Sewer Committee Report.

1. That storm sewers be constructed on Ann-st. from Glen-ave to Observatory-st.; on Oak-land-ave from Monroe-st. to Hill-st.; and on N. Main-st. from east and west quarter line of Section 20 to north city limits.

2. That the City Engineer prepare plans specifications and estimates of cost for the above mentioned storm sewers and that the construction of the same is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Park and Sanitary Committee.

Ald. Haarer presented several communications relative to collection and disposal of garbage.

Moved by Ald. Haarer, that the City Clerk be authorized to advertise for bids for garbage collection and disposal according to specifications to be approved by Park and Sanitary Committee.

Ald. Slauson, Chairman of special committee to co-operate with the Chamber of Commerce in proposed celebration of one hundredth anniversary of the founding of Ann Arbor, made oral report that committee would meet with the general committee tomorrow night.

Mr. D. W. Springer gave detailed report of proposed banquet to be held at Michigan Union probably on Feb. 22nd, to which city officials and their families were invited, and stated that the major celebration would be held in the fall.

Moved by Ald. Donnelly, that invitation to city officials and their families be accepted. Adopted by unanimous vote.

Committee on Comfort Station Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Comfort Station begs leave to report that at a joint meeting of your committee and a committee from the County Board of Supervisors and after a thorough discussion the following recommendations were adopted:

1. That a Comfort Station be built by the City of Ann Arbor on a site adjacent to the east side of the present Court House—said site to be leased by the Board of Supervisors for a term of ninety-nine years.

2. That proposed Comfort Station shall be one story in height and shall conform in architecture to that of the present Court House.

3. That the Board of Supervisors agree to heat the proposed Comfort Station, which shall otherwise be maintained and controlled by the city of Ann Arbor.

4. Your Committee further recommends that Mr. Herman Pibo be engaged by the City Council at an expense not to exceed \$150.00 to prepare plans for a Comfort Station adjoining the east side of the Court House.

Report on Election.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 4 1924. To the Board of Election Canvassers of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Gentlemen: The following is a tabulated list of the votes cast for and against proposed amendments to Sections 1 and 2 of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor voted on at the Special Election held in said city Monday, January 28th, 1924:

Amendment to Section 1 of the Charter. Yes, 117 No, 25. Majority for 92.
