The following was presented by eight members of the Common Council:

In view of the many misleading statements which have been made in connection with the votes on the confirmation of the Mayor's nominations for the offices of city attorney, city treasurer and mem-

ber of the police commission, a review of the actual facts may be of interest.

Shortly after Mr. Staebler was elected mayor, he sent to the members of the council a communication giving the names of the men he expected to nominate for various offices. At a meeting of the council sitting as a committee of the whole to consider these nominations, unanimous approval was given a majority of the nominees, among whom were several Democrats. At the same time it became apparent that there would be considerable opposition to the confirmation of some of them.

With the hope of adjusting these differences of opinion in an amicable way, a message was sent to the mayor inviting him to come to the meeting. When he arrived it was explained to him that the council sincerely desired to cooperate with him in every way possible, but that there were three of his nominations for whom a majority did not feel they could vote. The reasons for this feeling were stated very definitely, and were clearly understood by the mayor. It was further stated to him that he had been asked to attend the meeting because the council particularly desired not to do anything which might embarrass or humiliate him, and wished, if possible, to avoid an open break such as was sure to occur if these nominations were formally presented on the council floor. He was then asked if there were no others whom he had considered for these places. In reply he mentioned several men whom he had thought of, and a poll of the council showed that any of these, if nominated, would be confirmed immediately, although all were Democrats.

In view of these conditions Mayor Staebler was asked to reconsider his selections and to withdraw the names of the nominees whom it was evident could not be confirmed, and submit others. His answer was that he should like time to consider the matter and to confer with some of his friends and advisers. Therefore another meeting was arranged for

a day or two later. At this second meeting the mayor reported that he had decided to stand by his original selections. He said that he was in a very difficult situation and that great pressure had been brought on him by the candidates in question and other leaders of the Democratic party with whom he had conferred, mentioning several of them by name. When asked if he had made pre-election promises to any candidates, he replied that he had not, but that he felt under obligation to the men who had run his campaign to abide by their decision in this matter.

Between the time of this meeting and the meeting of the council at which the nominations were formally presented, pressure was exerted by several of these Democratic campaign managers in an effort to force the confirmation of the names to which objection had been made.

The charge that the Republican majority in the council is influenced in this matter by political considerations is absolutely false. This is shown by the unanimous approval of several Democrats as soon as their names were presented by Mayor Staebler last spring, and by the fact that during the mayor's absence in Europe last summer the president of the council, a Republican, and the Republican majority could have filled the places under discussion with Republicans if they had desired to play politics.

Our course of action has been governed entirely by what we believe to be for the best interests of the city. The mayor is responsible for making nominations for certain offices. The council is responsible for the approval or disapproval of these nominations. We, like him, have sworn to perform our duties to the best of our ability, and we would prove to be false to our obligations if we voted for the confirmation of men whom we do not consider fitted for the offices for which they have been nominated.

We have absolutely refused to enter into a discussion of personalities on the floor of the council, or in the newspapers, and do not

propose to do so now in spite of efforts being made to bring about such a discussion. The mayor and his political advisers know perfectly well why these nominations have not been approved, and have known ever since the names were first presented. If these gentlemen had been, or were now, striving to serve the best interests of Ann Arbor rather than to make political capital, there would have been an agreement between Mayor Staebler and the council long ago. In fact there is very little probability that there ever would have been any issue between them, as we believe that the mayor, if left to his own choice, would have selected men whose qualifications for office could not and would not have been questioned by anyone in the council or out of it.
