### Petition to Vacate Streets

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

We, the undersigned, more than ten freeholders of the city of Ann Arbor respectfully petition your Honorable Body to discontinue and vacate certain portions or parts of the following streets:

"That portion of Oakland avenue included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe street and the east line of Oakland Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Oakland Avenue, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the west line of Oakland Avenue, thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the east line of Oakland Ave., thence southerly to the point of beginning.

"That portion of Haven Ave. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe street and the east line of Haven Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Haven Ave., thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Ave. and the west line of Haven Ave., thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University and the east line of

Haven Ave. thence southerly to the point of beginning.

"That portion of College Ave. included between the east line of East University and the west line of Church st.

"That portion of East University Ave. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of East University, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of East University, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of North University and the west line of East University, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the east line of East University Ave., thence southerly to the point of beginning.

"That portion of Church St. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of Church St., thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of Church St., thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the west line of Church St., thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the east line of Church St. thence southerly to the point of beginning.

We further petition your Honorable Body if you determine the proposed improvement advisable to give proper legal notice of the pendency of the question of ordering such proposed improvement to the owners occupants or persons interested, or his, or her, or their agent, or representative, and of the time and place the Common Council shall hear the persons interested therein.

Whereas, the said streets are to be used by the University of Michigan for campus and building purposes in connection with the building program of the University, and

In Consideration of the closing of the said streets, the University of Michigan herewith submits the following proposals for consideration, and by it to be performed:

1. The University will round the Northeast corner of the junction of Twelfth Street and North University.

2. The University will reimburse the City for its share of the costs of paving the sections closed of East University and Church Street.

3. The University will furnish the land or pay the necessary cost of the land required to connect Forest Avenue to Fourteenth Street.

4. The University will assume any suits for damages on account of closing these streets, if any such should arise.

5. The City to gravel a portion of the old streets on State Street and South University near the corner of State Street and South University and on State Street and North University near the corner of State Street and North University, and use for parking space for automobiles.

In submitting the foregoing proposals it is clearly understood that the University of Michigan will purchase all the property abutting on the streets to be closed and that the city shall give a deed to the streets at such time as the University shall have purchased all said property abutting on said streets and contiguous thereto. The use of said streets pending such purchase to be given to the present property owners living thereon.

It is understood that this proposal is subject to such modifica-

tions as shall be deemed mutually agreeable between the city and the University.

"That portion of Haven Ave. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe St. and the east line of Haven Ave., thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe St. and the west line of Haven Ave., thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Ave., and the west line of Haven Ave., thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University and the east line of Haven Ave., thence southerly to the point of beginning.

"That portion of College Ave. included between the east line of East University and the west line of Church st.

"That portion of East University Ave. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of East University, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west

line of East University thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of North University and the west line of East University, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the east line of East University Ave., thence southerly to the point of beginning.

"That portion of Church St. included in the following description: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of Church St., thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of Church St., thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the west line of Church St., thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Ave. and the east line of Church St. thence southerly to the point of beginning."

And Whereas, the Council does hereby determine the proposed improvement advisable therefore,

Be it resolved, that the Common Council shall give notice of the pendency of the question of ordering such proposed improvement to the owners, occupants, or persons interested, or his, her or their agent, or representative by personal service, if they reside within the said city; if they shall reside without the said city then said service shall be made by posting up notices in five or more public places in the said city, which notice shall state the time and place, when and where the Common Council will meet to consider the same and shall designate to a common certainty the avenues and streets to be discontinued and vacated, and which notice shall be posted at least ten days before the time of the hearing and at which said meeting the Council shall hear the persons interested therein. And the Council does hereby designate the time and place of said meeting as the 26th day of May, A. D. 1922 at 2:00 P. M. Eastern Standard Time in the

**Ordinance Committee**

Ald. Freeman presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled,

"An Ordinance relative to curbs and gutters passed May 6th, 1918, approved May 7th, 1918, amended July 6th., 1920; amended April 18, 1921."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That Section seven of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance relative to curbs and gutters, passed May 6th, 1918 approved May 7th. 1918, and amended July 6th, 1920; amended April 18th, 1921" be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. After the certification of any such assessment district as provided in Section 6 of this ordinance the Common Council may at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution, adopted by a majority of all members elect, authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor, bonds of said City payable to bearer four years from the date of issue. All such bonds shall be known as "Curb and Gutter Bonds" and issued in series conforming with the

number of the curb and gutter districts on account of which any such bonds shall have been issued. All such bonds shall be delivered by the City Clerk to the City Treasurer provided that not more than eighty thousand dollars in amount of any such bonds shall be outstanding at any one time.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Ald. Freeman presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Sidewalks, passed March 6 1893; approved March 11, 1893; amended February 17, 1896; amended July 18, 1898; April 16, 1900; September 16, 1901; May 18, 1903.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

**Sewer Committee Report**  
To the Honorable  
The Common Council,  
Gentlemen:

1. Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer, relative to the construction of lateral sewers in lateral sewer districts No. 110, on Shadford road from Packard st. to Baldwin ave.; No. 111, on Washington Heights from Observatory st. to the end of the Washington Heights addition and outlet to said sewer from the east end of Washington Heights, to the Huron River, begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports as well as the resolution of Council under consideration and also the agreement with the Board of Public Works in consideration of the acceptance of Washington Heights Aldition to the City of Ann Arbor that the cost of an outlet sewer for said district shall be assessed against said property and paid by the owners of said property without any cost to he City of Ann Arbor which agreement was recorded in the office of Register of Deeds for Washtenaw County Dec. 18, 1917; and we have made due inquiries relating thereto and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewers in said districts and that special taxing or assessment districts ought to be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of such sewers may be charged, street intersections excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

2. Your Committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the city Engineer and the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewers.

3. Your Committee further re-



commends that sanitary sewer be constructed on Henry st. from Packard st. to Golden ave. and on Westminister Place, Ferndale place and Montclair Place; and that a storm water sewer be constructed on Brooks st. from Pearl st. to Miller ave. and that the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans specifications and estimates of cost for said sanitary and storm sewers.

4. We further recommend that a replacement sanitary sewer be constructed from Washington st. south across University property to the intersection of E. University ave. and Washtenaw ave. and on Washtenaw ave. from E. University ave. to Church st. and that the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans specifications and estimates of cost for same.

5. We further recommend that the construction of the above named lateral, storm and replacement sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

6. We further recommend that the petition of James H. Freeman to connect his house at 1035 Berkshire road (which is outside city limits) with city sewer be granted upon the payment of ten dollars to the City Treasurer, provided that this payment shall not be construed in any way to exempt said property from any sewer assessment which may hereafter be spread.
