Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 24, 1914.

To the Honorable Common Council: Gentlemen—It is the order of the Board of Health of the city of Ann Arbor, that hereafter all cases of contagious disease classed as "indigent," shall be sent to the hospital for contagious diseases of the University of Michigan. And services rendered by physicians in such "indigent" cases for purposes of diag-

nosis only shall be remunerated in the usual manner through the Board of County Auditors. And for purposes of the curtailment and suppression as far as possible of contagion in this city the Board of Health urges upon all residents, who may from time to time become afflicted with contagious disease, to take advantage of the unsurpassed facilities of treatment offered by this special hospital.

To the Common Council of Ann Arbor City: Gentlemen—We are conducting the several moving picture theaters in this city, and endeavoring to give our patrons the best exhibitions that can be obtained, and feel justified in assuming that we have established a claim to the approval of the public, because of the manner in which we have always conducted our respective places, and because of the quality of the attractions furnished.

For many months past we have been urged by many of the best citizens of this city, to open our theaters on Sunday, and to display on such occasions films of an educational, historical and religious character, the same as are now being exhibited on Sunday in many of the cities of this state that have a population equal to that of Ann Arbor. We have hesitated to open our theaters on Sunday, for the reason that exhibitions of this kind have never been approved here in Ann Arbor by your honorable body. It has been strongly represented to us, and we think with some force, that a very large number of our citizens who are employed at more or less hard labor during the other days of the week, would thus be afforded an opportunity of attending such exhibitions, who cannot now do so, or who are compelled to leave the city for such purposes. It has also been represented to us that people who now seek desirable en-

tertainment, both in and out of the city on such days, would then be furnished entertainment of a character that is not only entertaining but instructive.

We therefore request your honorable body to grant us permission, for a period of sixty days, to open our several theaters on Sunday, to the end that we may ascertain whether or not such a course will meet with the approval of our best citizenship, hereby pledging ourselves to exhibit only films of the character above described, and with the understanding that such course will be discontinued before the expiration of said sixty day period, if we are directed so to do by your honorable body.

Should this request be granted, we severally as our guests invite your members, or a committee of your members, and your police department, and any committee of citizens that you have a mind to appoint, to attend during such period our respective theaters, for the purpose of passing judgment upon the desirability of a continuance of such course after the expiration of said sixty day period.

To the Honorable The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—In the matter of the petition of George Stoll claiming damages to shade trees in front of his property, on Packard st., referred to me by your honorable body under date of September 7th, 1914, I report as follows:

I have made an investigation of the claim and find that the trees were in the lawn extension and entirely under the Supervision of the Board of Park Commissioners. The trimming of trees and the removal of one tree was all done under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, and was done as a public improvement and for a lawful purpose. In my opinion no liability has attached to the City by the action aforesaid, and I therefore recommend that his claim be not allowed.
