Whereas, this body is of the opin-
ion that the adoption of eastern
standard time for the six months
above named would be beneficial to
the city at large, now

Therefore, be it resolved, that
eastern standard time is hereby de-
signed as the official time for the
city of Ann Arbor for the months of
April, May, June, July, August and
September of each year, and that
central standard time be and is here-
by designated as the official time for
the city of Ann Arbor for the months
of October, November, December,
January, February, and March of
each year.

Resolved, further, that the county
officials and the University author-
ities be asked to adopt the above
time as their official time for the
periods above stated, and that the
county authorities and the University
be asked to regulate the county
clock and university clock accord-
ingly.

Resolved, further, that this resolu-
tion take effect after July 1, 1917,

and after the University officials and
County officials take similar action.
