Report of Ci y Engineer on Petitions For Gasoline Filling Stations

To the Honorable Common Council Ann Arbor, Michigan.

G. ntlemen.

In re the petition of the Sinclair Refining Co. for permission erect a gasoline filling station the northeast corner of Main and Packard streets, on the so called Dobson property and at the south point of Packard and State streets known as the Mull son property.

In regard to the property at the northeast corner of S. Main street and Packard street I wish to make the following report. I have made a canvass of the district and find that there are 13 places of business and 25 residences in the district. The ordinance reads that the con sent of the property owners not necessary if less than 75 cent of the buildings in the district are exclusively residence or educational buildings. I have counted the Community House as a business place. There is a total of 38 buildings in the district; 75 pr cent of 38 is 281-2, would it therefore be necessary that least 28 of the buildings in district be residences or educational buildings in order to make it a r sidence district and according to my count there are only 25. I am giving this detailed account in order that your Honorable Body may have all the facts before issuing or refusing a permit.

In regard to the property at the southwest corn r of State-st. and Packard st., known as the Mullison property, I beg leave to make the following report: I find that in this district there are 49 residences and 13 business properties and 3 properties on which there are both business and residences. This maks a total of 65 properties. In as much as the ordinance states that the district in order to be a residence district must contain at least 75 per cent of residence properties, the properties to
