor; to prescribe Regulations for the Establishment of Abattoirs and Slaughter Houses, and the Regulation of the Same, and Providing a Penalty for the Violation of the Same.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. Every abattoir or slaughter house, or other place for the slaughtering of animals, or the operation at which animals are slaughtered for the purpose of being used for food, exhibited for sale as food and for use as food, within the limits of of the City of Ann Arbor, shall be constructed in accordance with the following provisions:

The same shall consist of a substantial and suitable building well lighted, containing a killing room, a

chill room, a cold storage and refrigerating room, a reduction plant, and suitable pens, chutes, etc., commensurate therewith. The killing room shall be adequate in size and the floor of said killing room shall be of concrete not less than three inches thick, connected with sewer by means of bell traps, and duly equipped with water seals, and constructed in such a manner as to secure perfect drainage; it shall be provided with hot and cold water, also tank for scalding animals, together with an ample supply of hose; it shall be provided with runways, windlasses, overhead trackage and system of trolleys running from the killing room into and connecting with chill and cold storage rooms, by which and upon which animals slaughtered can be raised, lowered and carried from killing room to chill room and cold storage rooms without handling same with hands; it shall be amply equipped with buckets, tubes and other utensils and devices into which the blood, offal and refuse shall be placed and immediately removed to the reduction plants without the necessity of handling with hands; the walls, ceilings and partitions in said building and the floor of the same shall be constructed of material susceptible of a high degree of sanitation and easily kept so; all apparatus, tools, knives and cleavers, etc., used in or about said building shall be kept perfectly clean; said room shall be provided with cuspidors, toilets, towels and soap for use of employes working therein. The chill room shall be of adequate size; the walls, partitions and ceilings of said room shall be thoroughly insulated with approved material, and equipped in such a manner that all condensation shall take place above carcasses and be promptly trapped out of the building, thereby securing as far as practicable dry refrigeration; said construction and equipment shall be such that the approximate temperature maintained shall be 40 degrees Fahrenheit; it shall also be equipped with overhead trolleys and trackage, connected with the killing rooms, and also with the cold storage or refrigerating room, and the same shall be sufficient in height and capacity to permit all animals slaugh-

tered to be hung from the trolleys, and no animal or portion of same shall be placed on the floor or permitted to rest thereon, and all animals and food products placed therein shall be handled with the hands as little as possible.

Cold storage and refrigerating rooms shall be of adequate size; and shall be equipped with adequate systems of artificial lights; the walls, partitions and ceilings of said room shall be thoroughly insulated with approved insulating material, and constructed in such a manner as to produce dry refrigeration, and said construction and equipment shall be such that the approximate temperature to be maintained shall be 43 degrees Fahrenheit. It shall also be connected with the killing room and chill room by overhead trackage and trolleys, which shall be sufficient in height, size and capacity to permit all animals killed and stored therein to be hung from the trolley, and no portion of same placed on the floor; the walls, partitions and floor shall be kept perfectly clean.

The reduction plant shall be of adequate size and equipment with vacuum pumps, engines, machinery and reduction plant of sufficient size and capacity to dispose of all offal, blood and residue resulting from the slaughtering of animals without odor, and the refuse shall be placed and immediately removed to the reduction plant without the necessity of handling with the hands; the walls, ceiling and partitions in said building, and the floor of the same, shall be constructed of material susceptible of a degree of sanitation, and easily kept so; and all knives, tools, apparatus and cleavers, etc., used in or about said building, shall be kept perfectly clean; said room shall be provided with cuspidors, towels, toilet room and soap for the use of employes working therein. The chill room shall be of adequate size; the walls, partitions and ceiling of said room shall be thoroughly insulated with approved material, and slaughtered animals shall be reduced as soon as practical after slaughtered.

Section 2. No person or persons, corporation or corporations shall er-

rect within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, a building in which animals are to be slaughtered and prepared for market or human food, unless the plans of such proposed building are first approved by the Health Officer of the City of Ann Arbor, and a plan of such proposed building shall be filed with the City Clerk.

Section 3. Every owner, lessee or occupier of a slaughter house in this City shall at all times afford free access to every part of such premises to the health officer, or to any committee or member of the Common Council, or its authorized agents, for the purpose of inspecting such premises or contents.

Section 4. Every abattoir or slaughter house where animals are slaughtered to be used as food, offered for sale, or sold for food within the limits of the City of Ann Arbor, shall be located at such places as are permitted by the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, and shall be so located as to permit connection with the sewer system and water service, and so it shall be supplied with an adequate supply of water for daily and constant flushing and purifying the place, with adequate sewerage and drainage for the speedy removal of all blood and other refuse from such slaughtering, killing or rendering.

Section 5. All abattoirs or slaughter houses in which animals are slaughtered, to be used as food, exhibited for sale, or sold for food in the City of Ann Arbor, shall be operated in accordance with the following provisions:

A. No animal intended for slaughter shall remain on the premises or premises immediately adjoining or adjacent thereto to exceed eighteen hours, and no animals shall be kept on such premises over night, and not more than 10 animals shall be kept at any one time.

B. No cattle, sheep or swine shall be killed for human food within the limits of the City of Ann Arbor, while such cattle, sheep or swine are in a diseased, overheated, or feverish or exhausted conditions. No calf which

shall be less than four weeks old; no pig, which shall be less than five weeks old, and no lamb, which shall be less than eight weeks old, shall be killed for human food, or same or any part thereof shall be kept or offered for sale in said City.

C. All tracks, traps and other receptacles, all chutes, platforms, racks, tables, etc., and all knives, saws, cleaver and other tools, and all utensils, machinery and articles used in moving, handling, cutting, chopping or other process shall be thoroughly cleaned before using.

D. No employee or other person shall be permitted to expectorate on the floor, and proper cuspidors which will not readily upset shall be provided for employes in each room, and shall be kept thoroughly clean and sanitary.

E. Water-closets and toilet rooms shall be required for employes, and such rooms shall be entirely separated from compartments in which carcasses are dressed, or meat food products are stored, placed, handled or prepared. Such closets, etc., shall be conveniently located, sufficient in number, and shall be kept in sanitary condition. Convenient and sanitary urinals and washstands shall be provided.

F. The room in which meat or meat food products are prepared, stored, packed or otherwise handled shall be free from odors from toilet rooms, catch basins, tank rooms, etc., and shall be kept free from flies and other vermin by screening or other methods.

G. Meat and food products must not be permitted to fall on floors, and in the event of their having fallen, the soiled portions must be removed and condemned.

H. Only good clean water shall be used in the preparation of carcasses, parts of meat, or meat food products, etc.

I. Each animal that is slaughtered shall be required to remain in the chill room and refrigerating room at least twelve hours before same is delivered to owner, or used for food, or offered for sale as food.

Section 6. No person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall bring or cause to be brought into, or

kept or offered for sale, in any public or private market in this City, any meat or dead animals, the flesh of which is intended to be used for human food, until such meat or dead animal shall have been fully and properly cooled, and until all blood shall have ceased dripping therefrom. No cased, blown, plaited, raised, stuffed, putrid, impure or unwholesome meat, fish, bird or fowl shall be held, bought or sold, or offered for sale for human food, in any place in this City.

Section 7. The provisions of the ordinance with reference to the equipment, management and operation of abattoirs or slaughter houses shall apply to all abattoirs or slaughter houses now in construction or operation, or that may hereafter be constructed or operated, and from and after thirty days from the time this ordinance shall become operative, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, association, butcher, vendor of meat, or any other person, to have any animal slaughtered to be used as food, or exhibited for sale as food, or sold for food, within the limits of the City of Ann Arbor, at any abattoir or slaughter house not equipped, managed and operated in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 8. From and after thirty days from the time this ordinance shall become operative, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, association, butcher or other person to erect, establish, maintain or operate any abattoir or slaughter house where animals are slaughtered to be used as food, or offered for sale as food, or sold for food, within the limits of the City of Ann Arbor, which abattoir or slaughter house is not constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with all of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. From and after the time this ordinance becomes operative every person, firm, corporation, association, butcher or other person operating any reduction plant shall gather all materials for rendering and render at least once in every twenty-four hours and the rendering of all dead animals not intended for food, is hereby prohibited within the

limits of the City of Ann Arbor.

Section 10. Any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine to be imposed upon the offender when duly convicted thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars, and the costs of prosecution, and in imposing such fine, the Court may make a further sentence that in default of the payment of such fine, and costs, the offender be imprisoned in the county jail of Washtenaw county, for a period of time not exceeding ninety days.

And every day any person or persons shall violate the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 11. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in the City of Ann Arbor, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed. Provided: that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent any farmer from killing, dressing or selling in the open market, unless diseased, any animals intended for food that he has raised, fed or slaughtered.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect ten days from legal publication.

Which was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to the ordinance committee by unanimous vote of those present, 14.

Ald. Sink presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance providing for the inspection of premises by fire department and regulating the burning of refuse, to safeguard the public and property against fire," which was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to the ordinance committee by unanimous vote of those present, 14.

Street Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your committee, to whom the petition of Vern McCrumb asking that the width of East University ave. be established recommends that the width of roadway be thirty-four feet according to ordinance.

We further recommend that a ten inch by twenty-four inch box culvert be placed across Depot st. at the foot of Fourth ave. and the gutter box through the crosswalk be doubled in

capacity and also that the storm water sewer be cleaned out.

E. W. Groves, C. A. Sink, I. L. Sherk, J. W. Markey, Theo. F. Prochnow, Albert Lutz, Albert Fiegel, Street Committee.

Ald. Groves moved the adoption of the report, which was adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 14.
Sidewalk Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your committee, to whom the communication from L. J. Allen, valuation engineer of the Ann Arbor Railroad, asking that the sidewalk grade on Madison st. along company property be rearranged so as not to alter the present established grade, was referred, recommends that grade on south west corner be fixed at two feet above present sidewalk.

We further recommend that new sidewalks be constructed on north side of Summit st. between Miner and Gott sts. and on the north side of Jefferson st. along the property No. 116; also that the Ann Arbor Railroad Company construct sidewalks where the tracks cross South Ashley and Jefferson sts.

We further recommend that a crosswalk be constructed on the west side of Miner st. across Brooks st., that a new railing be placed along culvert on the north side of Jefferson st. and driveway repaired on the east side of Ashley st. along property of Christian Koch.

Prochnow: Whereas, Frederick Osborn and Flora Osborn, as complainants, have taken certain proceedings in the Circuit Court of the county of Washtenaw, Michigan, in Chancery against the City of Ann Arbor, the Mayor of this City, the President of this Common Council, and the Aldermen as members of this Common Council of Ann Arbor, and City Engineer, respecting the rights of this City in and to certain lands known as the Steere farm lands, and have sought and obtained an injunction from one of the Circuit Court Commissioners of this county respecting the use of water or water

rights belonging to this City in said lands; and

Whereas, the City Attorney has advised that it is necessary to take certain proceedings in court to protect the rights of this City and of the others involved in said cause, which rights are regarded as important and necessary to be defended; therefore

Be it resolved, that the President of this Common Council and the City Clerk are hereby authorized to sign any paper or papers or pleadings in court that the City Attorney shall advise necessary and proper to be signed, respecting said proceedings, and that the action of such President and Clerk shall be regarded in behalf of all of the defendants named in said proceedings on the part of said Frederick and Flora Osborn; and

Resolved, further, that the City Attorney shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, to associate with him and employ as counsel or assistant such solicitor or counsel or lawyer of this City as he may desire in the defense of said proceedings in court.
