

Artistic Director and Choreographer IAMES POSANTE

Jim Posante will need no introduction to those among you who regularly attend the productions of Ann Arbor Civic Theatre or the U-M Gilbert and Sullivan Society. He has been active in both organizations for several years as an actor, director and choreographer. For G & S, Jim choreographed The Grand Duke and directed and choreographed H.M.S. Pinafore and Pirates of Penzance as well as appearing in several other shows. Among others for AACT, Jim was in the cast of The Most Happy Fella and appeared as the Musician in Thieves' Carnival. a performance

which earned him our annual Cameo Award.

Musical Director DILL MURRELL

Dill Murrell, a physicist with NASA and now a staff engineer with EPA, has been a dance band organizer, composer/arranger and soloist. He has performed in numerous Saline Community Chorus and Saline Area Players' productions, and is a past president of the Players. He has also been involved in Musket and the U-M Players' productions as an actor, musician, and musical director. For Ann Arbor Civic Theatre, Dill appeared last year in Fiorello and served as assistant musical director for our production last December of Promises, Promises.



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THE STAFF

Carol Deniston (Co-Producer) joined AACT ten years ago and has participated in almost every area of the theatre from poster distribution to presidency. Oklahoma is the eighth show she has produced for us. For six years she has been a member of the AACT Board of Directors and is now serving her 4th term as president of our group. Carol is also a member of the theatre advisory panel for the Michigan Council for the Arts.

Mindy Oddy (Co-Producer) has been active for several years as a stage manager for Musket, the School of Music and AACT. During the past season she stage managed *The Night Thoreau Spent In Jail* for AACT and the School of Music's production of *Carmen*. Mindy is a 4th grade teacher in the Hamburg Elementary School and a part-time graduate student at the U-M.

Sylvia Marie Llewellyn (Assistant Director), a very active member since joining AACT last summer, was the assistant director for our studio production of *Under Milkwood*. She crewed the Summer Season '75 shows as well as *Arsenic and Old Lace*. For *The Night Thoreau Spent In Jail* Sylvia was chairman of props and appeared in the cast as a townsperson.

John Ford (Stage Manager), an active member of AACT since 1961, has served as producer, technical director, stage manager and lighting designer for many shows, most recently as producer of Arsenic and Old Lace. Oklahoma marks his 33rd production - and his 10th musical - for AACT. He is also serving this season as historian, chairman of stage managers and program editor. John is a past member of AACT's Board of Directors.

Alice B. Crawford, U.S.A.A. (Set Designer) has designed over 30 sets for AACT, most recently *Fiorello* and *Tartuffe* last season. In this year she also designed *Don Giovanni* and *La Boheme* for the U-M School of Music, and *Hello Dolly* for Musket. She is an art teacher at Huron High School and a member of the United Scenic Artists union, local 350. Alice's paintings are frequently shown in local and state exhibitions.

Seth Orbach (Lighting Designer), a senior at Community High School, began his career with the Junior Light Opera. He has served as lighting designer for productions by the Gilbert & Sullivan Society, the School of Music and AACT, and last year designed a special presentation for President Ford in Washington, D.C. Most recently Seth designed *The Looking Glass* dinner theatre.

Denise A. Dreher (Costume Designer) is designing her first major production for AACT. She has worked on costume crews at Eastern Michigan University where she is a Dramatic Arts student, and for the Ypsilanti Players children's show Livin' de' Life. Denise will be wardrobe mistress for the University of Illinois summer festival and will move on in the fall to study at the University of Minnesota.



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THE CAST

Martha Krehblel (Aunt Eller) returned to the stage after a long absence to appear in AACT's December production of *Promises, Promises.* A graduate of Wheaton College, Illinois, where she was a speech major, Martha taught elementary school before starting her family and moving to Ann Arbor.

Bryant Frank(Curly), a junior at the U-M, has appeared in the Soph Show production of Celebration and Musket's Hello Dolly. Bryant has sung for two years with aMaizn' Blue and will appear this summer in Jesus Christ Superstar and Once In A Lifetime for Michigan Repertory '76.

Gail Williams (Laurey) recently appeared as Abigail Adams in Ye Bloody Rebels at Pioneer High School where she is a senior. Gail has also had roles in The King and I and A Midsummer Night's Dream at the high school.

Bob Vincent (Ike Skidmore) was last seen on stage over a decade ago when he appeared in *South Pacific* and *Die Fliedermaus* at Louisiana Tech. University. Bob is a geophysicist and the president of Geospectra Corp.

Stanley Selden (Fred), most recently seen in the chorus of G & S's *Pirates of Penzance*, has also appeared in *Eugene Onegin* and *Oedipus Rex* for the U-M School of Music. Stan is an art student at the U-M and sang for one year in the Men's Glee Club.

Robert G. Pace (Slim) usually contributes his talents on the technical side of our productions. Serving as master carpenter, he built the set for Arsenic and Old Lace. Bob has appeared this year in two studio productions, Mr. Pim and Scanerelle.

Ray Nieto (Will Parker) has appeared in several roles for AACT, including Capt. Bluntschli in *Arms and the Man* for which he earned the best actor of the year award. Ray is also a talented dancer and choreographed both *Ernest In Love* and *Fiorello* for AACT.

Bill Vander Yacht (Jud) played the role of Jud once before: for the Saline Area Players, of which he is a charter member. He has appeared in several other SAP productions and has stage managed two shows. Bill is an obstetrician and gynecologist.

Connie Marie Cicone (Ado Annie), most recently seen in Musket's Hello Dolly, has appeared in several shows for the Saline Area Players, U-M Speech Dept. and AACT (including Tartuffe). Connie is a graduate student in theatre and speech at the U-M.

Ed Glazier (Ali Hakim) has appeared for AACTin *Ernest In Love* and several summer season productions. His background also includes eight shows for G & S, most recently *Pirates of Penzance*. Ed is a librarian and served two years as chairman of AACT's playreading committee.

Mina A. Sonda (Gertie) was active in theatre at the University of Denver before coming to Ann Arbor. Her only appearance here was in AACT's production last year of *Ten Little Indians*. Mina's field is physical education and she hopes to be teaching come September.

Liz Jelinek (Ellen), a veteran member, has appeared on stage for AACT in numerous shows over the years. She is also a talented costume designer and director - having directed *Promises, Promises* for us last December and *Hogan's Goat* two years ago.

Dayton Benjamin (Andrew Carnes) has an extensive background in theatre, including six years in the Fairbanks (Alaska) Light Opera Theatre. He was seen last year in our productions of *Ten Little Indians* and *Fiorello*, and, more recently, as Mr. Witherspoon in *Arsenic and Old Lace*.

John Roth (Cord Elam) is making his debut as an actor. John is a contracts manager for Bendix Aerospace Systems.

Dick Phillips (Jess) appeared as Dobitch in AACT's December production of *Promises, Promises* and in the studio production of *Crawling Arnold*. Dick is a professor of Aerospace Engineering and of Computer, Information and Control Engineering at the U-M.

Andy Silverman (Junior), seen in AACT's productions of *The Most Happy Fella* and *Riders to the Sea*, has also appeared in *Alice In Wonderland* for JLO. Andy is a 6th grader at Stone School.

TeDee A. Theofil (Dream Laurey and Dancer) is appearing for the first time with AACT. She is co-director of the Ann Arbor Civic Ballet and director of Studio 1 school of dance.

Mikell Pinkney (Dream Curly and Dancer), appearing in his first role for AACT, has an extensive background in acting, directing and choreography. Mikell is a graduate student and teaching fellow in theatre at the U-M where he will appear this summer in two Michigan Repertory '76 productions.

Todd Jamieson (Dream Jud and Dancer) is a graduate student at the U-M. He directed *Spoon River Anthology* as an undergraduate in Sarasota, Fla., and has appeared for the U-M in *Infernal Machine* and *Camino Real* among others. This is his first show for AACT.

Kathryn L. App (Chorus) has appeared for AACT in *The Night Thoreau Spent In Jail* and the studio production of *Separate Tables*, and has worked on costume and prop crews for several shows. Kathy is personnel director at University Cellar bookstore.

Sue Beutler (Chorus) has played the parts of Miss Campbell in *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie*, an Indian in *Annie Get Your Gun* and Nina in *Fiorello*. A member of Civic Theatre for 9 years, she and her husband Fred (also in tonights cast) have been responsible for most of our lobby displays over the past four years.

Fred Beutler (Chorus) lists his credits as "seen (briefly) in Barefoot In The Park, The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie, Skin of Our Teeth, Fiorello, and (even more briefly) in Man of La Mancha." A professor at the U-M, Fred is AACT's official photographer.

Carolyne Epstein (Chorus) has appeared for Civic Theatre in Fiddler On The Roof, The Most Happy Fella, Fiorello and Promises, Promises, and served on the prop crew for Annie Get Your Gun. Carolyne is a free-lance interior designer.

Donald Hartwig (Chorus) had been active with JLO for four years, appearing in several productions, including *Oklahoma*. He appeared as a dancer in AACT's 1974 production of *Annie Get Your Gun*. Don is a senior at Pioneer High School.

Julia Haverty (Chorus) is a new resident of Ann Arbor. Her credits include performances for The Drama Group in Chicago Heights and The Birmingham (Ala.) Civic Theatre. Julia is a "full-time mom," with graduate studies "to be continued."

John Jarrett (Chorus) is returning to the stage for the first time since his college days at Notre Dame College, Cleveland, Ohio, in the early sixties. John is a research associate at the U-M and a member of the University Choral Union.

Cornelia Schoor Landes (Chorus) has appeared in one previous musical, *Girl Crazy*, for the Waterford Players. Cornelia is a piano teacher and has accompanied several G & S productions and the last two shows for the Comic Opera Guild.

Carolyn J. Lewis (Chorus) has performed for AACT in the studio production of *Crawling Arnold*, as a vocalist in our December production of *Promises*, *Promises* and as Callie in *The Little Foxes*. Carolyn is a psychiatric social worker.

Paul R. Lichter (Chorus) will be remembered for his two hilarious performances for AACT as the less-than-brilliant cop, Floyd, in *Fiorello*, and as Dr. Dreyfuss in *Promises, Promises*. Paul is an associate professor of ophthalmology at the U-M Medical School.

Ruth Lorenz (Chorus) joined AACT last year for our production of Fiorello and has since performed in Promises, Promises and the studio production of Menotti's The Medium. Ruth is executive secretary at Thermofil Inc. in Brighton.

Dorothy Milne (Chorus) is a newcomer to Civic Theatre. A freshman at EMU majoring in vocal performance, Dorothy has appeared in the Comic Opera Guild's *La Belle Helene* last February, as well as several productions at Pioneer High School.

Geraldine Powers-Steen (Chorus) is new to Ann Arbor Civic Theatre, but certainly not to the stage. Her credits include numerous performances for the Kalamazoo Civic Theatre and the University of Nebraska, among others. Geraldine is currently a salesperson for Real Estate One.

David Reynolds (Chorus) is making his stage debut for AACT. He has previously performed as a pianist for *Promises, Promises* and *Thurber Carnival*. When not busy as a musician and composer, Dave is an economics major at the U-M.

Judy Robison (Chorus) performed for AACT as an orchestra voice in last December's production of *Promises, Promises*. Her other credits include performances in *Guys and Dolls* and *Promises, Promises* for the State College Community Theatre, Penn. State University. Judy works as a dental assistant.

Jonathon Robison (Chorus), a sixth grader at Mitchell Elementary School, is making his stage debut tonight.

Jane Wilcox (Chorus), another newcomer to AACT, appeared in the chorus of Gypsy for the Macomb County Community Summer Theatre. Jane is a graduate student at the U-M and a vocal music teacher.

Alan Wineman (Chorus) made his stage debut last spring in the role of Zappatella in *Fiorello* and has since appeared in our Summer Season '75 production of *Separate Tables*. Alan is a professor of Applied Mechanics in the College of Engineering.

Greg Yank (Chorus), has an extensive resume of performances outside of Michigan. He made his Ann Arbor debut in our studio production of *Under Milkwood* last winter. Greg is an assistant director at the U-M Hospital and a member of the Washtenaw County Council on Alcoholism.

Loretta Anderson (Dancer) choreographed *The Mikado, Pirates of Penzance* and *Demon Rum* for Brandeis University before coming to Ann Arbor. Loretta earned a graduate degree in Russian and is currently building director at Bursley Hall for the U-M.

Bridget Connors (Dancer) is a student at Clague Junior High School where she has appeared in several plays.

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
