To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Sewer committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer relative to the construction of lateral sewers in sewer districts No. 86, on Hoover ave., from Main st. west 400 feet, and No. 87, on Ninth st., from Huron st. south 225 feet, begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports, as well as the resolution of the Council, under consideration, and have made due inquiries relating thereto, and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewers in said districts Nos. 86 and 87, and that special taxing or assessment districts ought to be fixed by the Common Council, upon and against which the construction of such sewers may be charged, street crossings excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the City Engineer, and the Board of Public Works be ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewers.

Whereas, the cost of constructing said pumping station and pipe line has been estimated at the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00), and

Whereas, the said City has not the funds on hand with which to construct said pumping station and pipe line, and it is necessary to raise the same by loan, therefore

It is hereby resolved:

That the proposition of raising, by loan, the sum of two hundred thousand dollars, and issuing bonds of the city of Ann Arbor therefor, be submitted to the duly qualified electors of said city at a special election to be held on Saturday, June 29th, 1918, said bonds to be payable not more than ten years from date of issue and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, and the proceeds thereof to be

used for the purpose of constructing said pumping station and pipe line as aforesaid.

2nd.
