From Board of Park Commissioners.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor, Gentlemen:—

When the Board of Park Commissioners presented its annual budget last May for your approval, Commissioner Douglas spoke of the possibility of requiring a special appropriation for spraying trees on lawn extensions and in city parks. The development of various insects which attack trees was closely watched during the past season and the Board decided that it would be necessary to begin and carry on an extensive spraying campaign against scale insects and plant lice which are multiplying rapidly on the shade trees in the city.

This city has always been proud of the large number of fine trees which line our streets and avenues. So far we have escaped the insect pests which have cost Detroit and other cities thousands of dollars annually to combat, and the loss of thousands of their trees. This is due in part to good fortune, but largely due to the fact that the Park Commission has been alert to the danger which threatens and quick to eradicate any infestation before it had an opportunity to gain a foothold and spread to all parts of the city. There are now, in the city, scattered colonies of woolly and green aphids, or plant lice, and quite a general distribution of oyster scale on certain varieties of trees and shrubs. These can only be controlled by thorough spraying.

It is necessary that a large amount of spraying be done before the buds open. We therefore ask you to make a special appropriation of \$400.00 at once, for spraying trees and shrubs on city property.

Ordinance Committee

Ald. Reichert, presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to designate the official time of the City of Ann Arbor.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That the official time of the City of Ann Arbor from two o'clock a. m. of the last Sunday of October in each year until two o'clock a. m. of the last Sunday of

March in the following year shall be United States Central Standard time and that on two o'clock a. m. of the last Sunday of March of each year the time of said City shall be advanced one hour, to what is commonly known as United States Eastern standard time, which said time shall be the official time of the city of Ann Arbor from two o'clock a. m. on the last Sunday of March of each year to two o'clock a. m. of the last Sunday in October of each year.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

Sewer Committee Report

To the Honorable, the Common Council, Gentlemen:

Your Sewer Committee has had the following matters under consideration and respectfully recommends:

1. That Sanitary sewers be constructed as follows: On Soule Blvd. from Maxwell ave. to Elder Blvd.; on Elder Blvd. from Buchanan to Soule Blvd., and on Lutz ave. from Elder Blvd. to Eber White Blvd.; on Pontiac st. from Moore st. to city limits; on Onondaga st. from Hill st. to Dorset road; on Seventh st. from Madison st. south about 800 or 900 ft.

2. That storm water sewers be constructed as follows: On Hill st. from Oswego to Onondaga sts.; on Sixth st. from end of street south towards Liberty st., about 300 ft., Fuller st. from State st. to Elizabeth st.; Kingsley st. from State st. to Ingalls st., and south on Ingalls st. to Lawrence st.; Kingsley st. from Allen's creek to alley east of Main st., and thence south in alley in B. 3 N., R. 4 E., from Kingsley st. to Catherine st.

3. That the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and estimates of cost for above named sanitary and storm sewers.

4. That the construction of said sanitary and storm sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be ne-

cessary public improvements.

Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the curbing and guttering of Olivia ave. from Cambridge road to Granger ave., within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the curbing and guttering of that part of Olivia ave., within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore be it

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause Olivia ave., within the limits aforesaid, to be curbed and guttered under the charter and ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and fifty per cent of the remaining shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Olivia ave., within the limits aforesaid.
