Dear Mr. Perry:

I return to you herewith the proceedings of the Common Council of August 26, A. D. 1929, without my approval. I disapprove of that portion of the proceedings as follows:

"Moved by Ald. Sauer that the call for special election on Oct. 14th submitting the proposition of the Water Works Bond Issue be deferred until April election.

(Supplementary motion)

Moved by Ald. Fisher that election be held on October 14, 1929, and conform with resolution presented by Ald. Freeman at the last regular meeting of this Council.

Adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Wuerth, Allmendinger, Kurth, Severance, Fisher, Lutz, Pres. Myers, 7. Nays, Ald. Sauer, Harris, Bradley, 3."

This action by the Common Council had the effect of adopting the resolution calling for a special election, which was offered at the last regular meeting of the Common Council by Ald. Freeman and in which a special election was called to vote upon the bond issue of \$325,000.00 to be used in improving and extending the water works system of Ann Arbor, which said resolution is found in the minutes of this particular regular meeting.

My reasons for disapproving this particular portion of the proceedings are as follows:

(1) The possibility of securing the approval of the electors for this bond issue at the present time to me seems so remote that it is useless to make the expenditures necessary to hold a special election. I do not consider that there is any great hope of success.

(2) At the public meeting held on August 27 last, at my request, I found that the opinion was so divided that to me there seems little chance of prevailing with this bond issue at this time.

(3) The question of finances also entered into my consideration and feeling as I do, and bearing in mind the fact that there were only appropriations for two elections in the budget for this year, I do not feel that we are justified in spending what a special election would cost at this time.

(4) It also appears to me that the sentiment of the voters can be as readily obtained at one of the spring elections which we of necessity must have, without any material injury to this project.

I desire to add that I am reluctant to take this step and I have only done so after serious consideration and reflection. I feel that the Board of Water Commissioners are in dire need of the proposed improvement and that they have in good faith requested a special election. I would willingly give this proposition my wholehearted support and when the proper time comes will be ready to do so, but feeling as I do, as the executive of this city, I can not give my sanction to this movement at this time.

I trust that the Common Council in the time intervening, if this action on my part is upheld, will do away with the slight differences which have arisen and with a united front present this matter to the electors with a strong recommendation that the same is absolutely necessary for the betterment of the water system of this city.

Mr. Earl L. Severance Chairman Ordinance Committee 1512 Pontiac Street, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Dear Ald. Severance:

At the time that the proposals to amend the ordinance zoning were pending before the Common Council there was one proposal, on a petition presented by Samuel Hammial and others, to change certain property located on the east side of North 5th Ave., from Catherine Street north 132 feet, thence east 132 feet, thence south 66 feet west 41 and 3/12feet, thence south 66 feet, thence west 90.9 feet to the place of beginning. Certain interested property owners filed a protest against this change pursuant to the provisions of the ordinance contained in sec-tion 16 thereof. This protest was not filed until 13 days from the date of the last publication of the notice of public hearing. Under the terms of the above quoted section to be effective it had to be filed within ten days.

At the time that this ordinance was put to a vote by reference to the Council proceedings you will perceive that there were eight affirmative votes on this particular piece of property and four negative votes. This may be found on page 199 of the proceedings of the Common Council for July 15, 1929. On account of the fact that upon a protest being filed it is required $\frac{3}{4}$ votes of the aldermen elect, the ordinance as it effected this particular piece of property was de-clared lost and I so ruled, at that time. I was not familiar with the fact that the protest had not been filed within the time provided by ordinance. This ordinance the lawfully carried, it having reveived eight votes, a majority of the aldermen elect.

I am taking this means of call-

ing this matter to your attention so that the record can be corrected and when we again publish this map we can see to it that this particular piece of property is included and changed as prayed in the petition from Class B to Class C.
