To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer relative to the construction of lateral sewers in lateral sewer districts, No. 127, on Daniel-st. from Hiscock-st. to Summit-st; No. 128, on Seventh-st. from Davis-ave. to Pauline-blvd.; No. 129, on Washtenaw-ave. from end of

present sewer to city limits; No. 130, on Sprng-st. from end of present sewer to Chubb road; No. 131, on Berkshire road from present sewer 200 feet northeasterly; begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports as well as the resolution of Council under consideration and have made inquiries relating thereto, and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of said lateral sewers in said districts and recommends that special taxing or assessment districts be fixed by the common council upon and against which the construction of such sewers be charged, street intersections excepted pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided Your committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the City Engineer, and the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of said sewers.

Gentlemen—I wish to submit the following report on the petitions for public gasoline and oil filling stations which were referred to me at your meeting of May 21, 1923. Upon investigation I find that the application of the Staebler Oil Co for locating a gasoline filling station at the northeast corner of Detroit and Catherine-st. is in a business district.

The application of the Staebler Oil Co for a gasoline filling station just north of Depot-st. on the east side of N. Main-st. is in a business or industrial district. In addition to its being a business or industrial district the Staebler Oil Company have secured the consent of the property owners for a distance of 500 feet in each direction from the location of the proposed gasoline filling station.

In the petition of Titus G. Schneider for erection of a gasoline filling station on the west side of S. Main-st. at the city limits is accompanied by the consent of a majority of property owners owning property for a distance of 500 feet north of the city limits.
