#### Gentlemen:

We respectfully request that you arrange for a bond issue in the amount of \$325,000 to cover contemplated improvements to distribution system of the city water supply plant.

The improvements contemplated with estimated costs are as fol-ments of the water system. lows:

(1) 6,000,000 gallon,

- voir, with connection to water mains.—\$110,000.00.
- Cast iron trunk line water mains—\$150,000.00.
- Connecting dead end mains and installing additional hydrants—\$45,000.00.
- Contingencies and Engineering—\$20,000.00. Total, \$325,000.00.

The six-million-gallon reservoir is to replace the present two-million-gallon structure, which is an old open type structure and in bad condition. For years the old reservoir has not been considered safe to carry more than one milgallons storage and amount is dangerously inadequate. The proposed new reservoir is to be of reinforced concrete and entirely covered and of sufficient capacity to insure the city against a shortage of water in the event of a bad fire. AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CUTTING OF WEEDS AND BRUSH WITHIN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR, BY THE OWN-ERS, POSSESSORS OR OCCU- $\mathbf{OF}$ LANDS UPON **PROVIDE** ING; TO FOR METHOD OF CUTTING SUCH WEEDS AND BRUSH IN CASE OWNERS, POSSESSORS THE OR OCCUPIERS OF LANDS REwhom was referred the question of FUSE OR NEGLECT TO DO SO AND TOPROVIDE FOR TAXATION METHOD  $\mathbf{OF}$ TOPAY THE EXPENSE THEREOF; TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS OR-DINANCE AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

> The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every owner, possessor or occupier of lands or of every person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any land within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor to cut or cause to be cut down and destroy all Canada thistles, milkweeds, burdock, or Adopted by following vote: Yeas, other noxious weeds, or brush or Slauson, Maulbetsch, Graf, grass growing thereon at least Allmendinger, Harris, Draper, twice each year, once before the Bradley, Severance, Kurth, Burs- first day of July and again before

the first day of September, and as much oftener as may be necessary to prevent them going to seed, or the brush or grass becoming obnoxious, and if any owner, possessor or occupier of land, or any person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any such lands suffer any such noxious shall weeds, grass or brush to grow thereon or shall suffer the seed to ripen so as to cause or endanger the spread thereof or who shall suffer any brush or grass to become obnoxious, he or they shall, on conviction in any court of competent jurisdiction, be liable to a fine of Ten Dollars, together with the cost of prosecution, for every such offense, and he or they shall pay the cost of cutting and destroying such weeds, grass or brush and an additional ten per centum as herein provided, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs he or they may be imprisoned in the common jail of the County of Washtenaw until such fine and costs is paid, not to exceed in all a period of ten days.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the street commissioner of this city to give general notice in the following manner to every owner, possessor or occupier of land and to every person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any such lands, whereon noxious weeds or obnoxious grass or brush is growing to cut and destroy the same. Such notices shall be published in a newspaper, in the same manner as is required for the publication of other city notices, and that publication of ordinances and such notices shall set forth the fact that all such weeds, grass and brush must be cut on or before the dates herein designated, and the publishing of such notices take place at least ten days prior to the date upon which such weeds grass or brush must be cut, and such notice shall be in substantially the following form:

or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any land in the City of Ann Arbor:

Notice is hereby given that all noxious weeds, and all obnoxious grass and brush growing on any land within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, must be cut and destroyed on or before the first day of July (or the first day of September, as the case may be) A. D. 19—.

Failure to comply with this notice on or before the date mentioned shall make the parties so failing liable for the cost of cutting the same and an additional levy of ten percentum of such costs, to be levied and collected against the property in the same manner as other taxes are levied and collected, and such failure may also result in fine or imprisonment.

Such notices shall be dated and signed by the street commissioner in his official capacity.

Provided: that in the event that the Street Commissioner deem it necessary to have weeds, grass or brush cut oftener than is provided in this ordinance, he shall cause a like notice as is herein provided to be served upon the designated party or parties either personally or by registered mail, at least ten days prior to the time such weeds, grass or brush is to be cut and destroyed, and if the person or persons so notified shall fail or refuse to comply with the directions of said notice, the commissioner may proceed as hereinafter provided, and the expense thereof may be collected as hereinafter provided, or the said person persons may be proceeded against as provided in Section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 3. In case the owner, possessor or occupier of land or the person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any such land shall refuse or neglect to comply with such notice and to To the Owners, Possessors, or cut such weeds, grass, or brush on Occupiers of Land, or any person or before the date stated in such

notice, it shall be the duty of the street commissioner or some one whom the said street commissioner may employ to assist in carrying on the work, to enter upon the land and to cause all such weeds, grass and brush to be cut down and destroyed, and he or they shall not be liable in any action of trespass or trespass on the case therefor.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the street commissioner to keep an accurate account of the expense incurred by him in carrying out the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of this ordinance, with respect to each parcel of land entered upon therefor, and he shall make a sworn statement of such account present the same to the common council, and the common council is hereby authorized and required to audit and allow such account and order the same to be paid, if the same is found correct, from the contingent fund upon warrants to be drawn as other city warrants are drawn.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the City Assessor to add to all such expenditures as have been audited and allowed ten per cent of the amount of such expenditures and he shall cause all such expenditures, together with the additional ten per cent, to be severally levied on the lands on which such expenditures were made, and the same shall become a lien upon said land and shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as other city taxes are collected, and the same when collected shall be paid into the contingent fund to reimburse the outlay therefrom.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to enforce the provisions of this ordinance; and to see to it that all such weeds, grass or brush, growing upon any lands owned by or under the control of the City of Ann Arbor, are cut down and destroyed at the time herein provided.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect on and after ten days from the date of legal publication.
