Bill of September 12th, 1925, for removing snow in 1922 and 1923 is

also enclosed. All these bills were submitted by me personally to Mr. Collins, the present receiver of the road. He is the third individual who has acted in that capacity and disclaims any liability upon this last mentioned account. The receiver who controlled the railroad at the time these services were performed has accounted to the Federal Court and has been discharged. It appears that no steps

were taken to collect these items for nearly six years and under the circumstances this would be such laches that the collectibility of these amounts is now very questionable. Because of the delay it is my opinion that liability cannot at this time be enforced.
