#### Ordinance Committee Report

"AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO ALLMENDINGER HEIGHTS AND OUTLET SANITARY SEW-ER KNOWN AS DISTRICT NUMBER 184 IN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR, COUNTY OF WASHTENAW AND STATE OF MICHIGAN."

#### PREAMBLE

Whereas, the foregoing district sewer has been constructed in sewer district number 184 as shown by the districts in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and Whereas, the said sewer is of benefit to other portions of the City than that immediately adjacent and contiguous to the said sewer as herein described, and

Whereas the entire cost of the said sewer should not be spread upon the territories immediately contiguous and adjacent thereto because of the fact that the benefits are accessible to other portions of the City and it would be unfair to the property owners in said sewer district to assess the entire cost of said sewer against their property,

Now, therefore, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordains:

Section 1. The Common Council, have deemed it expedient to construct said sewer as herein described in sewer district number 184, reference being hereby made to the said district as outlined in the map in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Ann Arbor, and proceedings having been had as provided in an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to sewer, providing for a system of lateral and connecting sewers in the City of Ann Arbor," therefore the Common Council may appropriate for the cost of construction of the said sanitary work such an amount of the cost thereof as the Council shall deem just for the City to pay in addition to the costs of street crossings, and may such appropriations by suitable resolutions.

Section 2. The proceedings relative to the construction of said sanitary sewer has been in accordance with an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Sewers, providing for a system of lateral and connecting sewers in the City of Ann Arbor," passed May 21, 1894; approved May 23, 1894; amended January 3, 1899; amended August 17, 1903; amended March 12, 1906; amended March 18, 1907; in all respects; therefore, the cost of construction of said

sewer in said sewer district number 184 shall be apportioned as follows: Upon the City of Ann Arbor at large, the sum of \$19,965.57, and upon the said sewer district the sum of \$16,471.42, making the total cost of construction of the said sewer in the said sewer district, the sum of \$36,436.99.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force ten days after legal publication thereof.
