Reports of City Treasurer, Clerk, Acting Marshal, Engineer and Street Commissioner for month of February received and ordered to take usual course.

By Alderman Lutz:

Whereas, it is necessary for the City of Ann Arbor to obtain certain lands adjoining the so-called "Steere Farm" in order that the City may continue to operate pumping station number three, being the so-called "Steere Farm" Water Plant and

Whereas, the cost of purchasing the land which the Water Commissioners deem necessary to purchase is estimated at the sum of Eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00), and

Whereas, the said City has not the funds on hand with which to purchase said lands and it is necessary to raise said sum by loan, therefore be it

Resolved, that the proposition of raising by loan the sum of Eighty-five thousand dollars and issuing the bonds of the City of Ann Arbor therefore, be submitted to the duly qualified electors of said City at a special election to be held on Monday, April 5th, 1920, said bonds to be payable not more than fifteen years from date of issue and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum and the proceeds thereof to be used for the purpose of obtaining title to such lands in the Township of Pittsfe'd in Washtenaw County, Michigan, in the vicinity of the lands at present owned by the City either by purchase or condemnation, be it further

Resolved, that said election be held in the several wards in the City of Ann Arbor as follows:

First Ward, Voting Room, Basement of City Hall; Second Ward, Ward Building on South Ashley
