

#### Director's Note

Before Tom Simonds' tragically early death in 1987, he wrote several musicals for both Ann Arbor's GOODTIME PLAYERS and IUNIOR THEATRE, and others that he produced and directed independently. THE SNOW OUEEN, which Tom wrote with his fellow Goodtime Player Rebecca Vlisides, was first performed by the Goodtime Players in December of 1983. The 10 adult members of that repertory company performed all the roles in the show along with two young girls. One of those girls was Rebecca's daughter, Erin Boeve, who is the only original cast member performing in our 1998 production — but this time in a major role — as one of the Ravens. Rebecca played Gerda in 1983, and Tom was the director. I played the Grandmother, the Pine Tree, and the Robber Chief. All of us in the 1983 production enjoyed ourselves so much, and the show was such a big hit that we repeated the show the following winter with the exact same cast, in January 1985. We sold out every performance because a lot of the audience members came back, too, and brought friends. After Tom's death, three of the 1983-85 Goodtime Players (Ed Smit, Rebecca Smouse, and Tim McGraw) were living in New York City and were working with a small off-Broadway production company, and suggested that they produce THE SNOW OUEEN. They imported Ion Krueger, the Goodtime Player who had been the 1983 and '85 accompanist, to NYC to teach the vocals and play piano again. Meredith Kennedy (one of the original Ravens, who also designed the title drawing for THE SNOW QUEEN as well as the original giant storybook) and I flew to NYC to see the new production. Another audience member happened to work for the Rodgers and Hammerstein publishing company. He was so impressed with the show that he encouraged his company to publish it. Until last year, they handled the rights to the show which has been performed all over the US, Currently, Tom's mother Ruth and Rebecca Vlisides have complete ownership of the show. Knowing that I've been directing shows for AACT. Rebecca asked me if I'd like to direct another production here in Ann Arbor. So THE SNOW OUEEN has returned home! I'd like to close this little history of the show with the last line that Tom wrote for the 1983 and '85 program notes... "I hope that our version of THE SNOW QUEEN helps you feel the joy of friendship that is so important in this holiday season."
