From the Mayor—

To the Honorable, the Common Council—Gentlemen: I herewith submit to you a complete acceptance by Asst. General Manager Burdick for the Detroit, Jackson & Chicago Ry., of the Special Street Railway Committee's report which was accepted by your honorable body at its regular meeting of July 21st. I consider this to be an acceptance by the Company to fulfill its part of the agreement.

I further wish to inform you that since the Railway company have started the double tracking of Main street, it is found to be more practical and far better both for the city as well as to the company to have the double tracks continue to the switches or turnouts on Huron and Packard streets. The officials of the company have requested this permission and I feel that same should be granted.

Detroit, Jackson & Chicago Railway, Detroit, Mich., July 25, 1919.

Prof. Henry C. Riggs, Ann Arbor, Mich., Dear Mr. Riggs: We have your letter of July 22nd, enclosing copy of the report drafted by you dated July 21st, and presented to the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Permit me to state that I believe that the report expresses very clearly and accurately the matters which we had under consideration, and, further, that the statements of the mutual undertakings and agreements on the part of the representatives of the city and the company are set forth as discussed by us.

In order that there may be no misunderstanding about the matter. I wish to takke this opportunity to repeat that it is the intention and desire of the company to carry out what you have set forth in this report; of course it necessarily follows that we shall expect the city to carry out, also, its share of the agreement.

We surely would not undertake the expenditure of a large sum of

money during the present year in Ann Arbor and work upon the plans and details of further large expenditures for the next two or three years unless we felt that there was an actual spirit of co-operation between the city of Ann Arbor and this public service company.

Of course, I realize that in the city of Ann Arbor, like every other city, there are men who prefer to see constant turmoil and disagreement with all public service corporations, rather than a determined effort on the part of the officials of the city and the officials of the company to overcome the same.

It is gratifying, however, to learn that the officers of your municipality have so quickly and unanimously acted upon these matters as to make it possible for us to go ahead with our plans for the improvements which will tend not only to enable us to give better service, but which will represent, also, a very substantial improvement to the city of Ann Arbor.

In conclusion, may I state that we considered the matters contained in your report of the 21st instant very carefully and while I am frank to confess that the amount involved to make these improvements, and the extension desired, was considerably more than I felt the company could afford within the time indicated, however, the spirit of fairness manifested by the committee and the city officials caused me to exert every means to procure for your city all I could.

You may, if you wish, present this letter to the appropriate city authorities, as my consent to the report indicated.
