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

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

About the Cast

Zehra Berkman (Anna) - Honored by the Ann Arbor News with both Best Actress and Best Supporting Actress/Comedy awards, Zehra was last seen on the AACT stage in Extremities. Other stage appearances include Brilliant Traces, Goodnight Irene, Shooting Simone, and The Couch all for Performance Network. Employed by Borders, Zehra enjoys an avid interest in filmmaking in her spare time and would like to extend a special thanks to "the magical, wonderful Farrell family."

David Alexander Blixt (Garcon, Little Dutch Boy) - David is the Director and Drama Instructor for the Shadow Theatre Co. and is a familiar face to AACT audiences where he has appeared as the title character in Jeffrey, Benedick in Much Ado About Nothing, and Oliver in As You Like It. He also appeared at the Jackson Shakespeare Festival in Taming of The Shrew and Much Ado About Nothing. David has been awarded Best Actor honors by both the Ann Arbor News and AACT. His other interests he include stage combat, comic books, and historical fiction and would like to say a big thanks to Pepe le Pew.

Robert R. Farra (Carl) - Bob returns to the stage after a twenty-two year hiatus during which he fathered two sons, Matt and Andy. 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
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
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There is no smoking allowed in the auditorium, foyer, restrooms or outer lobby.
