Sample Circuit Judge, and after his decision was rendered it was taken to the Supreme Court by the Davison, et al, and said Carrie the Supreme Court of the State of Michigan has just rendered a decision confirming the decision of the lower court.

We, with the approval of your Honorable Body, employed Cavanaugh & Burke, who with the assistance of the City Attorney were successful in all the courts in winning this case. Judge Sample's decision unanimously concurred in by Supreme Court saved the city thousands of dollars.

It was a splendid victory for the city and has saved it over \$200,000 These different plaintiffs claiming damages to their farms in sums varying from one third to one half of the value thereof. which would amount to more than \$200,000.

Ordinance Committee **Proposed Charter Amendment**

By Alderman Freeman:

Resolved, That Section 186 of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor as amended April 7, 1919, and April 7, 1924, be and the same is hereby amended to read as fol-

Section 186. No bond, note other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer as hereinafter provided, and except bonds for sewerage, curbs and gutters and paving purposes, and also except as otherwise by state law or in this charter provided, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity whereby the said city shall become obligated to pay any money unless the same shall have been submitted to and voted for by a majority of the electors of said city voting thereon; but the Com-Council allow may mon claims against the city, and may orders therefor on treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to the purpose for which it shall be The Treasurer shall pay drawn. out no money except upon the written warrant of the Mayor and City Clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid; provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasury of school district number one of the City of Ann Arbor upon the warrant of the President and Secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the issuing of honds to the amount

Bursley, Freeman, not exceeding six hundred fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street streets in such city and an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars outstanding at any one time for curbs and gutters, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out these provisions may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.

> Resolved, that a special election be and the same is hereby called and will be held on Monday, the fourth day of April, A. D. 1927, in pursuance of the state law and charter of this city to vote upon the question of amendment to the section of the charter of the City of Ann Arbor, as aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that said election shall be held in the several wards of the City of Ann Arbor as follows: First ward, voting room basement of City Hall; Second ward, ward building on South Ashley street; Third ward, building on Miller Avenue; Fourth ward, voting room, basement of Armory, North Fifth avenue; Fifth ward, ward building on Pontiac street; Sixth ward, voting room in old engine house, East University avenue; Seventh ward, first precinct. City building on Mary street; Seventh ward, second precinct, voting room in Eberbach School, corner Wells street and Forest avenue.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk of said City be and is hereby authorized to issue the usual call for said special election, pursuant to the state law and charter of the City of Ann Arbor, and to cause to be printed ballots for the use of the electors at said election, which ballots shall be printed upon white paper of equal width and length and shall read:

Section 186. No bond, note or other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer as hereinafter provided, and except bonds for sewerage, curbs and

gutters and paving purposes and also except as otherwise by state law or in this charter provided, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity whereby the said city shall come obligated to pay any money unless the same shall have been submitted to and voted for by a majority of the electors of said city voting thereon; but the Common Council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the Treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February theresecond named after; but such class orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to purpose for which it shall The Treasurer shall pay drawn. out no money except upon written warrant of the Mayor and City Clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid; provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasury of school district number one of the City of Ann Arbor upon the warrant of the President and Secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the issuing of bonds to the amount not exceeding six hundred and fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city and to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand any dollars outstanding at time for curbs and gutters, bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out these provisions may pass such ordinance or ordinances may be deemed necessary.
