Mayor's Message.

May 2, 1921.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, City of Ann Arbor, Gentlemen: It has been the custom for many years for the mayor at the beginning of his term of office to make certain recommendations. I have sometimes felt that this was only a matter of form and that his recommendations were forgotten by the time he had finished reading his message. However, I hope that will not be true this time. I hope the chairman of each committee will consider carefully those recommendations which pertain to the work of his committee.

This is a time when the tendency of everything is to reduce costs, therefore, in making up our budget for the coming year we must reduce wherever possible. At the same time we must not go so far in this as to be neglectful in the maintenance and upkeep of our city. Ann Arbor has the reputation of being one of the best and most beautiful cities in the country to live in and we must keep it in that class.

I hope that during the coming year we can get close co-operation between the various boards and this body. I would recommend that you request the various boards to report to you at times. I feel that at many times there is a misunderstanding between the Board of Public Works and the Common Council. I would like to see you request a member of this Board to be present at all council meetings. Often when requests from the Board are held up by you, they could be passed upon if there was a member present to give you a satisfactory explanation.

Now that the Street Department has good equipment to work with they ought to be able to keep our streets in good condition. I feel that there was a big improvement made last year, however, there is still further chance for

betterment. The first impression people get of a city is the one formed by riding over the streets in entering the city. These streets ought to be the best and in our city there is a big opportunity for improving the entrances.

You have very wisely held up any further paving until next year. I feel that before doing any more paving, excepting that which has been recommended by your honorable body, that you should give this matter very careful consideration as to what streets you pave and how much you do. Paving is very expensive and something over 30 percent of the cost is spread on the tax rolls. Then the maintenance of paved streets is high. I would like to see our streets divided into three classes, those where the traffic is very heavy, paved, where the traffic is lighter, a good gravel street built and where the traffic is light, a good dirt street. If we would also encourage the property owners to have their streets curbed and guttered and then the city gravel them, we would have good streets and I believe on the second class streets that the cost of maintenance would be less than if these streets were paved.

Perhaps one of the most annoying things the people have to contend with is the dust nuisance. At the present time the public is demanding both oil and calcium chloride. I hope we will soon be able to determine which gives the best satisfaction and then only make use of one of these, as the use of both increases the expense to the city. Another matter that should be given some attention is the removal of dust from our paved streets.

Before we can build good streets we must drain the water off. Professors Hoad & Decker have made plans for our future sewerage system and we should follow these plans as closely as possible and build what storm sewers are necessary. It is very gratifying to know that our street department has been able to build sewers much below the price of the lowest bidder. I highly recommend that as long as this condition exists that this department be allowed to do the construction work. I feel that it is highly desirable to do so in these times when labor

is plentiful. Before going far with this we will have to do some work in Allan's Creek. I hope you will give this careful consideration and start at least the financing of the same at once.

Another matter which should receive some consideration this year is the disposal of our sewerage. Sometime in the future the city may be stopped from emptying it into the Huron river. When the time comes, it is going to mean an added expense to the city and, therefore, should receive careful study.

I would like to call the attention of our Street Committee to the condition of the old hitching posts on Main street. Perhaps most of these could be removed. I think everything that is possible should be done to improve the appearance of our streets.

Our Water Department is in very good condition. We now have three pumping plants well equipped. The water that is being furnished to the city is exceptionally good for drinking purposes. However, I hope the day will come when it can be softened and some of the iron removed so as to reduce the maintenance of plumbing systems. The meters are all installed and as a result the amount of water pumped has been reduced 1-3 to 1-2. Since the installation of meters the operating cost has increased only 6 percent. The new rates put into effect about a year ago seem to be very satisfactory. They are not so high as to be a burden on the user and yet they will bring in enough revenue so that the department can be properly financed. While our city is in litigation over some rights at Station No. 3, yet I feel that the water commission is handling this with very good judgment.

Our Health Department has been doing some very good work. There has been a gradual decrease in contagious diseases in your city. The percent of these diseases have been less during the past year than in any other city in the state. Since employing a milk inspector, there has been a big improvement in our milk supply and today I believe we are getting very good milk.

Our Fire Department seems to be fairly well equipped, however, I would recommend that the Fire

Committee and fire commissioners investigate what needs to be done to reduce our insurance rate. I believe a reduction in these rates would warrant your spending some money for more equipment.

Our Park Department like our Street Department can do a great deal to improve the beauty of our city. I would recommend that they properly trim our trees so that we can get the most out of our lighting system. I would also like to see our parks and playgrounds improved as much as possible.

I wish to very strongly recommend that you carefully consider the revision of our ordinances during the coming year. We have many ordinances now which would be absurd for our Police Department to enforce. I also recommend that you take under consideration such an ordinance as clean up ordinance, one of Railroad Crossings and one on Building codes.

Again, I hope to see closer cooperation between the various boards and the city officials. It is my intention to be in the city building from 11 to 12 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays. I hope to have many meetings with the various boards, committees and city officials and I will welcome their coming in to discuss matters with me.

In closing I sincerely trust that I will have your full co-operation in performing the duties of this office.

Sewer Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your Sewer Committee respectfully recommends:

1. That sanitary sewer be constructed on Day street, from present sewer to city limits, provided that street be graded first.

2. That matter of opening Krause street to Murray avenue be referred to City Attorney, and when said street is opened we recommend that a sanitary sewer be constructed.

3. That storm water sewers be constructed on Depot street, from Allen's Creek to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue from Depot street to Beakes street, on Beakes street from Fourth avenue to Fifth avenue, on Fourth avenue from Beakes street to Kingsley street, and on Summit street from Fifth avenue to Beakes street.

4. That provided Mr. Clarence Grayer digs the ditch for storm sewer from his garage on Broad-

way to end of storm sewer on said street, the city will provide and lay pipe, and the Board of Public Works are instructed to proceed when ditch is dug.

5. That storm sewer be constructed on Seventh street from Madison north to the Creek, and gutters be deepened on Seventh street, Madison street, to Davis avenue.

6. That gutter be deepened on Chapin street and inlet be put in at intersection of Huron street.

7. That the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and estimates of cost for above named sanitary and storm sewers, and the construction of the same is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Gentlemen—In the matter of the assessment levied against the Government property for the construction of pavement on Catherine street, in district No. 40, which matter was referred to me at your meeting of April 7th, 1921, beg leave to report as follows:

The property against which this assessment was levied is, of course, not subject to taxation for any purpose, either for a general tax or for a special tax for local improvements. There is no way by which the sum which has been levied against the postoffice property can be collected, unless the Federal government should voluntarily pay the amount which would be the proportionate share to be borne by said property if the same was subject to taxation.

It clearly appears from a letter received by the custodian of the local postoffice from the Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, under date of April 4th, 1921, that the Federal government does not intend to pay the amount assessed against the property. Therefore, the only thing that can be done

will be to cancel this assessment and to include the same in the present budget and spread it as a general tax.

Gentlemen—In the matter of the Cook Spring company, assessment district No. 94, which said matter was referred to me by your honorable body under date of April 18th, 1921, beg leave to report as follows:

I know of no way by which this assessment can be cancelled. All of the proceedings taken to fix this assessments were of course taken in conformity with the provisions of the charter of the City of Ann Arbor, and there would be no way by which the assessment could now be cancelled unless the council should care to make a donation to the Cook Spring company in the amount which has been levied against the property of said company.

The City of Ann Arbor as a whole has paid something over \$1,900 for the construction of this sewer, and, of course, the only reason for constructing it was to connect the property owned by the Cook Spring company with the sewer.

I have been informed that certain individuals promised the Cook Spring company that they would not have to pay any sewer assessment. But it is unfortunate that such promises should be made by anyone, such promises are not binding in any way upon the city of Ann Arbor, and while the promises made might have misled the people who are interested in the Cook Spring company, of course, the City of Ann Arbor cannot be held responsible for such promises.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

Gentlemen—In the matter of converting Allen's Creek into a storm sewer or county drain, which said matter was referred to me by your honorable body under date of April 18th, 1921, beg leave to report as follows:

The state drain laws provide that the County Drain Commissioners shall have the same authority to construct drains through cities or villages in the state that they have to construct drains in their respective counties. The laws provide that before the Commissioner can take any action towards locating, establishing, widening, deepening or extending any drain there shall be filed with him an application, signed by a number of free holders, liable to assessment for benefits received. Said number shall be equal to one-third of the number of free holders whose lands are crossed by said drain.

Therefore, in order to start in motion the necessary proceedings to convert Allen's Creek into a county drain it will be necessary to have such a petition as is provided for by the law above quoted, which is Section 4880 of the Compiled Laws of 1915.

Section 4875 of the Compiled Laws of Michigan of 1915, provides that where a drain runs through a city or village a resolution adopted by a majority vote of the Common Council of said city or village, granting leave to construct such drain therein and designating the name of the street or pointing out the alley or other public place to be traversed by such drain shall be sufficient release of the right of way, and shall be deemed a sufficient conveyance under the provisions of the act relative to the construction of drains.

I feel that the above named sections point out the way in which this creek might be converted into a county drain.

We have same equipment as last year, and about the same amount of supplies.

Total number of fires, 212.

Laid 24,300 feet of hose.

Used 1,463 gallons of chemicals.

Used 2,551 feet of ladders.

Traveled 281 4-10 miles.

Total expense of operating department, \$35,442.

Insurance on buildings and contents where fires occurred, \$977,976.

Loss on buildings and contents, \$154,421.74, with one fire not adjusted.
