Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Drama and four Tony™ Awards, including Best Play, Neil Simon's Lost in Yonkers has been described as "laughter on the brink of tears". Blessed as I am in this production with a talented and loving cast, working with this wonderful script has been a real treat for me.

For thirty years I've laughed with the rest of the world at the newlyweds in Barefoot in the Park, Oscar and Felix in The Odd Couple, the aging comics in The Sunshine Bous and all the other memorable characters Simon has created. However, I believe that we shall remember the Kurnitz family of Yonkers not because they make us laugh, but because they

make us hope.
