In the minutes of the meeting of April 18th, 1927 appears the fol-

lowing:

Two considerations cause me to question whether this action is ad-

visable:

- Conditions might arise which would necessitate appointment and confirmation to be made as speedily as possible, in which event this

resolution might a.ct ashindrance.

I shall willingly have the same thoroughly and completely investigated before your Honorable Body votes upon the confirmation or rejection, and I veto your action solely because conditions might arise where would be impossible to delay matters in the manner that your resolution would necessitate.

For these two reasons I hereby veto this part of the proceedings

quoted above.
