Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer relative to the construction of lateral sewers in lateral sewer districts No. 148, on Dorset road from Onondaga st. to Berkshire road on Berkshire road from Dorset road to the angle south of Vinewood blvd. and on Vinewood blvd. from Berkshire road to the end of the present sewer No. 149, on Cedar st. from Wright st., west approximately 440 feet; No. 150, on Shadford road from Baldwin ave. to Ferdon road and on Morton ave. from Baldwin ave. to Ferdon road; No. 151, on Plum st. from Pontiac st. to Traver st.; No. 152, on West Kingsley st. from Ashley st. to Main st.; No. 153, on Linwood ave. from west line of Wildwood Park addition No. 1 to Arbana Drive, on Harbrook ave. from Wildwood ave. to Arbana Drive, on Arbor View blvd. from Revena blvd. to Miller ave.-West Park sub-main, on Revena blvd. from Linwood ave. to Arbor View blvd., on Linda Vista from Linwood ave. to Arbor View blvd., on Wesley st. from Linwood ave. to ArborView blvd., on Arbana Drive from Huron st.-West Park Sub-main to Arbor View blvd., on Miller ave. from Miller ave. West Park Sub-main to the west line of Arbor View blvd.; on Linda Vista from Miller ave. to Arbor View blvd., on Wesley st. from Miller ave. to Arbor View blvd., on Paul st. from Arbor View blvd to Wesley st.; No. 154, on Amherst ave. from Pontiac st. westerly approximately 300 feet; begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports, as well as the resolution of Common Council, under consideration and have made due inquiries relating thereto and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of said lateral sewers and sub-mains in said districts and recommends that special taxing or assessment districts be fixed by the common council upon and against which the construction of such sewers be charged, street intersections excepted and also such por-

tion of sub-mains which the common council by ordinance may accept, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided. Your committee further recommends that the lateral sewers hereinbefore described shall be known by the numbers designated above, and that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the City Engineer and the Board of Public Works be ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of said sewers.

We further recommend that the plans, specifications and preliminary estimates of cost for construction of storm sewers on Ann and Catherine sts. from State st. to Ingalls st. and on Lawrence st. from State st. to Thayer st.; on Belser st. from Fourteenth st. to Observatory st.; on Chapin st. on Dexter ave. from Huron st. to Fair View ave.; on Geddes ave. from Awixa ave. to Oswego st.; Huron st.-West Park sub-main at Revena blvd. on Wayne st. from Washtenaw ave to Vinwood ave.; as approved by the Board of Public Works May 27, 1925, be approved and the Board of Public Works be instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of said storm sewers according to the charter and ordinances governing same.

We further recommend that the construction of the above named lateral and storm sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

We further recommend that the City Attorney be instructed to procure the necessary right of way for a proposed lateral sewer and sub-main to serve the property along Highland Road, Ridgeway, Harvard Place and such other property as City Engineer deems necessary.
