Mayor's Message.

"To the Hon. the Common Council,
City of Ann Arbor:

"Gentlemen—Our nation is now beginning its second year of the great world war, and so, too, is your honorable body in its second year of administration of the affairs of the city under war conditions. During the past year you have administered the affairs of the city under war conditions such as none of your predecessors have ever had to confront. These conditions undoubtedly will continue as long as the war lasts. While these conditions have made your task more burdensome, still as true American citizens, you have accepted those conditions and have endeavored to do your full duty not only to your city but also to our nation.

"Many of the problems which confront you, in connection with municipal affairs, during the past year were very trying, and in many instances you were inconvenienced on account of limited funds. However, I feel that both the council and the citizens are to be congratulated for all they have been able to accomplish under the unusual conditions in the cost of labor and materials, which advance is almost without parallel.

"I feel that it is hardly necessary for me to review the various needs of our city, as you are constantly being reminded of them through other channels and I feel that you are endeavoring to care for those needs in a manner suitable to the present conditions.

"I feel that we should, during the present year, endeavor to take care of only the absolute needs of our city in the matter of public works. I would therefore recommend that our paving program be discontinued for the present. However, I do not wish to be understood as advocating the neglect of our present pavements or our other streets.

"I feel that the present pavements should be given careful attention and that all bad spots should be repaired as fast as they are brought to the attention of the officers in charge. I

feel that it would be poor economy to allow the pavements to become so out of repair that it would practically necessitate the construction of new pavements. I feel that special care and attention should be given to the proper drainage on all of the dirt streets of the city.

"I am fully convinced that the street department is not adequately equipped to do the work which has been expected of that department. I am of the opinion that a scarifier and road roller is an absolute necessity, and in the end will be an economy. I feel that such equipment would soon earn its cost in the saving of hand labor and gravel, two items which are now very costly.

"One important matter which must be taken care of and carried through without any delay which can be prevented by any of the officials of the city, is the construction of the pumping station on the so-called Steere farm and the water main to the city of Ann Arbor. The electors by a large majority approved of the issue of \$200,000 worth of bonds to develop this source of water supply, and I feel that it is the duty of your honorable body to give this matter your immediate attention and to secure the counsel of some practical water works engineer in order to expedite the construction of the plant and main and justly develop this source of water supply. I feel that such steps should be taken at once.

"Our city having been assessed on a cash basis now makes it possible for your honorable body to raise sufficient funds to care for all the various needs of the city. However, you should not ignore the present war conditions. Our city is called upon to assist in financing the costs of the war in the way of purchasing bonds and making subscriptions to the various worthy causes connected with the war, and I would therefore urge upon you to take the greatest care, and to take all of those various matters into consideration, in making up your budget for the ensuing year. I feel that you should carefully scrutinize every estimate and eliminate every item which you feel can be safely eliminated without endangering the welfare of our city.

"I desire at this time to express my appreciation to all of the officials and members of the various departments for their efforts and interest displayed for the welfare of the city, and for

their assistance and support which they have given me in the past year. There has been a splendid spirit of co-operation among all of the different officials and I feel that they all have been working to the end to make Ann Arbor a better and more desirable place in which to live.

"Again asking for a continuance of this whole hearted co-operation to the end that we may have an efficient and economical administration for the coming year and extending to you all my best wishes, I remain,

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Sink presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to provide for the oiling or sprinkling of dirt streets in the city of Ann Arbor, and providing a method of raising the funds to defray the expenses thereof." "The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor ordain:" which was given its first reading by title, and referred to the Ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Heusel, Huss, Mayer, Henderson, Prochnow, Markey, Donnelly, Hauser, Spathelf, Freeman, MacGregor, Sink, Lutz, Pres. Reichert, 15. Nays, none.

Ald. Sink presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to prevent the operating of billiard and pool rooms and bowling alleys on Sunday, providing the hours during which said places of business may remain open." "The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor ordain:" which was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to Ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Heusel, Huss, Mayer, Henderson, Prochnow, Markey, Donnelly, Hauser, Spathelf, Freeman, MacGregor, Sink, Lutz, Pres. Reichert, 15. Nays, none.

Ald. Sink presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading: "An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, 'An Ordinance relative to Fire Limits and Fires,'" passed October 7, 1895; approved October 12, 1895; amended June 4, 1900; amended March 19, 1906; amended Dec. 3, 1906; amended April 10, 1913; amended August 17, 1914; amended

Nov. 15, 1915:

The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section six of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to Fire Limits and Fires," passed October 7, 1895; approved October 12, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 6. No person shall carry any fire on or through any public streets, lanes, alleys or other public places of the city, or in or through any private lot or premises unless the said fire be placed in a securely closed pan or vessel, but it is hereby permitted that any owner or occupant of residence or business places in the city may collect leaves, rubbish, paper, paste board boxes or store sweepings into small heaps in or near the gutters of any street, excepting paved streets, adjacent to the premises owned or occupied by him or her and may destroy the said articles by burning; provided, that no such fires shall be started or permitted to burn before seven o'clock in the morning nor after two o'clock p. m. upon any day or shall be so placed as to endanger any shade or ornamental tree standing in any street or other public place, or to obstruct public traffic and provided also, that the permission herein granted for the building of fires in the public streets shall not in any way operate to relieve or discharge any person or persons from any liability to actions for damages of any kind which may accrue or be brought against him or them on account of the neglect or evil intent of the said person or persons. And after any fire shall have been built in the street the person or persons having the care of or responsibility for the same shall closely watch and guard the same and shall cause the same to be promptly extinguished at two o'clock p. m. and all ashes resulting from the same, together with all combustible articles or substances remaining thereafter, to be promptly removed from the street. No fire shall be built under the permission herein granted, nor in any lot or private enclosure for similar purposes unless the same shall be in charge of persons of mature years and discretion.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by the following vote:

Ald. Sink presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading: "An ordinance relative to curbs and gutters." "The Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor ordain:"

Section 1. Whenever the Common Council shall be applied to in writing, signed by the parties owning a majority of the foot frontage of the real estate on the line of any street or alley or part thereof, proposed to be curbed and guttered, and which may be subject to assessment, for such curb and gutter, to curb and gutter any street or alley or part thereof, said common council may, by resolution, order that said street or alley, within specified limits and included in said application shall be curbed and guttered, and shall thereupon refer the matter to the Board of Public Works.

Section 2. Upon reference to the said Board of Public Works of any such resolution, said Board, with all convenient dispatch, shall determine as to the particular kind of materials to be used for the proposed improvement and shall estimate in detail the quantity of material, the probable cost and expense of such work and of the materials, and make a record thereof in their office, and shall cause to be prepared, so far as necessary, plans and specifications for such improvement, and refer such determination and estimate and plans and specifications to the Common Council at its next regular meeting.

Section 3. Whenever such plans and specifications and estimates have been submitted to the Common Council by said Board of Public Works, it shall be the duty of the Common Council to examine the same and approve or reject the same.

If said plans and specifications shall be approved by said Common Council, they shall declare by resolution, adopted by vote of a majority of all the members elect that said curb and gutter is a necessary improvement, and the matter shall again be referred to the Board of Public Works, and the approval of said Common Council made known to said Board.

Section 4. Upon reference to said Board of Public Works of the plans and specifications for such improve-

ment, so approved by the Common Council, said Board of Public Works shall proceed to advertise for proposals for the furnishing of the materials and the performance of the work and the construction of the said curb and gutter in accordance with Section one hundred thirty-seven of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor; and all bids submitted to said Board of Public Works shall be opened by it as soon thereafter as possible and it shall be reported by said Board of Public Works to the Common Council, together with its recommendation thereto; and no contract shall be made by said Board until duly authorized by the Common Council.

Section 5. Whenever the Common Council shall have approved the plans and specifications for any such improvement and shall have authorized the execution by the Board of Public Works of a contract therefor, it shall, by resolution, declare that for the purpose of assessment to defray the expense of such improvement, the taxable lands and parcels of real estate which in the opinion of the Common Council are benefitted by such improvement, specify the same and fix the boundary thereof, which constitute a special assessment district.

Section 6. After such determination the City Clerk shall forthwith certify such resolution, so fixing the boundaries of such assessment district, with the estimated costs of such improvement exclusive of such portions of said estimated costs less than the whole thereof, as the Common Council may have determined should be assessed on the owners of the real estate adjacent to said proposed curb and gutter, which shall not be more than fifty per cent, exclusive of street intersections, proceed to make a special assessment roll in which he shall set down all of the lands and tenements situated in said special assessment district liable to taxation, under the proper description and with the names of the owners or occupants, also the number of front feet of each owner abutting on said proposed curb and gutter and shall assess to the owners or occupants of each and against each parcel of land so liable to taxation such sums of money as shall equal the pro rata share per front foot of all property abutting thereon.

Section 7. After the certification of any such assessment district as provided in section six of this ordi-

nance, the common council may, at any regular meeting thereof by resolution adopted by a majority of all of the members elect authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute under their hands and the seal of the city of Ann Arbor bonds of said city payable to bearer, one year from the first day of the following August.

All such bonds shall be known as "Curb and Gutter Bonds," and issued in series conforming with the number of the curb and gutter district on account of which any such bonds shall have issued. All such bonds shall be delivered by the City Clerk to the City Treasurer.

Provided, that not more than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) in amount of any such bonds shall be outstanding at any one time.

Section 8. Whenever any such bonds shall have been delivered to the City Treasurer he shall without delay proceed to sell the same for the best price obtainable, but none of such bonds shall be sold for less than the face value thereof.

Section 9. The City Treasurer shall keep strict account of all the moneys so received on the sale of such bonds and each of the said curbs and gutters shall have in the Treasurer's account a separate fund devoted thereto; and all the money obtained on the sale of bonds shall be applied to the payment of the costs and expenses of the construction of the particular curb and gutter for which the same was issued, and all necessary assessments or other moneys paid on account thereof shall be devoted and applied to the payment of such curb and gutter bond and if there should be any surplus moneys arising on the construction of any such curb and gutters, the same shall be applied to the payment of such curb and gutters bonds and the refunding of a per cent of all such curb and gutter taxes and assessments which may have been paid in full, equal to the per cent of any such surplus, and a sum of money equal to the percent of any such surplus shall be remitted and deducted from the last installment of any such tax thereafter to be paid and collected, and if there should be a deficiency, that is to say, if the estimated cost shall prove to be less than the actual cost then an additional assessment shall be levied and collected, to make good and cover any such deficiency.

Section 10. That immediately after such special assessment roll shall have

been completed, the said assessor shall, having certified his doings thereon, deliver the same to the City Clerk, who shall number and entitle the same and lay the same before the Common Council at the next regular meeting thereof. Curbs and gutters and all proceedings related thereto shall be designated by consecutive numbers in the order of the date of the passage of the resolution requiring construction.

Section 11. Whenever any such special assessment roll shall be presented to the Common Council it shall at such meeting, or at the next meeting fix and set a time for the review of the same, which shall be at the Council Chamber at two o'clock in the afternoon not less than fifteen days or more than thirty days thereafter. The City Clerk shall forthwith cause notice of the time so fixed to be published in one of the newspapers of the said city.

Section 12. At the time so fixed for the review of said special roll, the Common Council shall meet at the Council Chamber as a Board of Review at which time and at all other times to which the review of any such special assessment roll may be adjourned, any person interested may appear in person or by agent, or attorney, and the Common Council as such board of review, shall have power and authority to review such special assessment roll, to add to any tax or assessment thereon, or to reduce the same, and fully and fairly to equalize the taxes and assessments spread thereon, according to the benefits coming to such parcel of the same by such public improvements.

Section 13. That after the Common Council, sitting as such Board of Review, shall have completed the review of any such special assessment roll, they shall so declare by resolution, whereupon at the next meeting of the Common Council the City Clerk shall report the proceedings of said Board of Review to the Common Council, when the question shall be, "Shall the special assessment roll be confirmed?" which shall be determined in the affirmative only by a majority vote of all the members elect.

Whenever any such special assessment roll shall have been thus confirmed by the Common Council it shall be final and conclusive and shall from the date of such confirmation be and continue a lien upon the respective lots or parces of land as-

essed and set down therein and shall be a charge against the person or persons to whom assessed, until paid.

Section 14. After the confirmation of any such special assessment roll it shall be the duty of the City Clerk to certify the said assessment roll together with the resolution of confirmation to the City Assessor, who shall forthwith attach thereto his warrant directed to the City Treasurer, commanding him to collect from all, each and every one of the persons assessed in said such assessment roll, the sum of money assessed to and set opposite his name therein. The said taxes or assessments shall become payable and due the first of July next after any such assessment roll shall have been confirmed along with the city taxes and annually. All of the said taxes or assessments shall draw interest annually from the date of the confirmation of any such assessment roll at the rate of five per cent per annum until paid. Any such person against whom any such tax or assessment shall have been assessed shall have leave and be at liberty to pay the same at any time after such assessment roll shall have been certified to the City Treasurer, with interest from the date of confirmation only; provided, that at any time after a special assessment has become payable the same may be collected by suit in the name of the city against the person assessed in an action of assumpsit in any court having jurisdiction of the amount.

In every such action, a declaration upon the Common Council for money paid shall be sufficient. The special assessment roll and a certified order or resolution confirming the same shall be prima facie evidence of the regularity of all the proceedings in making the assessment, and the right of the city to recover judgment thereon.

Section 15. On the third Monday in June in each and every year in which any such curb and gutter tax or assessment shall remain unpaid, and be due and payable the City Treasurer shall report to the City Clerk all unpaid and payable curb and gutter taxes or assessments, who shall report the same to the Common Council at its next regular meeting; and the Common Council shall on the fourth Monday in June in each year certify to the City Assessor along with the taxes to be assessed for city purposes, all due and unpaid curb and

gutter taxes or assessments; and the City Assessor shall thereupon spread upon the general city tax roll of that year all such curb and gutter taxes or assessments so remaining unpaid; provided, that all such curb and gutter taxes or assessments shall be carried out and entered in a special column on such general tax roll with interest thereon as aforesaid, the tax in one column and the interest thereon in another column which shall be entitled respectively "Curb and Gutter Taxes." And the sum or sums of money so set down and spread upon any such general city tax roll shall be, remain and continue a valid debt, demand and tax against the land so assessed as aforesaid, until fully paid; and it shall be certified to the City Treasurer and collected in the same manner as other taxes set down and spread upon such general tax roll.

Section 16. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"
