#### CAST NOTES

DOROTHY MAPLES (Claire) appeared in the title role of the AACT production of MARY, MARY two seasons ago. Currently our box office chairman, she is very active behind the scenes, but last season took time to play Martha in the AACT Workshop production of RING ONCE FOR CENTRAL. Before coming to Ann Arbor she appeared in Sarte's NO EXIT and Wilder's THE HAPPY JOURNEY FROM TRENTON TO CAMDEN at the University of Rochester. Dorothy, is a fifth grade teacher at Thurston School.

BOB STARRING (Schill) brings to his first appearance with AACT a long list of credits from the Wayne State University Theatre and the Fine Arts Society of Detroit including major roles in: ROMEO AND JULIET, TWELFTH NIGHT, KING LEAR, ANASTASIA and SILK STOCKINGS. In 1958 Bob was a member of the Wayne State University Theatre tour. The group performed in major cities of India under the auspices of the U.S. State Department.

JOHN STEVENS (Burgomaster) delighted AACT audiences last season with his performances in RHINOCEROS and THE MOUSETRAP. John, who has experience with civic theatres in Washington, Indiana and Pennsylvania, joined the Summer Repertory Group for THE FIREBUGS and UNCLE VANYA.

CHARLES STALLMAN (Teacher) worked extensively in the Summer Repertory Group with major roles in four of the six productions including NO EXIT and UNCLE VANYA. Charles returned to Ann Arbor last fall after a season with the American Shakespeare Festival and appeared here as Dudard in the AACT production of RHINOCEROS.

DENNIS DOBRASH (Policeman) studied acting last summer with Albert Tipton and Reid Klein at Cranbrook where he acted in MOONEY'S KID DON'T CRY and LITTLE MARY SUNSHINE. A freshman at Washtenaw Community College, this is Dennis' first work with AACT.

LEE OVERHOLSER (Pastor) new to Civic Theatre, Lee is a grad student and teaching fellow at the U of M. He has danced in opera productions and played the Gymnast in CAROUSEL.

BEVERLEY POOLEY (Pedro) last season's Best Actor Award winner for his portrayal of the Common Man in AACT's MAN FOR ALL SEASONS, Bev has many AACT acting credits during the past five seasons including SHOT IN THE DARK, DEVIL'S DECIPLE and FINIAN'S RAINBOW. He has also done TV work with UN-TV and is an Associate Professor of Law at U of M.

WARREN EVELAND (Bobby) is no stranger to AACT having acted with us in ENTER LAUGHING, COME BACK LITTLE SHEBA and others. A Professor of Epidemiology, Warren is currently Secretary-Treasurer of the Science Research Club at the U of M,

HELGA HOVER (Frau Schill) a past Board member and always hard-working member of AACT, Helga has worked in all phases of play production since joining AACT in 1950. Her many AACT performances include both acting and dancing roles. She was seen most recently in FINIAN'S RAINBOW.

EDWARD ARMBRUSTER (First Blindman) has worked on set construction, lights and sound for AACT. He acted in NEVER TOO LATE, ENTER LAUGHING and KISS ME KATE. He is a Bacteriologist in the Department of Environmental Health at the U of M.

JIM KANE (Second Blindman) active in amateur theatre for several years before coming to Ann Arbor, Jim appeared with AACT for the first time last season in RHINOCEROS and MOUSETRAP. As a result of his work with the Summer Repertory Group in UNCLE VANYA, Jim is now taking balalaika lessons.

BARBARA BERCU (Ottilie) a newcomer to AACT is a student at Huron High.

JOHN GOULD (Karl) a student at Ann Arbor High School, John worked behind the scenes in KISS ME KATE and appeared in GYPSY.

FRED GIBILISCO (Painter) played the lead in last season's production of ANY WEDNESDAY. Before coming to Ann Arbor Fred was a member of the Los Gatos Players and was featured in their production of WALTZ OF THE TORREADORS.

WALD SCHROEDER (First Man) is a Research Engineer with the Kelsey-Hayes Company. Wald and his wife (First Lady) are new members of AACT.

KEN JOHNSON (Second Man) has worked in all areas of play production in his ten years with AACT. In addition to working in the Street Art Fair Productions, he has appeared recently in GUYS AND DOLLS and FINIAN'S RAINBOW.

JOY SCHROEDER (First Lady) This is Joy's first appearance with AACT. A native of Canada, she worked with the Digby Players in Nova Scotia and The Towne Players in New York.

ANN SCHORGER (Second Lady) a housewife and student, has appeared in an AACT workshop play. Before coming to Ann Arbor, Ann was active in the British Council

VEITCH REINHART (First Woman) played Lola in COME BACK LITTLE SHEBA during our 1966-67 season. She has also appeared in GYPSY, NEVER TOO LATE and ENTER LAUGHING.

PENELOPE THORNTON (First Woman) is appearing with AACT for the first time. She is visiting here from England where she has played such roles as Lady Brachnell in THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING ERNEST.

DON STEWART (Stationmaster) is a long-time AACT member who has designed and constructed many of our sets. Don also appeared on stage in DESK SET and ENTER LAUGHING.

#### About THE VISIT

The Visit is not about politics, race relations, or social unrest; but, more basically, it concerns justice, guilt, responsibility, greed, the use of wealth, and the worth of a human life. There is no single villain in this play, nor are there any innocents. The "visitor" to the town of Gullen marks a crisis, a turning point, for each of its citizens. Similar in some ways to the crises facing our society today: each citizen must choose his set of values, and act accordingly—no one can be indecisive and remain safe. Is THE VISIT a comedy or a tragedy? Is it complex or simple? Or some of each? Duerrenmatt once said, "We are all collectively guilty, collectively bogged down in the sins of our fathers and forefathers . . . Comedy alone is suitable for us . . . But the tragic is still possible even if pure tragedy is not."
