



ABOUT THE CAST

CHRISTINE BARRY (Chorus) was in the chorus of AACT's *Carousel* and in Musket's *Music Man.* A U of M senior, Chris is a member of the aMaizin' Blues singing/dancing ensemble.

ELIZABETH WEIL BERGMANN (Vanessa) is Associate Professor of Dance and head of the Dance Department at the U of M. She has danced professionally under choreographers Jose Limon, Lucas Hoving, Geoffrey Holder and Sophie Maslow, among others. A graduate of Juilliard, she founded the Ann Arbor Dance Theatre and was director of the Cultural Arts program of the Ann Arbor Recreation Department in 1965-66. Liz danced in the APA production of *Much Ado About Nothing*, and she has choreographed *South Pacific*, *The Boys from Syracuse*, *Carmina Burana* and *The Unicorn*, *The Gorgon and The Manticore*, the recent U of M Opera Theatre production. She also has developed her own solo repertory, under a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

REBECCA BOEVÉ (Chorus) teaches piano and performs with the Ann Arbor Cantata Singers. This is her first show for AACT. She has appeared elsewhere as Rosie in *Bye Bye Birdie*, and in *South Pacific*, *The Music Man* and *Anything Goes*. A dance/movement therapist, Rebecca has directed and choreographed several public school productions.

MICHAEL BOWERMAN (Chorus) is appearing in his first AACT production.

H. D. CAMERON (Dimitri Weissman) was John of Gaunt in a recent University Players production of *Richard II*. He appeared in Civic Theatre's *Man of La Mancha* several years ago, and has had many leading roles with the University of Michigan Gilbert & Sullivan Society. Don is Chairman of the Department of Classical Studies at the U of M.

THOMAS COOCH (Chorus) played in Civic's version of *You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown* last summer. An Eastern Michigan student, he appeared in *Man of La Mancha, Our Town* and *The Music Man* while at Ypsilanti High School, and he was Matthew Harrison Brady in their production of *Inherit the Wind*. Most recently, Tom portrayed Patrick in *Mame* with the Saline Area Players.

PAM COURTNEY (Margie) was in the cast of Carousel last season with AACT. She is a member of the aMaizin' Blues, the U of M singing/dancing ensemble.

BARBARA COUTURE (Francesca) was the Fair Witch in last summer's studio production of *Dark of the Moon.* A lecturer in English and technical writing at Wayne State University, Barb is also working on a doctoral degree in English at the U of M.

PAUL COUTURE (Young Buddy) danced in the chorus of *Carousel* a couple of seasons ago, and had a similar part in Comic Opera Guild's *The Gypsy Baron*. He also appeared last summer in *Pullman Car Hiawatha*. Paul is an architect and planner with the University Hospital planning office.

DIANE CUMMINS (Chorus) is a teacher and a tap dancer. This is her first show with AACT.

SUSAN DAWSON (Young Sally) has appeared in Civic Theatre productions of A Little Night Music, Carousel and Little Mary Sunshine. She came to Ann Arbor as a U of M Professional Theatre Program fellow. Some of her major roles have been in Kiss Me Kate, Cabaret, Romeo and Juliet, Oklahoma!, Jacques Brel . . . , Bus Stop and You Can't Take It With You. Susan works for the law firm of Forsythe, Vandenberg & Morris, PC.

More About The Cast

BETTE ELLIS (Solange La Fitte) made her AACT debut in *The Torch Bearers* in about 1950. More recently she was seen in *Spofford, Anything Goes, Antigone, The Devil's Disciple* (which returns next season), *A Shot in the Dark, Wonderful Town, Pajama Game, Janus* and *Gigi,* among others. At the U of M, she has appeared in *Thurber Carnival* and *The Madwoman of Chaillot* to name just two. Bette has been active Off Broadway, and at the Equity Library Theatre, New York Players, Theatre East, and with the Saline Mill Players. She also played in *Jericho* for Musket, and she has made several tapes in the U of M Television Dickens and Greek Tragedy series. Currently, Bette teaches in the Ann Arbor schools, serves on the boards of the Multi-Ethnic Alliance and St. Nicholas Church, and is taking SCUBA lessons.

CAROLYNE EPSTEIN (Meredith Lane) is appearing in her sixth Civic musical. The others were Fiddler on the Roof, Most Happy Fella, Fiorello!, Promises, Promises and Oklahoma!. She also was in the cast of Spofford. Carolyne "sat out" Carousel last season, but her husband and two children appeared in that as the majority of the Snow family. She is a free-lance interior designer.

LENORE FERBER (Trudy Carson) came directly into this production from *A Little Night Music*, where she was Mrs. Nordstrom, of the quintet chorus. She also has been in Civic Theatre's *Waltz of the Toreadors* and *Thurber Carnival*. Her Gilbert & Sullivan roles have included Yum-Yum in *The Mikado*, Psyche in *Princess Ida*, Rose Maybud in *Ruddigore* and Casilda in *The Gondoliers*. In *Trial by Jury* she was Angelina, and in Genesee County she is an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney.

CHRISTOPHER FLYNN (Vincent) teaches Classical Ballet at the U of M. In March he was El Gallo in *The Fantasticks* at Canterbury Loft. Prior to coming to Ann Arbor, he directed the Christopher Ballet, Flint Ballet Theatre and Lansing Festival Ballet. He was a member of the Vanguard Playhouse in Detroit, and appeared in plays, musicals and children's theatre. He has taught at various schools and colleges, in Michigan and in New York. Christopher has studied with Jose Limon and Peter Gennaro, among others, and has choreographed numerous ballets, musicals and operas. While at Harvard, his major was clinical psychology.

MARIE GILSON (Emily Whitman) has been with Ann Arbor Civic Theatre for thirty years. Her recent stage appearances were in *Spofford, The American Dream, You Never Can Tell* and *Growing Up.* She has been a frequent usher and box office attendant when not on stage. While with her husband in the U.S. Navy, Marie ran her own civic theatre on an island in the ocean, presenting such works as *Harvey* and *Glass Menagerie*. At the U of M, she played in the last production of the Drama Season with Andy Devine.

NORA GUNNENG (Mannequin) has been acting in musical comedies since her high school days, but this is her first AACT appearance.

SCOTT HAMMONDS (Chorus) has worked on several Civic stage crews, and he was Philip Clandon in You Never Can Tell. With the U of M Professional Theatre Program, he played Tony Lumpkin in She Stoops to Conquer, and Speed in Two Gentlemen of Verona in Michigan Rep '78. Scott is a U of M student, and appeared as a Sailor in G & S' H.M.S. Pinafore.

PETER-JOHN HEDLESKY (Young Ben) is a veteran director and actor with the U of M Gilbert & Sullivan group. He recently directed *Ruddigore*, *Patience* and *Princess Ida*. Peter was in the AACT production of *Little Mary Sunshine* in 1976, and has been in the Michigan Rep company as well.

SALLY C. HELPPIE (Young Phyllis) appears in her first Civic Theatre production, but she has had extensive stage experience in high school and at EMU. She is majoring in broadcasting, and has been a member of the EMU National Champion forensics team. Sally also teaches dance, sings in University Choir, and works at University Hospital.

More About the Cast

CHERYL R. HODGES (Mannequin) sang in the chorus of *Princess Ida* and was Sarah Brown in *Guys and Dolls* and Mrs. Squires in *The Music Man* for Musket. Cheryl has been on makeup crews for Civic, and is a registered nurse at Mott Children's Hospital.

SANDRA YOWIK HUDSON (Dee Dee West) rushed across the street from her appearance as Mme. Josephine in *The Madwoman of Chaillot*. This is her fourth AACT production since last fall, when she was Mrs. Kirby in *You Can't Take It With You*. In between, she played the Sister-In-Law in *The Good Person of Szechwan*. Her other Civic Theatre roles have included Mrs. Clandon in *You Never Can Tell*, Madame St. Pe in *Waltz of the Toreadors* and Miss Prism in *Ernest In Love*. Sandy also has sung several alto leads in Gilbert & Sullivan productions, including Octavia in *The Grand Duke* and Dame Hannah in *Ruddigore*. She has two preschool children.

DANIEL HURTADO (Major-Domo) was Dr. Jadin in *The Madwoman of Chaillot* two weeks ago. A singer with the aMaizin' Blues, he was in the quartet in Musket's *Music Man*, and appeared as El Jefe in *The Great White Hope* at the U of M. Dan also has acted in *Richard II* and *The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window* in the PTP program.

JANET JOHNSON (Young Heidi) makes her AACT debut. She sang in the chorus for Opera Omaha in the 1977-78 season.

JOHN KELLY (Chorus) has performed in several G&S productions, including *Pirates of Penzance, Iolanthe* and *The Sorcerer.* He was Monty in Civic's workshop production of *Hands Across The Sea.* John is a photographer and Tai Chi enthusiast.

MARILYN KENNEDY (Heidi Schiller) was seen as Mrs. Mi Tzu in *The Good Person of Szechwan* earlier this year, and as Mrs. Peachum in *The Beggar's Opera* for Comic Opera Guild. She sang in choruses of AACT's *Carousel* and COG's *Gypsy Baron* and *Orpheus in the Underworld*. Marilyn is an interior designer and COG secretary.

MARTI LARSON (Chorus) sang in choruses of Annie Get Your Gun and Fiorello! in other Civic Theatre seasons. She is a French teacher at Greenhills School.

SUMI LEWIS (Chorus) was in the *Brigadoon* dance ensemble two seasons ago, and also danced in the Soph Show *Pippin*. In high school she was a solo dancer in *Oklahoma!* and *Kiss Me Kate*, and played Liat in *South Pacific*. An art student at the U of M, Sumi has studied tap and jazz dancing at the Mekush Studio.

SUSAN MATTHEWS (Stella Deems) has sung in two U of M Music School Opera Theatre productions, as Giovanna in *Rigoletto* and as Marcellina in *The Marriage of Figaro*. In Aspen, she was Arnalta in *The Coronation of Poppea*, and at Greensboro Summer Theatre, Baba in *The Medium*. A doctoral student in vocal performance at the U of M, Susan formerly taught in Charlotte, North Carolina, where she conducted several musicals.

JOHN MCCOLLUM (Roscoe) appeared most recently in his first AACT role, as Fredrik Egerman in A Little Night Music. A professional concert and opera tenor for many years, he first appeared locally in 1953 as vocal soloist at the May Festival. John has sung with the New York City and Washington, D.C., operas, on NBC-TV and CBC-TV and at the Stratford, Ontario Shakespeare Festival. Ann Arbor audiences have seen him as guest artist in the U of M production of Under Milk Wood, and in The Royal Family and St. Joe's Plays the Palace. John is Professor of Voice at the U of M School of Music.

More About the Cast

THE REV. ALEX MILLER (Theodore Whitman) portrayed the Water Seller in *The Good Person of Szechwan* and the Sewer Man in *The Madwoman of Chaillot* earlier this year. He was the Indian chief in *Little Mary Sunshine*, and also played in *Brigadoon* and *You Never Can Tell* for AACT. Before he 'retired' and was 'discovered' by Civic Theatre, his theatrical experiences included the U.S. Army, appearances at Mendelssohn Theatre 'in the old days,' and a career as an Episcopal priest. Fr. Alex currently is Assistant to the Rector at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church. He and his wife, Dorothy, live in an Old Red Schoolhouse near Whitmore Lake.

SUSAN MORRIS (Christine Donovan) directed Ann Arbor Civic Theatre's most recent musical, A Little Night Music. Winner of the Best Actress award for her performance as Martha in Arsenic and Old Lace, she appeared in Arms and the Man and Summer and Smoke, among several ACCT roles. Susan sang in more than a dozen Gilbert & Sullivan productions, and has directed six, most recently The Mikado in 1977. An administrative assistant in Romance Languages at the U of M, she also is Past President of Civic Theatre.

ROB NUISMER (Chorus) was resident choreographer and director for Peachy Cream Productions locally, and choreographer for the Utah Pioneer Theatre. He has performed extensively in summer stock and dinner theatre productions in Utah and Iowa.

ROBERT PALMER (Chorus) makes his first Ann Arbor Civic Theatre appearance.

SUZANNE POZNANSKI (Mannequin) is a Greenhills High School senior. She is active in sports, as well as having appeared in the musicals Kiss Me Kate and Bye Bye Birdie. Suzanne will attend Kenyon College.

PATRICIA A. RECTOR (Carlotta Campion) has played Emily Brent in *Ten Little Indians*, Clara in *Hay Fever*, Mommy in *The American Dream* and Sybil in *Separate Tables*, all with AACT. Musically she has been active in Gilbert & Sullivan productions, singing Lady Jane in *Patience*, Lady Blanche in *Princess Ida* and Dame Carruthers in *Yeoman of the Guard*. Her Musket roles have included Mrs. Meeker in *Funny Girl* and Madame Dilly in *On The Town*.

THOMAS M. SCHOLTEN (Kevin) made his first AACT appearance as Billy Bigelow in Carousel. He was Harold Hill in Music Man, Fagin in Oliver and Jesus in Godspell elsewhere. A voice major at the U of M, Tom has sung in School of Music Opera Theatre productions of Rigoletto, Cosi Fan Tutte and La Nozze de Figaro. He also sings with the U of M Chamber Choir.

MARY BETH SEILER (Sally Durant Plummer) was in the Carousel chorus with AACT, and in Oklahoma! in Schaumburg, Illinois. She is Panhellenic Advisor for the U of M, and the mother of two sons.

SHARON SHELDON (Chorus) played Fiona in the Saline Area Players' version of *Brigadoon* and Marian in *Music Man*, also in Saline, where she is membership chairperson for the group. She also was in *Oklahoma!* and *Fiddler* there. Sharon is employed at University Hospital.

BURNETTE STAEBLER (Hattie Walker) returns to Ann Arbor and to the Civic Theatre stage at almost the same moment, having just returned from a four year 'visit' to Washington, D.C. She will be recalled as Vera Charles in Mame. She also played in Tartuffe, Once Upon A Mattress and Misalliance. A past president of AACT, Burnette directed Ernest In Love, The Lion in Winter, Antigone, Cactus Flower and The Women, a studio production which introduced several of Civic's backstage workers to the limelight for the first time. While she was in Washington, she directed plays for the Little Theatre of Alexandria, Fairlington Players and Adventure Theatre.

More About The Cast

BOB STARRING (Benjamin Stone) has appeared with AACT occasionally for several years, having acted previously in *The Unexpected Guest, Brass & Grass Forever* and *The Visit.* At Wayne State University he was in the casts of *The Lady's Not For Burning, Oedipus Rex, Beyond the Horizon, Romeo and Juliet, King Lear* and L'Histoire d'Un Soldat. Bob is a member of the University Library administrative staff.

JOHN STEPHENS (Buddy Plummer) was last seen as Grampa in You Can't Take It With You earlier this season. In his ten years of AACT participation, he has had the title role in Spofford, played Lazar Wolfe in Fiddler On The Roof, and was Chief Sitting Bull in Annie Get Your Gun, among others. He also was Pop in the Musket original, Jericho. John commutes to Civic Theatre from his home in Howell, where he is an avid sailor of little (or big) boats.

SANDRA L. STORRER (Phyllis Rogers Stone) has written, produced and toured in productions of the Boar's Head Players. She was Fraulein Schneider in Musket's *Cabaret*. She also spent two summers with a stock company, and has had Noh Theatre (Oriental drama) experience. This is her first Civic show.

JAN SUTHERLAND (Mannequin) is a graduate of Michigan State, and an elementary school teacher. She appeared in *Night of the Puppies* at MSU.

TE DEE THEOFIL (Young Vanessa) has choreographed *Brigadoon* and danced in *Oklahoma!* for AACT. She appeared in Musket's *On The Town* this spring, and as the Tormentor in *Jesus Christ, Superstar* with Michigan Rep '76. She was choreographer for *Kiss Me Kate* and *Two Gentlemen of Verona*, and has appeared in *St. Joe's Plays the Palace* and at Croswell Opera House in *The Unsinkable Molly Brown*. Te Dee is director of the Studio One School of Dance.

HENRY VAN KUIKEN (Young Vincent) danced in *The Unicorn, The Gorgon and the Manticore* and in *Acrylic/Flake Diagram* with the U of M dancers. He has designed costumes for *Equus, Kiss Me Kate* and *What Every Woman Knows* at the U of M, and for the *Cuchulain Saga* presented by the Yeats ensemble. A graduate of the U of M dance department, Henry also played George Tesman in *Hedda Gabler* and Annas in *Jesus Christ, Superstar* with Michigan Rep '76.

LISA WATTS (Mannequin) is another Greenhills senior, and a flutist. She also is active in sports and dance. This is her first stage experience. Lisa plans to major in French and business at the U of M, then go into international or corporate law.

BETH WOODWARD (Chorus) appeared previously as a dancer in AACT's *Oklahoma!* She is a dance major at EMU and assists at the Randazzo Dance Studio in Ypsilanti, where she has been with the Ypsilanti Area Dancers for ten years. She has studied dance with Christopher Flynn at the U of M, and at Indiana University and the Banff Center of Fine Arts. A graduate of Huron High School, Beth has taught dance for the Recreation department and at Interlochen. She also choreographed Ypsilanti High School's *Music Man* and danced in *Eugene Onegin* at the U of M.

BOB GREEN (Max Deems) is a veteran Civic Theatre performer, whose most recent appearance was as Buffalo Bill in *Annie Get Your Gun*. A new grandfather, Bob can't quite believe he is starting his third decade with AACT!

ABOUT THE STAFF

WENDY GARTNER BLOOM (Musical Director) played the role of Charlotte in the recent Civic Theatre production of A Little Night Music. She is a voice instructor and teaches part-time at Schoolcraft College, While a student at the University of Iowa, she sang the title role in Carmen, and she was Kate Pinkerton in Madame Butterfly and Anita in West Side Story. Last January Wendy conducted the junior high District Choral Festival for the Illinois Music Educators Association, and this August she will be soloist at the Classical Music Seminar in Eisenstadt, Austria.

JIM POSANTE (Co-Director and Choreographer) has worked with Ann Arbor Civic Theatre since 1973. His production of *Oklahoma!* won the AACT best musical award. He has directed three musicals for Greenhills School, and two for the U of M Gilbert & Sullivan Society. He has done choreography for *The Unsinkable Molly Brown* at Croswell Opera House, and for the aMaizin' Blues U of M singing/dancing ensemble. Jim has played four different roles in *The Fantasticks* at various times, and he directed and choreographed the Cocktail Playhouse production at the Campus Inn. For Civic Theatre, he appeared as Harry Beaton, the sword dancer, in *Brigadoon*, and in *Most Happy Fella*, *Thieves' Carnival* and *A Little Night Music*. Jim has been a member of the Michigan Rep Company the last three seasons, appearing in *Jesus Christ*, *Superstar*, *Kiss Me Kate* and *Two Gentlemen of Verona*.

CHARLES SUTHERLAND (Co-Director) recently accepted an appointment to a two-year term on the Ann Arbor Civic Theatre Board of Directors. His stage appearances are unnumbered, but he was Mr. Lindquist of the quintet in A Little Night Music, and he has had leading roles in Brigadoon, Little Mary Sunshine and Ernest In Love. He has been in dinner theatre productions of The Fantasticks and Dames at Sea, as well as several Gilbert & Sullivan operettas. As a director, Charlie has presented Civic's You Never Can Tell, Spofford and Harvey. A third grade teacher in Detroit, he has served as props chairman this year, and has been director of our 'minor' productions and served on several other committees.

MARK E. BOWLES (Lighting Designer) is Civic Theatre's outgoing president. He also designed the lighting for A Little Night Music this spring. He is a computer consultant who also has appeared on stage in Summer and Smoke and The Fantasticks.

CAROL DENISTON (Producer) usually manages to produce musicals for AACT. This season she was producer of two in one season, the first being the recent A Little Night Music. Currently Vice-President of Civic Theatre and a former President, Carol also has handled Civic's publicity on several occasions. LARRY HILL (Set Designer) still has not appeared on stage with AACT, nor worked behind the scenes with Comic Opera Guild. He is on the Civic Theatre board, and has built the sets for several shows. This is his first outing as designer and builder. Larry was stage manager for Anastasia, and appeared with COG as the Herald in Gypsy Baron and as Mars in Orpheus in the Underworld. He also sang in the choruses of Ba-Ta-Clan, The Merry Widow and Babes in Toyland.


